REFLECTION by Dianne Bergant CSA

This Sunday is traditionally known as Good Shepherd Sunday. Two major themes emerge from the readings: an image of the one who saves; and the power of salvation itself. The one

who saves is not a mighty warrior who comes in military array. In fact, he is the one who was rejected, who was hunted down, humiliated, tortured and hung naked on a tree, there to die in shame. The one who saves is the cornerstone of the building, holding it together, forming a firm foundation so that the structure will not collapse. The one who saves is a lowly shepherd, entrusted with sheep, not with the affairs of state. The one who saves is an unlikely saviour. This characterisation should give us pause. Is it possible that we have been looking for a saviour in the wrong places? God's saving power flows from steadfast covenant love. It broke open the world in the death and resurrection of Jesus and it overflows as healing grace. The saving power in the name of Jesus, a name that itself means 'saviour' (cf. Matt 1:21), is for all people, even for those sheep who do not yet belong to this fold. Furthermore, it is for all time; God's mercy endures forever. Through our baptism we can bring the saving grace of God to a world in desperate need of healing. We can do this in our families, in our local communities, in the workplace, in so many situations of our lives.

🚽 here was a pilgrim bus that went through a big farm where 🛭 you could see many cattle and flocks of sheep. The commentator saw this, and he started talking about the story of Jesus as the Good Shepherd. He mentioned the good shepherd was like Jesus who embraced his flock, called each one by name and protected them from dangers. While he was speaking about the good shepherd, there were a group of people who were chasing the sheep, some of them were tying the feet of the sheep with ropes.

The visitors on the bus saw that with great confusion, because the shepherd who the commentator has mentioned, was doing just the opposite with what they were seeing. Seeing this, the commentator felt so embarrassed and stopped the bus. He came down and said to those men on the farm: "I don't think you guys are like the good shepherd because he doesn't chase and torture the sheep the way you are doing". "Oh Sir," they replied, "we are not shepherds. We are butchers. I did not intend to say that the butcher is bad or immoral in

this story. But the point I am trying to make is the distinction between the Shepherd and the hired man which has also been mentioned in the Good Shepherd story of Jesus. In this story, Jesus gave the example of Himself as the Good Shepherd who lays down his life for his sheep. Conversely, Jesus also mentioned about the hired man, who works only for reward, thinks chiefly of money. He could be a good worker, who is earning a lot of money, but the good he earns is just the moral quality (agathos in Greek). But the word "good" that Jesus mentioned in the original text is *Kalos* which means that in goodness, there is a quality of winsomeness that makes it lovely. Therefore, there is more than efficiency and more than fidelity; there is loveliness. During Holy Week in Rome in 2013, Pope Francis mentioned the figure of the good shepherd as the one who lives with the smell of the sheep. In other words, he invited all ministers of the Church to learn from Jesus to be among the flock and listen to each of the individual's problems.

Therefore, it is a call for us to open our heart to love and embrace others in our community. It is also a call to respond to be a good shepherd to bring the Good News to our neighbour. On this day, the Church invites us to pray and give our support for the vocation of priesthood and religious orders. We pray that with God's help, they may learn to become the Good Shepherd who does not let suffering, persecution or rejection stop them from their responsibility of caring for the flock.

As we also celebrate Anzac Day this weekend. We offer our tribute to those who lay down their lives in military operations to save the lives of many. We give thanks for their good (Kalos) service. They have left their loved ones behind and faithfully served the country with much bravery, being ready to die for their country. Moreover, they have sacrificed their own safety for the peace of others like the good shepherd who cares for his flock. Lastly, may their souls and the souls of all departed through the mercy of God, Rest in Peace. Amen. Blessings,



2021 ANZAC DAY

Anzac Day is a national day of remembrance in Australia and New Zealand that broadly commemorates all Australians and New Zealanders "who served and died in all wars, conflicts, and peacekeeping operations" and "the contribution and suffering of all those who have served". Observed on 25 April each year, Anzac Day was originally devised to honour the members of the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps who served in the Gallipoli Campaign, their first engagement in the First World War, but now encompasses all those who have served and are still serving.



The word Anzac is part of the culture of Australia and New Zealand. People talk about the spirit of Anzac'; there are Anzac biscuits, and usually the two countries' rugby league teams play an Anzac Day test. The word conjures up the shared heritage of two nations, but it also has a specific meaning.


The Anzacs first saw action at Gallipoli on 25 April 1915. The small cove where the Australian and New Zealand troops landed was quickly dubbed Anzac Cove. Soon the word was being used to describe all the Australian and New Zealand soldiers fighting on the Gallipoli Peninsula. Later it came to mean any Australian or New Zealand soldier.

The term continued in use in later wars. An Anzac corps was briefly formed during the ill-fated 1941 campaign in Greece. During the Vietnam War, New Zealand and Australian infantry companies combined as the Anzac Battalion. No one knows who came up with the term Anzac. It is likely that Sergeant K.M. Little, a clerk in Birdwood's headquarters, thought of it for use on a rubber stamp: 'ANZAC' was convenient shorthand, and became the telegraph code word for the corps

With last year's gatherings largely scuttled by coronavirus lockdowns, this year, 2021, we will be able to march and pay tribute to our heroes who have served so selflessly and faithfully. To those who cannot attend, we are inviting you all to stand once again, at the end of your driveway and light a candle, shine a torch and show your support to our diggers.

We hold those who have served and given their lives for us and those currently serving in our hearts and prayers as we gather for Mass this weekend.
