REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate

True **Perspectives** Did you notice that Our Lord does not command us to love 'God'? No, we are to love 'the *Lord* your God', the One who rescued the Jewish people from slavery. The resurrection of Jesus Christ reveals the Lord God as the liberator from the apparent final dominance of death. Loving such a liberator is the natural response. So, 'Love the Lord your God'. Then Our Lord does not command us to love our neighbour! Rather, 'Love your neighbour as vourself.' But who is 'yourself'? In the wonderful story-telling of Genesis, we are told that Adam, an earthen statue, had Divine Breath breathed into the nostrils, creating him as a human being. We earthlings are conceived with the Divine Breath at the core of our being. The challenge for you and for me is to see 'yourself' in that way, and thereafter every human being whose lives we can affect: the neighbour. And in today's global world, the neighbour can be a person in a society geographically culturally distant. We could pause for a moment to see the true dimensions of God, self and the other, to more easily fulfil the dual command.

30th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME—A



In this weekend's gospel, Jesus offered a classical response to the Pharisees who were seeking to disconcert him using a question rooted in the Jewish code, containing 613 precepts. The subject of the question was the greatest commandment of the law, commonly posed to the Jewish Rabbis and teachers at the time.

Jesus, in his response pointed to the first commandment which requires loving God with all their heart, soul, mind and strength. This is contained in the Jewish prayer of shema (cf. Deut.6.4-5). Using the same opportunity, he alluded to the second commandment: to love your neighbour as yourself (Lev. 19.18), thereby summarizing the 613 precepts of the law and the teachings of the prophets into two - love of God and neighbour (others). In this way, Jesus brought together God, the other and self in a love triangle. This did not only simplify the understanding of the law as a collective but revolutionises its interpretations for all time.

Apart from his understanding of the Jewish scriptures (OT), Jesus' response to the Pharisees came naturally. His incarnation was an act of love. This is reflected in John's gospel 3.16: God loved the world so much that he gave His only son. Jesus came in response to love and to teach us how to love God through others. He exemplified this in his own life, actions and sacrificial death for humanity. This fulfils his teaching in John's gospel that 'the greatest love a person can have for his friends, is to give his life for them' (Jn. 15.13). What a love!

Christs' example is apt and compelling. Like him, how do we love God with all our heart, with all our soul, with all our mind and with all our strength? And how do we love our neighbour as ourselves, even when it hurts? To love God with our all, implies that God will be the sole object of our heart's desire, the center of our soul's attraction, the object of contemplation in our mind and the will to serve him with all our strength. In essence, it calls for conformation with God in all things and, in the words of St. Augustine, 'Love God and do whatever you please'.

Meanwhile, we cannot give what we do not have. Therefore, Jesus calls us to love our neighbour as ourselves. Self love is fundamental to being able to love others. But, how often do we express self-love and how do we love others when it hurts, when it leaves us marred, broken, grief stricken and at a high cost as evident in human relationships? This may be hard, however, the cross and the Christ events offers us a model as we reflect on the greatest commandment this weekend. Authentic love of God and neighbour require some form of sacrifice.

There is a fine line between love and hate. However, love in Christs' terms implies consciously seeking the good of the other person, even when it hurts. This underpins Christian charity which calls us to love our enemies and pray for those who persecute us (Mt. 5.44-45). We are therefore, challenged to verify our love of God by our love of neighbour. And to love our neighbour as ourselves, challenging as it is, remains the only way to keep the love triangle active.

May we gain the grace to keep loving the self, others and God.



Sadly during 2020 we have not been able to mourn our loved ones - family and friends - as we would hope. During this November as a Community of faith we will take time and remember


and pray for each person.
