### **Gospel** *Mt 16:21-27*

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself.

Jesus began to make it clear to his disciples that he was destined to go to Jerusalem and suffer grievously at the hands of the elders and chief priests and scribes, to be put to death and to be raised up on the third day. Then, taking him aside, Peter started to remonstrate with him. 'Heaven preserve you, Lord,' he said. 'This must not happen to you.' But he turned and said to Peter, 'Get behind me, Satan! You are an obstacle in my path, because the way you think is not God's way but man's.'

Then Jesus said to his disciples, 'If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me. For anyone who wants to save his life will lose it; but anyone who loses his life for my sake will find it. What, then, will a man gain if he wins the whole world and ruins his life? Or what has a man to offer in exchange for his life?

**REFLECTION** by Dianne Bergant CSA The gospel does not say that Jesus will gallantly step forward, take suffering upon himself, and thus demonstrate his power. Instead, his fate will be a demonstration of his vulnerability. He will be taken forcibly and will suffer at the hands of others. He will do this willingly, but not as a volunteer. Jesus will be a victim. This picture of Jesus carries implications for discipleship. Whoever follows him must follow him to the cross. If we participate in his success, we must also share in his shame. Disciples have a choice to follow or not to follow, but if they choose in his favour they must be ready for suffering and humiliation. Paul exhorts us to reject the standards of the world. This is a very difficult path to follow, especially when it seems that those who conform to this age prosper. Following Christ can place barriers between ourselves and others. If we no longer share their values and their interests, we may feel alienated. Suffering is bound to invade our ministerial lives as well. We must remember that Jesus' message antagonised many people in his day. Those who proclaim the same message in their own contexts must be prepared for a similar reaction. After witnessing the marvelous feats that Jesus accomplished, we discover that he is going to suffer and be put to death. How can this be? With Peter we protest. With Jeremiah we wonder: Have we been duped? The realisation that we too will have to suffer becomes a crucial test of our faith. © Dianne Bergant CSA

# THE CROSS, A CONDITION FOR DISCIPLESHIP



Last weekend, St Matthew presented a narrative with many images. These included the image of the Church to be built on Peter, the rock personified, and the image of the keys signifying the magisterium of the Church. This weekend, Christ continues his discourse by pointing to a significant image, the Cross, a principal symbol in Christianity. It recalls the Crucifixion and the redeeming effects of his Passion and death.

Before the time of Christ, the cross represented suffering and was used to execute criminals, especially under the imperial Roman rule. The crucifixion story of Jesus and two other thieves reflects this. Christ's redemptive death on the cross

gave it additional and indeed, a new meaning; from being a mark of shame and suffering, the cross is now identified with hope, victory and a symbol of triumph. Thus, the cross is a sign both of Christ himself and of the faith of Christians. In ceremonial usage, making a sign of the cross may be, according to the context, an act of profession of faith, a prayer, a dedication, and a benediction.

In the Gospel this weekend, Jesus presents the symbol of the cross as a necessary condition for true discipleship when he said: "If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself, take up his cross and follow me" (Matthew 16.24). In saying this, Jesus calls for an open and enduring disposition to accepting the cross in whatever form or shape.

The invitation of Jesus to his followers then and now remains critical as the reality of the cross is not less light by day or years. 2020 has been a year of the cross! This may be visible not only in the events of the fires, but in the global pandemic, creating enormous human suffering, derailing many world economies, overwhelming medical services resulting in massive fatalities, with many families unable to spend time with their deceased loved ones.

Additionally, the loss of income or means of livelihood, changes to lifestyle with prolonged uncertainty and fears are common experiences. The ongoing lockdowns, the isolation, the compelling home-schooling experiences for parents and children, the discomfort and difficulties resulting from the many guidelines, the impact of cancer and the growing presence of mental illness, the focus of this year's *Social Justice Sunday* among other things, potentially reminds us of the cross.

Sometime, the weight of the cross can be crushing, leaving us with little or no energy for the next step. However, St. Mary of the Cross MacKillop tells us, "Courage, courage, trust in God who helps you in all things, we feel our crosses hard at times, but our courage should rise with them".

In the words of St. John of the Cross, "We tend to be rich, soft, comfortable. We shrink even from words like self-denial, mortification, purification, asceticism, and discipline. We run from the cross: Don't if you really want to live!"

The cross is a necessary component of our baptismal call to discipleship, *no cross, no crown.*





# St Bartholomew Feast Day August 24th

Patron Saint of tanners, tailors, leatherworkers and **Butchers** 

Bartholomew was one of the 12 apostles of Jesus according to the New Testament.

Nathaniel Bar-Tholmai is known just by his first name or by the common -rendering of his surname, which literally means son of Tolomai.



Philip introduced Bartholomew to the Lord. When told that the Messiah had arrived and that he was Jesus of Nazareth, Bartholomew's response was, "Can anything good come from Nazareth?" which prompted Jesus to say, "This man has no guile" (John 1:47); in other words, he speaks his

**John's Gospel mentions** Bartholomew as one of the Apostles to whom the risen Christ appeared at the Sea of Galilee after his Resurrection.

Two ancient testimonies exist about the mission of Saint Bartholomew in India. These are of Eusebius of Caesarea (early 4th century) and

of Saint Jerome (late 4th century). Both of these refer to this tradition while speaking of the reported visit of Pantaenus to India in the 2nd century. The studies of Fr A.C. Perumalil SJ and Moraes hold that the Bombay region on the Konkancoast, a region which may have been known as the ancient city Kalyan, was the field of Saint Bartholomew's missionary activities. Along with his fellow apostle Jude "Thaddeus", Bartholomew is reputed to have brought Christianity to Armenia in the 1st century. Thus, both saints are considered the patron saints of the Armenian Apostolic Church.

One tradition has it that Apostle Bartholomew was executed in Albanopolisin Armenia. According to popular hagiography, the apostle was flayed alive and beheaded. According to other accounts he was crucified upside down (head downward) like St Peter. He is said to have been martyred for having converted Polymius, the king of Armenia, to Christianity. The remains of St. Bartholomew were transferred to two churches in Italy: Benevento and the Church of St. Bartholomew-in-the-Tiber in Rome. This saint's main symbol consists of three knives representing his gruesome death.

If you can't make a financial donation on September 5, there are still many ways to get involved. Overall, this day reminds us that simple acts of charity can

alleviate the worst effects of humanitarian crises and create
