Israel was called by God. To what was Israel called? To what were the crowds who followed Jesus called? To what are we called? To a covenant relationship with the Lord who is God, the one who is Lord alone. We have been invited into an intimate personal relationship with the creator of the universe, the one who plays with black holes and white dwarfs and at the same time with infinite interest has numbered the very hairs on our head (cf. Matt 10:30). We have heard this so often that it may have become commonplace. The marvel of it may escape our attention, because it has become just a part of our religious

language. It is well that once in a while we are shaken to our senses, 'Hear, O Israel! The Lord is your God, the Lord alone!'

It is not marvel enough that this mysterious God has created us; we have also been redeemed. As victimpriest Jesus has offered himself on our behalf. He is the sacrifice that sealed the covenant; his blood was the expiation for our sins; he is our rock, our fortress, our deliverer, our shield, our stronghold. Only one thing is asked of us in return: that we open ourselves to him and cling to the covenant, that we proclaim with all our hearts 'The Lord is our God, the Lord alone!' 

A month where strength." we needed to concentrate not only on those who have suffered and needed our help, but to AVE DEUTERONOMY 6:5 heed the call of Pope Francis .. 'to go forth to the peripheries of our world as messengers and agents of compassion.' It is a reminder that the Mission for all of us is to Listen and then Act with conviction!

The language of the First Reading is one of plenty. The Commandments seen as life giving. The whole history of the Old Testament was a journey of 'forgetting God's great love and then being reconciled.' I guess we could put ourselves in that catagory but we are so much more blessed to know that Christ our High Priest has spoken for us! Your True Self, God's Love in you, cannot be exhausted. Material gifts decrease when you give them away. Spiritual gifts, by contrast, increase the more you use them. Yes! You get more love by letting it flow through you, just as modelled by the Trinity. If you love, you will become more loving. If you practice patience, you will become more patient.' Richard Rohr So, as we move to respond to the Synodal Process let us do it with confidence that we are great Lovers and moved by the knowledge that we are doing God's work.

In celebrating All Saints Day and All Souls this week let our true missionary spirt lead us to bring others -neighbours - on our journey. God bless, Sr. Marie

LIVING FAITH IN THE EVERYDAY



YOU SHALL LOVE THE LORD YOUR GOD

On the eve of the celebration of All Saints and All Souls and the month of November we are reminded of God's fundamental law of Love.

What is our image of God? How do we understand God's love?

Fr Ron Rolheiser OMI offers us some wisdom in response to these questions which is comforting as we remember our departed loved ones.

Meeting God Without Fear

Some years ago, I had a dream that I was asked to go to an airport and pick up Jesus, who was arriving on a flight.

I was understandably nervous and frightened. A bevy of apprehensions beset me: How would I recognize him? What would he look like? How would he react to me? What would I say to him? Would I like what I saw? More frightening yet, would he like what he saw when he looked at me?

But this was a good dream and it taught me as much about God as I'd learned in all my vears of studying theology. All my fears were alleviated in a second. What happened was the opposite of all my expectations: Suddenly, walking down the corridor towards me was Jesus, smiling, beaming with delight, coming straight for me, rushing, eager to meet me. Everything about him was stunningly and wonderfully disarming. There was no awkward moment; everything about him erased that. His eves, his face, and his body embraced me without reserve and without judgement. I knew he saw straight through me, knew all my faults and weaknesses, my lack of substance, and none of it mattered.

We live with too much fear of God. Partly its bad theology, but mostly we fear because we've never experienced the kind of love that's manifest in God and we take for granted that anyone who sees us as we really are (in our unloveliness, weaknesses, pathology, sin, insubstantiality) will, in the end, be as disappointed with us as we are with ourselves.

> At the end of the day, we expect that God is disappointed with us and will greet us with a frown. The tragedy and sadness here is that because we think that God is disappointed in us, especially at those times when we are disappointed with ourselves, we try to avoid meeting the one person, one love, and the one energy, God, that understands us, accepts us, delights in us, and is eager to smile at us.
