His state was divine, yet Christ Jesus did not cling to his equality with God but emptied himself to assume the condition of a slave, and became as men are, and being as all men are, he was humbler yet, even to accepting death, death on a cross. But God raised him high and gave him the name which is above all other names so that all beings in the heavens, on

earth and in the underworld, should bend the knee at the name of Jesus and that every tongue should acclaim Jesus Christ as Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Gospel Acclamation Phil 2:8-9

Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ, king of endless glory! Christ became obedient for us even to death dying on the cross. Therefore God raised him on high and gave him a name above all other names. Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ, king of endless glory!

Gospel Mk 15:1-39

First thing in the morning, the chief priests together with the elders and the scribes, in short the whole Sanhedrin, had their plan ready. They had Jesus bound and took him away and handed him over to Pilate. Pilate questioned him, 'Are you the king of the Jews?' 'It is you who say it' he answered. And the chief priests brought many accusations against him. Pilate questioned him again, 'Have you no reply at all? See how many accusations they are bringing against you!' But to Pilate's amazement. Jesus made no further reply. At festival time Pilate used to release a prisoner for them, anyone they asked for. Now a man called Barabbas was then in prison with the rioters who had committed murder during the uprising. When the crowd went up and began to ask Pilate the customary favour, Pilate answered them, 'Do you want me to release for you the king of the Jews?' For he realised it was out of jealousy that the chief priests had handed Jesus over. The chief priests, however, had incited the crowd to demand that he should release Barabbas for them instead. The Pilate spoke again. 'But in that case,' he said to them 'what am I to do with the man you call king of the Jews?' They shouted back, 'Crucify him!' 'Why?' Pilate asked them 'What harm has he done?' But they shouted all the louder, 'Crucify him!' So Pilate, anxious to placate the crowd, released Barabbas for them and, having ordered Jesus to be scourged, handed him over to be crucified. The soldiers led him away to the inner part of the palace, that is, the Praetorium, and called the whole cohort together. They dressed him in purple, twisted some thorns into a crown and put it on him. And they began saluting him, 'Hail, king of the Jews!' They struck his head with a reed and spat on him; and they went down on their knees to do him hom-

age. And when they had finished making fun of him, they took off the purple and dressed him in his own clothes. They led him out to crucify him. They enlisted a passer-by, Simon of Cyrene, father of Alexander and Rufus, who was coming in from the country, to carry his cross. They brought Jesus to the place called Golgotha, which means the place of the skull. They offered him wine mixed with myrrh, but he refused it. Then they crucified him, and shared out his clothing, casting lots to decide what each should get. It was the third hour when they crucified him. The inscription giving the charge against him read: 'The King of the Jews.' And they crucified two robbers with him, one on his right and one on his left. The passers-by jeered at him; they shook their heads and said, 'Aha! So you would destroy the Temple and rebuild it in three days! Then save yourself: come down from the cross!' The chief priests and the scribes mocked him among themselves in the same way. 'He saved others,' they said

'he cannot save himself. Let the Christ, the king of Israel.

to see it and believe.' Even those who were crucified with him taunted him. When the sixth hour came there was darkness over the whole land until the ninth hour. And at the ninth hour Jesus cried out in a loud voice, 'Eloi, Eloi, lama sabachthani?' which means, 'My God, my God, why have you deserted me?' When some of those who stood by heard this they said, 'Listen, he is calling on Elijah'. Someone ran and soaked a sponge in vinegar and, putting it on a reed, gave it him to drink saying, 'Wait and see if Elijah will come to take him down.' But Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last. All kneel and pause a moment. And the veil of the Temple was torn in two from top to bottom. The centurion, who was standing in front of him, had seen how he had died, and he said, 'In truth this man was a son of God.'

Palm Sunday-YEAR B

n the words of Pope Benedict, "Palm Sunday is the great doorway leading into Holy Week, the week when the Lord Jesus makes his way towards the culmination of his earthly existence." (World Youth Day, Sunday 1st April 2012).

