He leased his vineyard to other farmers.

Jesus said to the chief priests and the elders of the people, 'Listen to another parable. There was a man, a landowner, who planted a vineyard; he fenced it round, dug a winepress in it and built a tower; then he leased it to tenants and went abroad. When vintage time drew near he sent his servants to the tenants to collect his produce. But the tenants seized his servants, thrashed one, killed another and stoned a third. Next he sent some more servants, this time a larger number, and they dealt with them in the same way. Finally he sent his son

to them. "They will respect my son," he said. But when the tenants saw the son, they said to each other, "This is the heir. Come on, let us kill him and take over his inheritance." So they seized him and threw him out of the vineyard and killed him. Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?' They answered, 'He will bring those wretches to a wretched end and lease the vinevard to other tenants who will deliver the produce to him when the season arrives.' Jesus said to them, 'Have you never read in the scriptures: It was the stone rejected by the builders that became the keystone. This was the Lord's doing and it is wonderful to see? I tell you, then, that the kingdom of God will be taken from you and given to a people who will produce its fruit.'

### REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate Good Wine requires Hard Work

In the Hebrew scripture, Israel is spoken of as the Vineyard of God. We can say that now the Church is the vineyard of God. God is the Landlord, we are the tenants. It is our job to faithfully tend it and make sure it bears good fruit. If we are unfaithful, then God *will* find other people to carry on his plan, other tenants to tend his vineyard.

Certainly, we see that within the Universal Church. With the decline of the Eurocentric church, who has God turned to as new tenants for his vineyard? Look at the surging numbers of Catholics in sub-Sahara Africa, Nigeria, the Philippines, Korea. The persecuted Church in Vietnam and China is surviving and growing despite the severity of oppression.

I think we may agree that the vineyard of the Church in Australia is not as fruitful as it could be. This is a challenge for us. It is wonderful to see the energetic work of the new immigrants and refugees in our parishes (including the Bishop of Parramatta!).

We could pause for a moment to commit to taking up the privilege and duty to work in the vineyard of the Church.

## 27th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME—A

# October, the Month of Mary, and Mission.

The tenth month of the calendar year is of significance for several reasons. In Catholic tradition, it is marked as the month of Mary, the rosary (*celebrated October* 7<sup>th</sup>) and Mission. In political history, it is the month of independence for The Peoples' Republic of China, Belgium and indeed, the reunification of a 'common' Germany. St. Francis of Assisi's eventful life ended in October. In New South Wales, the first Monday marks Labour Day and for Queenslanders, it is the Queen's Birthday, therefore, the long weekend to celebrate.

Meanwhile, since the 16th century, catholic piety finds expressions in the different months of the year. For instance, November is the month for the Holy Souls. The months of May and particularly October are devoted to Mary and the prayer of the Rosary. Pope Leo XIII (1878-1903), started this practice at the close of the 18th century during his pontificate. In a Letter of September 1, 1883, mindful of the Rosary's power to strengthen faith and foster a life of virtue, he outlined the triumphs of the Rosary in past times and admonished the faithful to dedicate the month of October to the Blessed Virgin through the daily recitation of the Rosary in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament, in order to obtain through her intercession, graces, God's consolation and protection in trying times.

Additionally, Pope St. John Paul II, declared that, the rosary is a powerful prayer and weapon and can affect and benefit us significantly each time we pray the rosary. It represents the most effective means of fostering among the faithful the commitment to the contemplation (a gaze of faith, fixed on Jesus) of the Christian mystery, the life of Jesus and Mary's role in Salvation. In his Apostolic Letter *Rosarium Virginis Mariae*, "On the Most Holy Rosary", St John Paul II explains further this wonderful devotion and introduces the Luminous mysteries.

Importantly, the month of October is also set aside for an annual reflection and renewal of the Church's commitment to her mission mandate. This year, Pope Francis has adopted the Theme: Here am I, send me (Is. 6.8). According to Pope Francis, this is the ever-new response to the Lord's question: "Whom shall I send?" This invitation from God's merciful heart is a challenge for both the Church and humanity especially in the face of the global pandemic, placing everyone in the same boat and in need of care, support, and consolation. However, the Church through her missionary journey and mandate, must continue to respond fruitfully to the needs in the vineyard. Like the disciples in the Gospel we are caught off guard by an unexpected, turbulent storm, exposing our fragility and collective disorientation, yet we are called to row together on mission.

This reawakens the need for prayer and more prayers for the ongoing mission of the Church in a troubled world and we implore Mary's intercession through the rosary, a vocal and meditative prayer. We are therefore invited throughout this month to commit to praying the rosary individually, communally, regularly and if possible, every day.




#### **OUR LADY HELP OF CHRISTIANS**



## **ST FRANCIS OF ASSISI** SUNDAY 4TH OCTOBER

## Founder of the Franciscan Order, born at Assisi in Umbria, in 1181.

It has been argued that no one else in history was as dedicated as Francis to imitate the life, and carry

out the work of Christ.

He believed that nature itself was the mirror of God. He called all creatures his "brothers" and "sisters", and even preached to the birds and supposedly persuaded a wolf to stop attacking some locals if they agreed to feed the wolf. In his Canticle of the Creatures ("Praises of Creatures" or "Canticle of the Sun"), he mentioned the "Brother Sun" and "Sister Moon", the wind and water, and "Sister Death", He referred to his chronic illnesses as his "sisters". His deep sense of brotherhood under God embraced others and he declared that "he considered himself no friend of Christ if he did not cherish those for whom Christ died".

For this reason Saint Francis of Assisi is remembered as the patron saint of ecology (nature) and animals. On his feast day we honour him at church with the blessing of the animals.

## **World Mental Health Day** Saturday 10th October

The words we use matter, especially when speaking about people who are often stigmatised by society through inappropriate or thoughtless use of language. For people with mental illness, the stigma surrounding the illness, rooted in misconceptions and erroneous beliefs, is compounded by the language and descriptions we use. As people of compassion, we should never use stigmatising, demeaning language to describe people who have a mental illness.

We should use appropriate language to describe diseases of the brain and be careful not to misuse terms. Pope St John Paul II said, " It is a way of communicating that people with mental illness, have the inalienable right not only to be considered as an image of God and therefore as a person, but also to be treated as such.

This year's World Mental Health Day, comes at a time when our daily lives have changed considerably as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. The past months have brought many challenges.

On World Mental Health Day, the World Health Organisation will, for the first time ever, host a global online advocacy event on mental health. World leaders, mental health experts and celebrities will join WHO Director-General, Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus to discuss ways to improve our mental health and make sure quality health care is available to everyone who needs it.
