Give to Caesar the things that belong to Caesar and to God the things that are God's.

The Pharisees went away to work out between them how to trap Jesus in what he said. And they sent their disciples to him, together with the Herodians, to say, 'Master, we know that you are an honest man and teach the way of God in an honest way, and that you are not afraid of anyone, because a man's rank means nothing to you. Tell us your opinion, then. Is it permissible to pay taxes to Caesar or not?' But Jesus was aware of their malice and replied, 'You hypocrites! Why do you set this trap for me? Let me see the money you pay the tax with.' They handed him a denarius, and he said, 'Whose head is this? Whose name?' 'Caesar's' they replied. He then said to them, 'Very well, give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar - and to God what belongs to God.'

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REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate Whose Image and Likeness?

Jesus first cleverly throws his questioners on the defensive. They are the ones carrying the coinage, not him. Then he poses the crucial question, 'Whose image is it and whose inscription?' They said to him, 'Caesar's'. Then he said to them: 'Render to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's.' The coin bore the image and inscription of Caesar. Genesis teaches us that human beings are made in the image and likeness of God. Our Lord is saying, 'Let the political and financial authorities have their coinage. It is their legal tender. But they cannot have human beings. Human beings belong to Another. They belong to God.' We are

fortunate to live in a wonderful democracy. But even a democracy can violate the dignity of a human being created in the image and likeness of God. As Pope John Paul II said: 'Authentic democracy is possible only in a state ruled by law, and on the basis of a correct conception of the human person.' (Italics added) We could pause for a moment to thank God for the inscription, 'Child of God', effectively engraved on our hearts bv baptism.

2020 WORLD MISSION SUNDAY 18TH OCTOBER Theme: here am I, send me (Is 6:8)

"WHAT THE SPIRIT BRINGS....."

The most consoling words in today's reading are: 'I have called you by name, conferring a title' ... that title given at Baptism where we were anointed priest, prophet and king giving us the authority required, in our adult life, to call upon the Holy Spirit at all times. 'The Spirit joins with our spirit to bear common witness that we are children of God' Romans 8:16

St Paul tells us that it is not just saying prayers and keeping the faith, but that the spiritual life of the Christian is based on the living and professing that faith through the actions of our daily life. The virtues of **faith**, hope and charity must be lived in their fullness. During this time when the Sacrament of Confirmation has recently being conferred, we may commit ourselves once again to the Gifts - Wisdom, Understanding, Counsel, Fortitude, Knowledge, Piety and Fear of the Lord (Awe,) and Fruits of the Holy Spirit - Love, joy, peace, patience kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self control! What a treasure trove we have to call on!! They are in our knapsack. What stops us??

We are also encouraged to pray for our Community especially at this time. The gospel reminds us that we are forever being challenged by the 'world' to be strong in our Faith. We do have the responsibility to be a good citizen, to obey the rules and pay our dues. There are many issues today that challenge us to take a stand. Although we may not realise it, we are often the instrument that God requires to lead another to God.

ST LUKE, THE EVANGELIST - FEAST DAY SUNDAY 18TH

St Luke is quite special. Not only was he the only Gentile to write books of the Bible, but he was a close companion of St. Paul. If St. Paul succeeded in evangelising the western Roman empire, Luke may have had more to do with it than we know.

It is likely that God used his medical skills to keep St. Paul alive some of those times when he was beaten, stoned, or halfdrowned. St. Luke is also the first Christian physician on record. Untold thousands have followed in his steps. Physicians can look to St. Luke as an example, but so can historians, because his writings are very much in the Greek tradition. Painters claim him for their brotherhood, too, because tradition holds he painted a picture of the Blessed Virgin which hung in the Santa Maria Maggiore in Rome.

The apostle Paul told us that Luke was a doctor. In fact, he called him "dear doctor Luke." Given his use of medical detail in the two books he wrote for the Bible, The Gospel According to Luke and The Acts of the Apostles, we might have guessed it ourselves. Luke pulled back the curtain on the young Jesus more than any other gospel writer. Without him we would not know anything about the boy Jesus's thinking. It is a pretty safe bet that Luke interviewed the Blessed Virgin Mary and got most of the details

from her. Perhaps he even heard the Magnificat, recorded in his gospel alone, from her very own lips. October 18 is the great doctor's feast day in churches that observe such traditions.

St. Luke is patron saint of artists, bachelors, bookbinders, brewers, butchers, doctors, glass makers, glassworkers, gold workers, goldsmiths, lacemakers, lace workers, notaries, painters, physicians,

sculptors, stained glass workers, surgeons, and unmarried men.