During Holy Week we recall of the intensity of our Lord's passion and death leading to the triumph of the Resurrection next Sunday. We are reminded that being a disciple of Jesus has a cost to it – which can be rather frightening because it involves freely willing our total commitment to the Lord – just as the Apostles were to find – even unto death. Let us pray therefore that we neither forget nor be indifferent to the supreme price that Jesus paid to save us from our sins and offer us eternal life. If we remain open to him in repentance, we are re-energised, restored. and transformed - no matter what we have done.

In reading the event-filled Passion of Jesus from Mark's gospel – from just before Passover to the tomb, we discover a whole lot of different characters, each with his or her respective role to play leading to Jesus' crucifixion. We may even see ourselves reflected in some of these, realizing that our sins also crucified him.

Perhaps we are sometimes like those indignant guests at table who objected when a woman came in with an alabaster jar of very costly ointment to anoint the head of Jesus? Or like Peter denying him three times? Or like the chief priests, scribes, and elders who had him arrested in Gethsemane, then demanded his death for claiming equality with God? Maybe sometimes like Pilate who realised it was out of jealousy that the chief priests had handed Jesus over; vet, anxious to placate the crowd, he weakened and handed him over to be crucified? Or like the Apostles who ran away when Jesus needed them most? Or again like Mary and John who stood at the foot of the cross with him. This week offers us the opportunity to stand with Jesus, ever present in the poor.

The Apostles were not prepared for what unfolded following the glory of Jesus' procession into Jerusalem. They had expected him to establish a kingdom in this world and throw off the yoke of Rome. Unlike the Apostles, we know now that it is a kingdom of struggle and sacrifice, a kingdom that will never be fully accepted by this world, nor fully realised in it. We know that it is a kingdom without borders which exists in the hearts of believers and open to all humanity. "He goes up to Jerusalem in order to fulfil the Scriptures and to be nailed to the wood of the Cross. the throne from which he will reign for ever, drawing to himself humanity of every age and offering to all the gift of redemption." (ibid.)

Thankfully, in the power of the Holy Spirit, the risen Christ remains always with us in the Eucharist, bringing the one unrepeatable sacrifice of the cross made really and truly present every time we celebrate it. In the mass, what we receive in humble thanksgiving, and the suffering we endure in life especially during the last year and the ongoing impacts of the flash floods, we offer back in prayer to the Father at mass: "Pray, brothers and sisters, that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God, the almighty Father" - so the priest says during the offertory. Later, at communion, we physically and spiritually welcome Christ into our hearts by consuming him, and so become like him through the total assimi-

lation of him in the power of the Holy Spirit." (Cf. CCC 1324-27)

The events of the coming days commemorate the sacrifice of Christ made for humanity. He did this for us, and we still remember him even after two thousand years. This is not only because it was recorded in the sacred scriptures but in the hearts of women and men. What can we do for others? What are we going to be remembered for today, tomorrow and in years to come?

May we, be empowered by grace during this Holy Week to return that self-emptying love of Christ and offer our own life and Fr Martins sufferings as sacrifice for others.

PEOPLE OF FAITH, HOPE & LOVE

As we enter this most sacred of all weeks, we reflect very personally - on ourselves and on Jesus.

The passion of Jesus refers to the helplessness he had to endure during the last hours of his life, a helplessness extremely fruitful for him and for us. The first component in that helplessness begins in the Garden of Gethsemane, immediately after he has celebrated the last supper. The Scriptures tell us that he went out into the Garden with his disciples to pray for the strength he needed to face the ordeal that was now imminent.

In describing Jesus' suffering during his passion, the evangelists focus little on his physical suffering. What the gospel writers focus on is that in all of this, Jesus is alone, misunderstood, lonely, isolated, without support.

What's emphasized is the agony of his heart that's ultra-sensitive, gentle, loving, understanding, warm, inviting, hungry to embrace everyone but which instead finds he finds himself misunderstood, alone, isolated, hated, brutalized, facing murder. (Fr Ron Rolheiser OMI)

During this final week we are invited to an even deeper examination of the life we are living and our desire to be a dynamic and beating heart for others. Jesus showed us the way to live our lives be present for others. This final week of the Lenten journey is one marked by prayer and sharing, silence and fasting, in anticipation of the joy of Easter.
