## Materialism promises temporal security, but charity guarantees eternity

In the capitalist economy, where the pivotal driving force remains profit and gain, and the language is that of 'how much', everything tends to be judged and measured by matter. It is a truism that the world is made of matter. Even the sacraments that we celebrate, we depend on matter. However, it is not only the question of matter; it is always matter and form for validity. Living only at the level of matter could lead to materialism, suggesting a new *religion* or *god*, demanding more than humans can offer, including time, energy, talent, money, resources, worship and adoration, from rising to resting.

Caught in the materialistic frenzy, humans sometimes run from pillar to post without satisfaction. We often forget the fact that the human creative potential is collaborative. God is creative. He made us in his image and likeness, with enormous creative potential meant to compliment his creative work for the salvation and good of humanity. Any creative exercise devoid of divine plans only destabilizes the ecosystem, (noticeable with the global warming, earthquakes, drought and floods) putting human destiny in jeopardy.

The author of our first reading this weekend (Eccl. 1.2; 2.21-23), in his effort to relieve humanity already caught in the vicious web of materialism with the aim of creating a balance invites us to a deeper reflection on the consequences of human toil and trade including inventions and innovations. For him, excessive labor and selfish material acquisition is sheer futility. This does not undermine industriousness knowing that, usefulness is part of the rent we pay for living on earth, but a reminder about the human beginnings. We were born naked and innocent. We came with nothing and we (will) go with nothing except our charities.

This links us with the beautiful story by Christ in our Gospel text (Luke 12.1321): the parable of the rich man. Let us take a cursory look at the background to the story. The Jewish rabbis were often asked to settle disputes among their countrymen and women. They judged cases using the Mosaic Law as given in the Torah - the Jewish book of civil, religious and liturgical laws. In matters concerning the distribution of property in a family with two children, the Torah (Dt 21:15-17, Nm 27:1-11, 36:7-9), granted two-thirds of the wealth to the elder son and one-third to the younger. If there were several sons, the firstborn would receive double the inheritance of his younger brothers and would serve as the patriarch of the family and executor of his father's estate. In the case related in the Gospel, either the older brother had delayed the partition of property, or the younger brother was greedy. Jesus refused to be an arbitrator in this property dispute between two brothers, but used the occasion as a "teachable moment," instructing the audience on the folly of greed and selfishness, while contradicting the Epicurean motto: "Let us eat and drink, for tomorrow we die."

In the parable, the major character was a rich man, who had everything needed to facilitate human pleasure and comfort. However, in the process of articulating his comfort plans, he passed away. What happens to the whole hordes of his, the very fruit of his lifetime labour? The reality of this question made Jesus to consider the fellow as been unwise. This is because, A). The rich man never saw beyond himself." He was possessed by his possessions, instead of possessing them. In the process, he evicted God and others from his heart. He was insensitive to the plight of the poor workers who had laboured in his field. his poor relatives, and to the poor people in his community. In doing this, he turned his back on his Jewish heritage, for the Torah demands that gleanings from a harvest be left for the poor, the widow, the orphan and the immigrant (Lv. 19:9-10; 23:22; Dt 24:21). B). The rich man did not show any care or compassion for the hurting and needy. He did not voice any concern for keeping the community of which he was a part, safe from unexpected droughts, famines, or plagues. The richer the man grew, the greedier he became, as suggested by the Roman proverb: "Money is like sea water; the more a man drinks the thirstier he becomes." C). The rich man "never saw beyond this world." He forgot that he was going to die, sooner or later. He also forgot that God had given him everything he had: the land, the good growing season and the excellent harvest – not for himself alone but for all those around him who were in need. It was as he was planning to build new barns and warehouses to store his wealth, that he heard the words all creatures will hear one day from their Creator: "This night your life will be demanded of you!" He left his soul out of his thoughts and, hence, left eternity out of his plans. This, as Jesus warns us in the parable, is folly.

In summary, he failed to become "rich in what matters to God." He was not thankful to God for His blessings; instead, he considered them as solely the fruit of his own labour. He also failed in his stewardship duties – the returning to God of His portion in paying his tithe. Also, he did not recognize his possessions as on loan from God, given to him to share with others. He was taken up with worries or anxieties about his wealth. He was starving to death spiritually during God's abundance. Yet, though he may have prayed the beautiful prayer in the book of Proverbs: "Give me neither poverty nor riches but give me only my daily bread. Otherwise, I may have too much and disown you and say, 'Who is the Lord?' Or I may become poor and steal, and so dishonour the name of my God." (Prov. 30:8-9), he did not change. Jesus challenged his followers to learn from the experience of the foolish rich man. We are called to look at our own lives, our own "riches" and to evaluate our true needs and wants. A lot can happen with or without a will. Exercising charity while alive could greatly enrich us in the sight of God, who is generous with the voice, Joey answered, "A lawyer!" He's probably right. Where there is a will, there is often sun, the moon, the rains and indeed everything. He therefore invites and encourages us amid mortgages and wealth to express charity in view of eternity.
