What God has joined together, no one must divide.

Some Pharisees approached Jesus and asked, 'Is it against the law for a man to divorce his wife?' They were testing him. He answered them, 'What did Moses command you?' 'Moses allowed us' they said 'to draw up a writ of dismissal and so to divorce.' Then Jesus said to them, 'It was because you were so unteachable that he wrote this commandment for you. But from the beginning of creation God made them male and female. This is why a man must leave father and mother, and the two become one body. They are no longer two, therefore, but one body. So then, what God has united, man must not divide.' Back in the house the disciples questioned him again about this, and he said to them, 'The man who divorces his wife and marries another is guilty of adultery against her. And if a woman divorces her husband and marries another she is guilty of adultery too.'

People were bringing little children to him, for him to touch them. The disciples turned them away, but when Jesus saw this he was indignant and said to them, 'Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. I tell you solemnly, anyone who does not welcome the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it.' Then he put his arms round them, laid his hands on them and gave them his blessing.

Fully Grounded Humans

In storytelling genre, the inspired author of Genesis portrays God forming the first human creature from 'dust from the ground', which is 'Adamah' in Hebrew. The very breath of God is breathed into its nostrils. It has a soul so as to share the gift of Divine life. But before we become too heady, we find that the human being is called 'Adam' which means 'earth creature'. Human beings are created 'earthy'.

Pope Francis says: 'We have forgotten that we ourselves are dust of the earth (cf Gen2:7): our very bodies are made up of her elements, we breathe her air and we receive life and refreshment from her waters.' (2 Laudato Si' italics added). Where did the recurring 'her' come from? Listen to St Francis of Assisi in his Canticle of the Creatures: 'Praise be to you, my Lord, through our Sister, Mother Earth, who sustains and governs us, and who produces various fruit with coloured flowers and herbs.' This leads Pope Francis to say '... Our common home is like a sister with whom we share our life and a beautiful mother who opens her arms to embrace us.' (1 Laudato Si'). If this way of putting it is true (as I believe it is) then the degradation and wanton destruction of the environment is surely a type of domestic violence in our common home. It is family violence. A well-grounded human being will oppose domestic violence. Let us do so adopting the spiritual and practical ecology of St Francis of Assisi, adapted for our age by Pope



"Anyone who does not welcome the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it." (Mk 10:15) The Gospel of Mark today narrates the son that Jesus taught His disciples after the





Firstly, children are the perfect example of **trust**, **openness and dependence**. They put their trust in everyone they meet but mostly in their parents. They trust in their parents who put in their all to providing the best for them, and they receive everything as gift. Instinctively, they acknowledge that they cannot live without the nurturing of the people around them, especially their parents.

Secondly, children exemplify "short memory" - they are incapable of keeping grudges, malice, unforgiveness and bitterness as adult do. They are quick to forgive others.

Thirdly, children **adapt** easily to **unpredictable situations.** In the gospel story, family brought children to meet Jesus for blessing. For those children, Jesus is just a stranger whom they have never met before. But the children found their own way to enjoy His company; in fact, they came in front of Jesus to let him bless them. On the other side, when the children showed up to Jesus unexpectedly, the disciples did not know what was going on, but they did not want Jesus to be bothered because His Passion was waiting him in Jerusalem. But Jesus taught the disciples to be opened and welcome every moment like the little children.

Those characteristics of children are reflected in every form of discipleship and vocation. Because we are called to take a step into the unknown, we are required to have a profound act of trust, dependence, and openness – in relation to ourselves, others, and, most importantly, God. Living in this challenging time of the world where people are dealing with injustices, the ongoing global pandemic, other diseases, natural disasters... we learn to be more opened and accepting like little children in order to respond to those unexpected situations with peace and integrity. By welcoming God's kingdom like little children, we are able to welcome every moments as the grace of God.

In all vocations, especially the married life mentioned in the liturgy of the Word this Sunday, Jesus invites us to look deeper into our relationship with each other and see whether our relationships are **built upon God's foundation** which is **LOVE**. In the document *Familiaris Consortio* of Pope Saint John Paul II, the Holy Father mentioned the important of sacrifice for the Christian Family in the modern world: "Family communion can only be preserved and perfected through a great spirit of sacrifice. It requires, in fact, a ready and generous openness of each and all to understanding, to forbearance, to pardon, and to reconciliation."

Let us continue to pray and rely on Him for help. By **letting go and letting God**, our lives will be filled by His presence.



LIVING FAITH IN THE EVERYDAY

TOGETHER - THEY BECOME ONE

The Readings this weekend speak about Marriage which Fr Henri Caffarel, who founded the Teams of Our Lady Married Couples Movement described as 'Marriage is the only community founded on a sacrament'.

Teams of Our Lady – L'Equipes de Notre Dame was founded in France over 80 years ago and is a lay movement within the Church that offers couples companionship to grow in their relationship, deepen their faith and forge deep friendships. On September 18 over 165 couples (300+) people from Australia, New Zealand and the Philippines gathered via Zoom for the Oceania Conference. Bishop Steve Lowe of the Hamilton Diocese, New Zealand,

presented a very powerful Reflection on Amoris Laetitia - Hope and Support for Married Couples - Challenges Facing Catholic Marriage through the analogy with Covid. Bishop Steve suggested that Teams is the antidote to the Virus - 'whilst there may be a need for social distancing – there is never a need for spiritual distancing – Christ is always with us online, anytime, anyplace'. In Let us Dream, Pope Francis reminds us that we need a movement of people who know that we need each other and have a sense of responsibility to others...and to the world...every month 153,000 members of Teams meet together across 90 countries!'.

We were reminded:

- Marriage is so much more than a theology marriage is injected with the love of Christ.
- To pray the Letter of St Paul and make variations such as ~ Love is patient, Love is kind ...; God is patient, God is kind; and finsert your name or someone special to you] is patient ...
- Take time with your relationship take time to sit down regularly
- Teams is an antidote to the virus attacking marriage.

Couples shared throughout the gathering and the most powerful statement from one of the men was 'being brave enough to reveal my own heart' in relationships and in marriage.

As we reflect on the Scripture this weekend, whether we are married or not, whether or not we have been disappointed in love. let us pray for the grace to be brave enough each day to reveal our own hearts.
