

Where is God in Suffering?



The answer to this question has been attempted by all civilisations and religions throughout history. We see in the Gospel this Sunday that Jesus' disciples ask him, concerning the man born blind: "who sinned, this man or his parents?" This question echoed the views of the Jewish people at the time, that illness and misfortunes in general were a punishment for personal sins, either one's own or that of a person's parents. Jesus, however, gives a different response. Jesus states that it was neither his sin nor his parent's sin that caused the blindness in the man, but rather, "he was born blind so that the works of God might be displayed in him." This is an extraordinary claim. What Jesus is saying is that the glory of God is greater than sin and suffering and that God's power is particularly shown forth, not in eliminating suffering from the world, but in his ability to bring good out of even the most painful of our situations. St Paul reminds us of this truth when he states that "we know that in **EVERYTHING** God works for good with those who love him." (Rom 8:28).

These are not just consoling words and pious thoughts to help us cope with the ups and downs of our lives, for this is the central mystery of our faith. We see this drama of good emerging from evil played out so vividly in the life of Jesus. It was precisely when he was at his weakest and most vulnerable, and enduring the most horrendous suffering, that his greatest work of redemption was carried out for us all.

As we journey with Jesus this lent we do so in faith and confidence that our suffering and the pains of our lives do not, and will not have the final word, like Jesus, who triumphs over sin and death, we too will come out victorious with him and share in that blessed life where he himself will "wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning or crying nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away." (Rev 21:4).

- No touching at the sign of peace.
- Priests, Deacons, Acolytes and Extraordinary Ministers to sanitise their hands before distributing Holy Communion and after distributing Holy Communion. Holy Communion in the hand. No Communion on the tongue.
- The Sacred Host, not the Precious Blood, is given to the faithful.
- Recommended method of collecting monies: The faithful to place money in the retiring collection at the end of Mass until further notice.
- Communion to the sick in hospital, aged care facilities or private home of those who have COVID 19 is not permitted.

Penance

First rite of penance should be conducted in the confessional behind a screen or only if the penitent is 1.5 metres away from the priest. If the penitent is under 18, confessional door to be open. Second rite of penance is **suspended**

CAN'T RECEIVE THE EUCHARIST? HERE'S HOW TO MAKE A SPIRITUAL COMMUNION - For various reasons we may be prevented from receiving the Eucharist at Mass. This could be because we are unable to leave our home to attend Mass. This is especially relevant for many of us in this time of the COVID-19 pandemic.

In these cases the Church encourages us to make an act of "spiritual communion," where we unite ourselves to God through prayer. It is a beautiful way to express to God our desire to be united with him when we are unable to complete that union in the reception of Holy Communion.

Below is a traditional prayer of spiritual communion that many saints have prayed over the years. It can be prayed if you find yourself at Mass unable to receive the Eucharist, or at any time at home, especially if you are unable to

The ultimate goal of our lives should be communion with God and an act of spiritual communion can help a person draw closer to that goal.

My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be

separated from You. Amen.


