FORGIVENESS IS LIBERATING, RESENTMENT IS TOXIC

"There is an old saying that resentment is like trying to kill somebody by taking poison yourself. Some of the most profound Christian insights have to do with the nature of forgiveness" (Michael McGirr). Jesus forgave the sins of those he cured. On the cross he forgave his tormentors. In the Our Father we pray 'forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us'. Last week's Gospel addressed the 'how' of forgiveness. Today's Gospel addresses the 'why' of forgiveness. Our First Reading (Ecclesiasticus) gives the impression that God's forgiveness is dependent on our willingness to forgive others. However, the more comprehensive biblical understanding is that God's initiative in forgiving us should be our inspiration to forgive others. In other words, the quality of our relationships "must flow from and reflect [the] exercise of divine generosity and grace" (Brendan Byrne SJ). But, as Peter asks, how often must I forgive? In effect, Jesus says as often as is necessary; there is no limit. He tells the parable of the servant who in today's money terms was forgiven a debt of billions but who is unwilling to forgive a fellow servant who is in debt to him for a paltry amount. "The force of the parable rests on this comparison. Each member of the believing community should understand that they live as people who have received, through Christ's costly self-gift in love, remission of a debt (the debt of sin) that they could never themselves repay. How utterly inappropriate then an unwillingness to forgive fellow members of the community the 'debts' set up by injury on a vastly smaller scale" (Byrne). The scriptural injunction to forgive is sound psychology. "Psychologists often point out that mental and physical health can be improved by simply letting go of hatred and animosity towards people who have wronged you" (McGirr). It is much

easier to do so when somebody acknowledges they have done you wrong . . . Whether they do or not, "resentment is toxic. It seeps into every part of your life and damages relationships which have nothing to do with the people who have caused the resentment in the first place. Forgiveness is an act of liberation. To be able to forgive is to liberate yourself" (McGirr).
