LITURGY OF THE WORD Easter Sunday

First Reading *Acts 10:34. 37-43* A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

We have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead. Peter addressed Cornelius and his household: 'You must have heard about the recent happenings in Judaea; about Jesus of Nazareth and how he began in Galilee, after John had been preaching baptism. God had anointed him with the Holy Spirit and with power, and because God was with him, Jesus went about doing good and curing all who had fallen into the power of the devil. Now I, and those with me, can witness to everything he did throughout the countryside of Judaea and in Jerusalem itself: and also to the fact that they killed him by hanging him on a tree, yet three days afterwards God raised him to life and allowed him to be seen, not by the whole people but only by certain witnesses God had chosen beforehand. Now we are those witnesses – we have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead - and he has ordered us to proclaim this to his people and to tell them that God has appointed him to judge everyone, alive or dead. It is to him that all the prophets bear this witness: that all who believe in Jesus will have their sins forgiven through his name.' *The Word of the Lord*

The sequence is said or sung on this day. On the weekdays of the Octave of Easter, its use is optional. Christians, to the Paschal Victim offer sacrifice and praise. The sheep are ransomed by the Lamb; and Christ, the undefiled. hath sinners to his Father reconciled. Death with life contended: combat strangely ended! Life's own Champion, slain, yet lives to reign. Tell us, Mary: say what thou didst see upon the way. The tomb the Living did enclose; I saw Christ's glory as he rose! The angels there attesting; shroud with grave-clothes resting. Christ, my hope, has risen: he goes before you into Galilee. That Christ is truly risen from the dead we know. Victorious king, thy mercy show!

Gospel Jn 20:1-9

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

The teaching of scripture is that he must rise from the dead.

It was very early on the first day of the week and still dark, when Mary of Magdala came to the tomb. She saw that the stone had been moved away from the tomb and came running to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one Jesus loved. 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb' she said 'and we don't know where they have put him.So Peter set out with the other disciple to go to the tomb. They ran together, but the other disciple, running faster than Peter, reached the tomb first; he bent down and saw the linen cloths lying on the ground, but did not go in. Simon Peter who was following now came up, went right into the tomb, saw the linen cloths on the ground, and also the cloth that had been over his head; this was not with the linen cloths but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple who had reached the tomb first also went

in; he saw and he believed. Till this moment they had failed to understand the teaching of scripture, that he must rise from the dead.

The Gospel of the Lord

R. Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ.

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REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate Dawn has Broken – The Son is Risen

Women go to the tomb as dawn is breaking. The Power of Darkness which had Jesus unjustly sentenced, cruelly tortured and buried in the pitch blackness of the tomb, is conquered by the Son-Rise of all sun rises flooding our world and the whole of human history with Divine Light and Energy. This is the heart of our faith as Catholic Christians, which we celebrate with bon-fire (good fire) in darkness at the Easter Vigil. From that earthly element we light the Easter candle and the Exsultet is sung: 'Be glad, let earth be glad as glory floods her, ablaze with light from her eternal King.' The resurrection itself is nowhere described in the gospels, but we do have appearances of the Risen Lord Jesus. The first appearance was to a woman, Mary of Magdala. A title given to her by the early church was 'Apostle to the Apostles' because she was the bearer of the message which the male disciples initially did not believe. But eventually they too believed that Death had been done to death because the Son had risen. Christ's body was transfigured by the energy of Divine Love and we can, by grace, participate in that resurrection life of Our Lord. A glorious destiny awaits us, as indeed it awaits the whole cosmos as it is to be transformed by that resurrection life recreating the whole of creation. We could take a moment to pray that we, along with all that matters, are graced with the life-giving energy of the Risen Son and that we may join Mary of Magdala in spreading the Good News of Christ's victory over death. 



him, crucify him on the cross". And of course, the poor kids were doing it with so much passion that we could all feel that the roof of the Church was nearly lifting up. After that, he asked them: "how do you feel?" together they answered: "we feel great!". Then, he told them that what they felt was exactly what the Pharisees and the enemies of Jesus felt at the time they condemned Jesus to death. Then, he invited them to shout again with a louder voice, but it seemed like half of the crowd kept silent this time. He asked: "why didn't you shout at Jesus?" one of them said: "you can't fool me this time, Father. I don't want to be called a Pharisee again."

Like the children in the story, we are afraid to be called one of the Pharisees. It is because we know they followed the letter of the Law and not the Spirit of the Law. As a result, they were always mentioned in the Gospels as those who challenged Jesus, refused to believe in what He taught and wanted to kill Him. We think we are actually not that bad. However, if we think Jesus died to save all humans from sin because of love, we should not ever commit sin in order to show our gratitude to the love that Jesus expressed through his dreadful death. In fact, we are still sinning. Therefore, at the moment that we commit to sin, we are joining with the club of Pharisees to refuse the relationship which we have with Jesus. We turn around and condemn Him as our enemy. As a result, we keep nailing Jesus on the Cross and we are not yet ready to see the Risen Lord; so that, our life has not yet been filled with the new spirit of the resurrection.

Therefore, as Christians during this Easter season, I invite you to ask yourselves these questions: "where am I in the journey of the Lord's Passion?", "what character or characters am I playing?", "if I am in that crowd, do I dare to raise my voice to save him?" and last but not least: "Am I ready to receive the Good News, the News of the Risen Lord?"

After all, let us learn from the beautiful heart of Mother Mary that we too, can be fulfilled with hope as we face the challenges of this earthly life. May her example of faith be our steppingstone, so that we are moving each day closer to the heart of Jesus.

We wish you and your loved ones a most blessed, joyful and hope-filled Easter season.

THE EASTER TRIDUUM

THE LITURGIES OF FIRE, LIGHT, the **WORD, BAPTISM and the EUCHARIST**

The liturgies of the Easter Triduum are filled with Symbols that invite us to enter into the great story of God's love that extends from the dawn of time to the dawn of Jesus, the Morning Star on Easter Morning. There is an ebb and flow in the ceremonies as hope washes over us, and then recedes in the face of denial, betrayal, human frailty and death, but returns in a new and powerful way in Jesus' rising.

HOLY THURSDAY NIGHT

The night before Jesus dies he gathers with his friends and as their Master, does something extraordinary - he washes their feet. This act of service shows us what perfect and complete love looks like. At the end of the liturgy, the church is stripped and left bare - a stark reminder to us as a Church to strip back power and focus on service and love as Jesus did.

GOOD FRIDAY

In this liturgy, after the Passion is proclaimed, the Cross is unveiled for us, calling us to veneration. The suffering servant is now revealed to us - Jesus who runs love's race to the finish, enduring death on a cross so that we might know that nothing can separate us from God's love.

HOLY SATURDAY

Gathering in darkness, our hope is rekindled in the blessing of the fire and the inscribing of the Paschal Candle that proclaims the victory of the crucified one of Alpha and Omega. "Christ our light" resounds in the darkness, and we receive the call to take that light into our lives and the world proclaiming:

HE IS RISEN INDEED! ALLELUIA!

The final word is not had by darkness and death, but by Hope and Love! (adapted from Chris Monaghan CP – It's all about Hope)

THE GREAT GIFT OF EASTER IS HOPE - CHRISTIAN HOPE, WHICH MAKES US HAVE THAT CONFIDENCE IN GOD, IN GOD'S ULTIMATE TRIUMPH, AND IN GOD'S GOODNESS AND LOVE, WHICH NOTHING CAN SHAKE.
