REFLECTION by Dianne Bergant CSA

This Sunday's readings confront us with the need to make choices in life, choices for God. They also remind us that no significant choice is without its price. However, if we make the right choice, we are assured that we will be richly rewarded. We all want to be happy in life. We just don't always know which doors to open, and how far to enter them. We need wisdom for that. The more options that are open to us, the more difficult it is to choose, but choose we must. To choose one option is to relinquish the others. The young man in the gospel wanted eternal life. Surely there is nothing more worthy than that. However, the price he was asked to pay was more than he had expected, and he went away saddened. To choose is to face the consequences of the word of God, and sometimes this is as sharp as a two-edged sword. One of the mysteries of faith is the incomprehensible generosity of God. We choose wisdom instead of all of the good things of the world, and we receive these good things along with wisdom itself. We are asked to relinquish all of the things that we value, and we get them back a hundredfold. We are invited to take a step into the unknown. We are told that we will not fall. However, we are never sure of this until we take the step and discover that we have not fallen. God demands so much, but gives so much more.

The Power of Letting Go

Let go and let God is a common parlance, in modern times. This is used in different contexts with different meanings including the need to surrender and totally trust in God. In this weekend's Gospel, we are presented with the story of an unnamed rich person, confronted by the reality of letting go (and letting God). Mark described him as a rich man (Matthew tells us he was also a young man) who ran up, knelt before Jesus asking, 'Good master', what must I do to inherit eternal life? (10:17). In the Old Testament (and in First Century Judaism) was the popular idea that wealth and possessions were signs of divine blessing.



Despite his wealth and youth, he felt there was something still lacking in his heart which made him unsatisfied. He's struggling to be a better person. He must have perceived that there was more to Jesus than meets the eye, something exceptional about him, as such he approached Jesus, hoping to find answers.

TWENTY EIGHTH WEEK IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR B

Jesus first questions the individual for calling him "good" as that applies to God alone. Jesus is neither denying that he himself was "good" nor denying his divinity but posing a question that invites the person to see beyond the appearances of just another good teacher among many. It will be a challenge to the person to see that Jesus is indeed the one God who is good and just, who has come to the world as man to give salvation to his people (CCC 2544-2546, 2728).

Jesus then tells him to keep the commandments, specifically those referring to love of neighbour. He is disappointed by Jesus' answer since he already does that, indeed, from his youth. Jesus was filled with love for him, for keeping the commandments is good and necessary, but only as part of something more, viz., detachment from worldly goods in spiritual poverty and discipleship. Jesus, then demanded of him to let go of his material possessions and to come follow him, unhappy about letting go, he went away feeling sad unable to accept the true power and freedom in letting go and letting God.

What makes us Christian is following Christ, not moral law which, although necessary, is a secondary consequence of the primacy of personal relationship with Christ initiated through baptism. It is our personal response to God who loves us first and takes us to the heart of the gospel. The individual in the gospel was not ready for that and went away sad for he had a blind spot, namely, attachment to his personal wealth and Jesus saw that. God has given us the gifts of creation, and things of this world to help us fulfill our mission and purpose of sharing in His life and love especially with the less fortunate. When these get in the way then it's time to let them go (CCC 2547).

Letting go can be a difficult human experience. Letting go of the past, memories, positions of power, plans, hurts, places, treasures, people and in the case of the rich person in the gospel, his hard-earned wealth, can be confronting, challenging and fearful, probably for the sake of life, safety, and security. However, there is enormous power and freedom in letting go. We can be weighed down, stocked in, and possessed by our attachments. Also, progress can be halted, gains forfeited, satisfaction denied, healing prevented, successes blocked, human growth and development stunted, opportunities missed, peace disturbed, a better future compromised, and salvation lost when we refuse to let go. In our lives as individuals, what do we need to let go? As a people called to discipleship, what do we need to let go? As we brace up for re-opening, what do we need to let go of, to be open to the new-normal? There is power and freedom in letting go. We are therefore, invited to let go and let God.

WHAT IS THE MISSION TODAY?

Throughout this week the First Session of the Plenary Council has been in process. It has been a privilege to be able to join in the daily Masses from across Australia which were followed by an Open Session where the feedback from group discussions the day before were shared and insights were presented.

Day 3 there was a focus on **Mission** - October is also the month of Mission

Rev Dr Richard Lennan (priest of the Diocese of Newcastle-Maitland & lecturer at Boston College) inspired all gathered with insights about Mission - some excerpts below: When we talk about Mission, we need an integral ecology understanding how mission is connected to the wider experience of all.

Church is missionary because God is missionary and God's mission is Self-Gift. God is life-giving ~ calling us all to a life beyond our own imagining - to a life in Jesus - invited into God's own life and to share that with others.

The Mission is in the Present - we need to be in the Present! The world of which we are a part is God's world - it is a graced world! We need to 'sniff out the presence of God

in the world and celebrate it!' We are called to be 'light for the nations' - Lumen Gentium (Vatican 11) ~ to listen ~ to discern ~ to be

alive!

The theologian, Elizabeth Johnson reflects: 'The Spirit represents life, movement, colour, radiance and restorative stillness in the din!
