Gospel *Lk 2:22-40*

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

The child grew to maturity, and he was filled with wisdom.

When the day came for them to be purified as laid down by the Law of Moses, the parents of Jesus took him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord – observing what stands written in the Law of the Lord: Every first-born male must be consecrated to the Lord – and also to offer in sacrifice, in accordance with what is said in the Law of the Lord, a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons. Now in Jerusalem there was a man named Simeon. He was an upright and devout man; he looked forward to Israel's comforting and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death until he had set eyes on the Christ of the Lord. Prompted by the Spirit he came to the Temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what the Law required, he took him into his arms and blessed God; and he said: 'Now, Master, you can let your servant go in peace, just as you promised; because my eyes have seen the salvation which you have prepared for all the nations to see, a light to enlighten the pagans and the glory of your people Israel.' As the child's father and mother stood there wondering at the things that were being said about him, Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, 'You see this child: he is destined for the fall and for the rising of many in Israel, destined to be a sign that is rejected – and a sword will pierce your own soul too – so that the secret thoughts of many may be laid bare.' There was a prophetess also, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was well on in years. Her days of girlhood over, she had been married for seven years before becoming a widow. She was now eighty-four years old and never left the Temple, serving God night and day with fasting and prayer. She came by just at that moment and

began to praise God; and she spoke of the child to all who looked forward to the deliverance of Jerusalem. When they had done everything the Law of the Lord required, they went back to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. Meanwhile the child grew to maturity, and he was filled with wisdom; and God's favour was with him.

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REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate **The Liberation of Women**

In today's Gospel, Mary, having given birth, is regarded as ritually unclean. She could not take part in public worship until she was 'purified'. This involved offering up a couple of pigeons which she and Joseph had to buy. No wonder that, at the Cleansing of the Temple, Jesus shatters the cages in which the pigeons were kept! He was angry with a Temple system which saw Mary that way, which thought of all women giving birth that way. Indeed, his whole ministry is full of instances when women breach religious and cultural taboos in his presence, because of his presence. This Feast of the Holy Family gives us the opportunity to thank God for our mothers who, like Mary, helped fulfil God's plan for humankind by birthing us into the world. We could pause for a moment to pray that the Church changes rules and structures which confine women in cages built from ideologies foreign to the Gospel, lest those rules become swords which pierce Mary's soul.

FEAST OF THE HOLY FAMILY - YEAR B

e celebrate this weekend, the Feast of the Holy Family, of Mary, Joseph and Jesus.

From the beginning, God designed the human family as a school of love and communion, where members can grow strong and wise in favour with him. As the Catechism has it (CCC 2207), "The family is the *original cell of social life*. It is the natural society in which husband and wife are called to give themselves in love and in the gift of life. Authority, stability, and a life of relationships within the family constitute the foundations for freedom, security, and fraternity within society. The family is the community in which, from childhood, one can learn moral values, begin to honor God, and make good use of freedom. Family life is an initiation into life in society."

Also, in 'The Role of the Christian Family in the Modern World' (*Famillaris Consortio*), Pope John Paul II emphasised the importance of the family both to the vitality of the Church and the good of society. "The family, which is founded and given life by love, is a community of persons: of husband and wife, of parents and children, of relatives... [The family's] inner principle is love. Without love the family cannot live, grow and perfect itself... without love man remains incomprehensible to himself, his life is senseless if love is not revealed in him" (FC #18).

What has this to do with the Feast of the Holy Family of Mary, Jesus, and Joseph?

Well, it was for humanity's sake that Jesus emptied himself, humbling himself to the limitations of human nature by choosing a poor, simple family to be born into. The Second Person of the Most Holy Trinity, the Incarnate Son of God, came to dwell in a small town in Nazareth with Mary and Joseph. As a son of this human family, He experienced everything about being human, taking on our nature to consecrate it to the Father – and Mary and Joseph were part of this mission.

Whilst they were not on the breadline, they were poor – ordinary, and there was nothing extravagant about their lives. Joseph, a carpenter, and Mary a common handmaid, had no need to consecrate their first-born son to the Lord in the Temple, yet they were obedient to the Jewish Law of Moses, thus finding their obedience in Scripture. We should remember that Jesus was a Jew, and Joseph and Mary were also Jews. ("Spiritually we are all Semites." Thus spoke Pius XI on the eve of World War II.)

Poor families offered two pigeons as part of this ritual consecration ceremony, for hidden behind this simple offering of the two pigeons the entire plan of salvation was revealed to Simeon and Anna, who were awaiting the redemption of Jerusalem, represent the hopes and expectations of faithful and devout Jews who at this time were looking forward to the restoration of God's rule in Israel. It had been long said the Messiah would one day come and save not only the Jews, but also the Gentiles, not only for the people of Israel, but for the nations of the world as well. The birth of Jesus brings these hopes to fulfillment.

Yet, in addition to this prophecy of glory and messianic identity, Simeon utters the ominous prophecy to Mary that the child is set for the fall and rise of many in Israel, destined to be a sign that is rejected because, although Jesus is going to save his people, he is not going to do it without the cross. Already in the presentation in the Temple, where Christ is consecrated in a symbolic way, the shadow of the cross is looming. On the cross will be Christ as a real sacrifice to God, when Christ will offer himself to the Father, in the power of the Holy Spirit, as a true sacrifice for the sins of the world – for the forgiveness of people's sins.

"Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends...These things I command you, that ye love one another." (Jn 15:13,17)

May the blessings of the Holy family pour forth on every human family.
