oday I am staying with the rejoicing crowd on Palm Sunday. (I personally cannot understand why we have the Passion on this day when it is really a rejoicing Day!)

How can I concentrate on rejoicing when we are physically distancing but hopefully socially connecting?

There is no doubt we are in a very different world and many are suffering but I want to look at the positives in our lives through today's readings.

Isaiah tells me I have a disciple's tongue .. so that I may 'know how to reply to the wearied'. How are we using our gift of speech these days? Very powerful ways of being together in families is to be the giver of positive words. I am not saying this is easy...it is not! But we know that we, as adults, have a tremendous responsibility to be positive models especially to our children.

St Paul reiterates that yes ,'Jesus was Divine', but He took on our humanity'. Jesus does know what it is like to suffer...God is in this mess and we must believe that we are not abandoned. We have witnessed many good people helping others through our own excursions to the shops and on social media. Let us keep these positives in our minds and not the negatives that are portrayed as well.

It is through my humanity that I express the Divine. 'Christ has no voice, hands or feet on earth but yours' so let us be His disciples to all those around us.

We as humans can be very fickle as the Entry Gospel (Matthew 21:1-11) notes today. Our jubilation on cheering Jesus as He enters Jerusalem on a colt is quickly changed on Good Friday when the chant becomes 'Crucify Him". Staying with the jubilation, Jesus is recognised by the crowd but who would recognise someone coming in on such a lowly animal today? We must realise that God is visible in those whom we sometimes ignore. Our isolation helps us to confront those with whom we live and perhaps may not even not like. Are we able to see God in this? WEEK 6: DOMINIC - PAPUA NEW GUINEA

Dominic, 47 is a father of six from Papua New Guinea. In 2016, he became involved with Caritas Australia's partner, Centre of Hope, who runs safe house and family anonymous programs and turned a difficult life and an unhappy relationship around. In 2016, Caritas Australia and its PNG partner, Centre of Hope, invited

Dominic to join its Safe House program. It provides Gender-Based-Violence prevention training, counselling services and safe accommodation for women and children survivors of violence. "After entering the Caritas program, I have actually changed some of my bad attitudes. It has really opened my mind and heart to see where my weaknesses are and I'm trying to improve," Dominic savs.





As we encounter Holy Week in 2020 we are perhaps stretched to the limits of our belief and at the same time more dependent than ever on our faith in God, who is ever present and loves us unconditionally.

This range of emotion is perhaps similar to that of the human Jesus-who as we know is both human and divine—a core teaching of our faith. During what we now celebrate as Holy Week, Jesus encountered the crowds in Jerusalem who cheered and welcomed him with palms (Palm *Sunday)* - those very same crowds who would days later, condemn him to death.

Later in the week he gathered with his friends for the Jewish Feast of Passover which we now celebrate on Hohy Thursday as the Mass of the Lord's Supper-the very heart of our Eucharistic celebrations.

Heavy of heart Jesus prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane, perhaps wishing 'this cup would pass him

by' but he responded to his Father's will and endured the passion and pain of crucifixion, out of love for all humanity on Good Friday.

During this week as we await the hope of the Resurrection, we pray the Psalm from Holy Thursday :

Our blessing cup is a communion with the blood of **Christ**

How can I repay the Lord

For His goodness to me?

The cup of salvation I will raise

I will call on the Lord's Name

HERE'S HOW TO MAKE A SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

For various reasons we may be prevented from receiving the Eucharist at Mass. This could be because we are unable to leave our home to attend Mass. This is especially relevant for us in this time of the COVID-19 pandemic. In these cases the Church encourages us to make an act of "spiritual communion," where we unite ourselves to God through prayer. It is a beautiful way to express to God our desire to be united with him when we are unable to complete that union in the reception of Holy Communion.

Below is a traditional prayer of spiritual communion that many saints have prayed over the years. It can be prayed if you find yourself at Mass unable to receive the Eucharist, or at any time at home, especially if you are unable to attend Mass. The ultimate goal of our lives should be communion with God and an act of spiritual communion can help a person draw

closer to that goal.

My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.
