Wherever you find jealousy and ambition, you find disharmony, and wicked things of every kind being done; whereas the wisdom that comes down from above is essentially something pure; it also makes for peace, and is kindly and considerate; it is full of compassion and shows itself by doing good; nor is there any trace of partiality or hypocrisy in it. Peacemakers, when they work for peace, sow the seeds which will bear fruit in holiness. Where do these wars and

battles between yourselves first start? Isn't it precisely in the desires fighting inside your own selves? You want something and you haven't got it; so you are prepared to kill. You have an ambition that you cannot satisfy; so you fight to get your way by force. Why you don't have what you want is because you don't pray for it; when you do pray and don't get it, it is because you have not prayed properly, you have prayed for something to indulge your own desires.

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SEASON OF CREATION by Nick Brodie

Today's Gospel reveals a fearfulness in the disciples' response to Jesus. Afraid of asking too many questions, they almost seem to prefer being ignorant rather than admit the limits of their own understanding. Strangely, this self-imposed ignorance does not prevent them from posturing for position. What a warning for the Church this episode seems to offer!

While this excerpt of Mark's Gospel is often interpreted in terms of the virtue of humility, the other aspect of Jesus' point is easily overlooked. Every Christian is called to be 'last of all and servant of all'. Ours is a faith of humble service.

The scriptures repeatedly make the point that faith is always embedded in creation. A mountain, a road, a town, and a house all frame the action in this episode. Because the Church exists wherever its members go our beliefs and prayers are not restricted to church buildings. We take our faith on roads, into our homes and towns, and even up mountains.

Given this, our faith compels us to have a special care for all of creation. As Jesus clearly intimates, by humbly serving created things we express our love of the Creator who made them all.

TWENTY FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR B

Have you ever had to correct or give bad news to someone? A child? A member of staff? A partner? It's not always easy, is it?

I had to give a young female worker some counselling regarding her supervisor's mid-year work performance assessment. We had hardly begun than she covered her ears; started crying; and blurted out: "I don't want to hear this." Fortunately I had some training in handling anxious behaviour. I managed to placate her.



It took some time. I was reminded of this incident while reading Mark's Gospel for this Sunday's Mass. I recalled in detail this girl's way of coping with the anxiety she felt at the prospect of bad news (real or imagined). "If I don't hear it, it doesn't exist." **Denial.**

Jesus & his disciples were on a road trip through Galilee. For the second time in as many weeks, Jesus tried to tell them about the inevitable cruel death he was to suffer & his subsequent resurrection. But they did not understand what he was saying. They were afraid to ask. They were anxious. They went into denial. They didn't want to hear bad news.

The group continued walking. Jesus went ahead. The disciples followed, arguing among themselves about who was the greatest. They fantasised about their future prospects under Jesus the Conquering Liberator, the Messiah. *Who would be Jesus's Chief Minister?* Their fantasising about their greatness suppressed anything Jesus had said about betrayal and suffering.

At their destination, Jesus tried once again to teach them that he was trying, through them, to set up a new kind of society. The power structure would be inverted. The leaders would be but trusted servants. Not for them, the pursuit of prestige, power & possessions. Jesus sat down, like a Rabbi about to give instruction.

He drew a small child into his arms. Children are at the bottom of society's pecking order. No power and influence here, yet Jesus equated the child with himself.

"Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me."

In fact Jesus went further. "Whoever welcomes me, welcomes not me, but the one who sent me."

The way to the Father is through Jesus, but the sure way to Jesus is through the poor, not the rich; the weak, not the strong; the ignored, not the celebrated.

Through our Baptism we share in the mission of Christ. We become his disciples.

Like Him we are to welcome, receive, embrace, earn the trust of those in need who cross our path. In the course of any one day, The Holy Spirit will let us know who they are, if we ask, in the name of Jesus.

HUMILITY

The Gospel of Mark this week recounts the disciples arguing about who was the greatest - they are rebuked by Jesus. The pandemic is revealing our strengths and our weaknesses and our fears and our anxieties.

Perhaps we are being called to reflect on what it might mean to be humble - to learn from and rely on others.

An insight

Humility gives us the sacred gift of being able to learn from everyone. It gives us the ability to take advice from any person who gives it, not just the brilliant or the holy or the great, but from the simple and the

ignorant and from those who may be far below our own position or station in life. It gives us the power to imitate Christ himself, who learned from Peter how to catch fish, and from Joseph how to make tables, and from Mary how to eat. It gives us the power to learn, even from those who do not appeal to us at all, whom we may not like very much.

The humble person knows they don't know all things, knows that good advice, no matter what the source, is a rare gift, a gift that helps develop the wonder of self-knowledge. Very often, it is from people we may not like very much, or from people who are a little nasty and mean, that we learn how deep our pride is in

reality and how far we still have to go before we have reached any real degree of humility. For such people will tell us what they think of us, will give us advice without bothering to be nice about it, will show us quite brilliantly and quite cuttingly, too, by the way, how proud we really are. Real humility will give us the

power to accept such words, and though they may hurt because we are still human, we will be able to take them and because of them grow even closer to Christ.
