Gospel Mk 4:26-34

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

The mustard seed, the smallest of all the seeds, grows into the biggest shrub of all.

Jesus said to the crowds, 'This is what the kingdom of God is like. A man throws seed on the land. Night and day, while he sleeps, when he is awake, the seed is sprouting and growing; how, he does not know. Of its own accord the land produces first the shoot, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. And when the crop is ready, he loses no time; he starts to reap because the harvest has come.' He also said, 'What can we say the kingdom of God is like? What parable can we find for it? It is like a mustard seed which at the time of its sowing in the soil is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; yet once it is sown it grows into the biggest shrub of them all and puts out big branches so that the birds of the air can shelter in its shade.'

Using many parables like these, he spoke the word to them, so far as they were capable of understanding it. He would not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything to his disciples when they were alone.

REFLECTION by Dianne Bergant CSA

The readings today remind us that poetic imagery is an apt way of describing the mysterious presence of God in our midst. The cedar began as a seedling that takes years to grow into a magnificent tree. The same is true of the mustard tree. It too requires time to develop its trunk and branches. The development of moral integrity in a human being is just as

gradual. Rooted in God, it flourishes in God's presence and it produces fruit even into old age. Although God is present in all things, sustaining them and allowing them to follow their natural courses, God really transcends all things. Metaphorical language may be the best means for speaking about God and the things of God. It enables us to live in the tension that both reveals something about God and conceals God's real nature.

The reign of God also begins in very ordinary circumstances, and it matures gradually until it has spread itself far and wide. Although the mystery of the reign of God unfolds within human history, we need eyes of faith to recognise it. Like the cedar and the mustard seed, it grows within the concreteness of human experience. Just as the life force that thrusts the branches of the trees further and further out cannot itself be seen, so the reign of God is mysterious, even incomprehensible. Still, it is there, inviting us, urging us to move forward, transforming our world.

11th Sunday in Ordinary Time -YEAR B

The parables that Jesus mentions today reminds me of a story that I read from the Spiritual Book of an Indian Jesuit Priest, Fr Anthony De Mello. The story begins with the scene of a woman who was dreaming during her sleep after a long day at work. She saw herself walk into a very busy supermarket. There was a special stall, called the Kingdom, at the corner which people had to form in a long queue. Looking into the counter, she was amazed because she saw Jesus working in that stall. She decided to join the queue, and she was patiently waiting until her turn.



She was so excited and asked Jesus: "Oh my Lord, you must be an outstanding businessman! But what are you selling?" Jesus answered: "My dear child, I sell everything that you wish."

Then she took a moment to think and then she answered: "Dear Lord, it is so lucky for me to see you here. Look! I am really weary with my life, so please give me some fruits of peace, love, happiness, wisdom and freedom." After thinking for a while, she added: "my husband and my children also cause me headache sometimes, so please give them the fruit to be more mature, to know how to cook, to wash and iron their own clothes..."

Jesus just smiled and responded to her request: "Oh my dear child, I don't sell fruit here but only seeds. So, you can grow them by yourself, but be assured that every seed that I give you has a lifetime warranty."

The story shows us a lesson that we should never be daunted by a small beginning. Jesus here invited the woman, and as well as those who came to his stall, or maybe you and me today, to receive the tiny seed and sow it in our lives with faith. By this action, the seed of faith can grow into a big tree, and it can produce many fruits. At the moment, it may seem that we can only produce a very small effect; but if that small effect is repeated and repeated, it will become very great. In other words, we often feel unsure about starting with something small to achieve some big goals. But we must remember that everything must have a beginning, and nothing emerges fully-grown. **Therefore, it is our duty to do our best, and we will leave the rest in the loving care of God.**

The readings today also mentioned the almighty of God. The prophet Ezekiel used the metaphor of a bulky cedar on the high mountain of Israel, where there is the home for every animal on earth, as the house of God. Moreover, St Paul mentioned in his letter to the Corinthians about the good life that can be found only in the house of God. Therefore, God is waiting for us to build our home in his heart so that the seed that we planted will flourish with His care, and then bear much more fruits.

We pray for our Church today, especially the Church in Australia which is going through the process of Plenary Council, that we may trust in God's care, listen to each other and be ready to go out and spread the seeds of the Good News to all the people. At the end, our Church can be a place for many people to make their home of **faith, hope and love.**

May the love of God be with us all and keep us warm during this winter season.




