She was setting off to bring it when he called after her. 'Please' he said, 'bring me a scrap of bread in your hand.' 'As the Lord your God lives'. she replied, 'I have no baked bread, but only a handful of meal in a jar and a little oil in a jug; I am just gathering a stick or two to go and prepare this for myself and my son to eat, and then we shall die.' But Elijah said to her, 'Do not be afraid, go and do as you have said; but first make a little scone of it for me and bring it to me, and then make some for yourself and for your son. For thus the Lord speaks, the God of Israel: "Jar of meal shall not be spent, jug of oil shall not be emptied, before the day when the Lord sends rain on the face of the earth." The woman went and did as Elijah told her and they ate the food, she, himself and her son. The jar of meal was not spent nor the jug of oil emptied, just as the Lord had foretold through Elijah. 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# **REFLECTION** by Fr Michael Tate The Widow's Mite

This is the most commonly misunderstood passage in the Gospels. It is usually read in a 'pat on the back' tone of voice, commending the widow for her generosity. But it should be read with the tone of white hot anger which Jesus had displayed against the money dealers whom he expelled from the temple only days earlier. This vulnerable widow was exploited and brainwashed by the scribes and temple authorities so that she gave 'all she had to live on'. She was left destitute, unable to afford the necessities of life. On the contrary, Jesus wanted to create a band of followers who would look after widows and orphans. Look at Acts 4:32-37 to see that in operation. In fact, deacons were created in the early Church precisely to care for non-Jewish widows. The message for the Church from this Gospel story is that it must never exploit the religious fervour of the poor to build up its own resources. Pope Francis is emphasising that the flow must be the other way if we are to be authentic Christians. We could pause a moment to pray that, imitating the earliest Christian communities, our parish practises true concern for the marginalised and vulnerable, ensuring that they have all the necessities of life in all its dimensions.

# In November, we remember

November is the last month in the season of spring in some parts of the Southern Hemisphere. A season of new life and regrowth. In Australia, November is always remembered for the Melbourne Cup in Flemington with an extended celebration of the winning Horse and this year is: Verry Elleegant and Remembrance Day on November 11th at 11am.

In this season of new life, and during this month of November, the Church, celebrates the triumph of God's Grace in the Saints on the 1<sup>st</sup>, giving thanks for their courageous witness, and dedicates time to praying for the dead on the  $2^{nd}$ . The practice of honoring the saints and remembering the departed souls has been part of the ancient tradition of the Church, enshrined in the Canon of the Eucharist.

All Saints Day is intended to honour the memory of countless, known, unknown and uncanonized saints who have no designated feast days in the Liturgical Calendar. During the Feast, we unite with the church in heaven to give thanks to God for a share in His Beatific Vision, the reward for their Faith. In observing the feast, we are invited to honour the saints, by imitating their virtuous lives and seeking their intercession before Christ, the only mediator between God and humanity (I Tm 2:5).

In Commemorating All Souls on November 2<sup>nd</sup>, the Church invites the baptized to remember the Dead, and to offer prayers for those who have gone before us, to find respite in God's presence. It is a day specially set apart that we may remember and pray for our dear ones who have gone for their eternal reward and who are currently in a state of ongoing purification in purgatory.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC # 1032) recommends prayer for the deceased in conjunction with the offering of the Eucharistic Sacrifice. Pope Leo XIII in his encyclical, Mirae caritatis (1902), states, "The grace of mutual love among the living, strengthened and increased by the Sacrament of the Eucharist, flows, especially by virtue of the Sacrifice [of the Mass], to all who belong to the Communion of Saints. The Catechism also encourages almsgiving, indulgences, and works of penance undertaken on behalf of the dead. All these acts are to be exercised as matters of Faith, in the hope that those who sleep in peace will experience eternity in God's presence and in turn, intercede for us.

However young or old we are, none of us is ever new to the experience of losing someone: Grandparents, parents, partners, spouses, siblings, children, friends, colleagues, neighbors, extended family members, acquaintances etc. We grieve their loss and honour their memories in different ways. We offer masses, light candles, visit burial sites, place roses, and pray the rosaries. Like the widow in Mark's Gospel, who put in her all in remembrance and in hope of the husband's salvation, let us remember our deceased families and friends this November, lest we forget.
