#### **Gospel Acclamation**

Gospel Jn 2:1-11 A reading from the holy Gospel according to John The first of the signs given by Jesus was at Cana in Galilee. There was a wedding at Cana in Galilee. The mother of Jesus was there, and Jesus and his disciples had also been invited. When they ran out of wine, since the wine provided for the wedding was all finished, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' Jesus said, 'Woman, why turn to me? My hour has not come yet.' His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he tells you.' There were six stone water jars standing there, meant for the ablutions that are customary among the Jews; each could hold twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to the servants, 'Fill the jars with water,' and they filled them to the brim. 'Draw some out now' he told them, 'and take it to the steward.' They did this; the steward tasted the water, and it had turned into wine. Having no idea where it came from – only the servants who had drawn the water knew – the steward called the bridegroom and said, 'People generally serve the best wine first, and keep the cheaper sort till the guests have had plenty to drink, but you have kept the best wine till now.' This was the first of the signs given by



#### **REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate Unsung Heroes**

Today's gospel ends: 'He let his glory be seen.' Where? In a nondescript Galilean village at a wedding feast about to become a disaster for the couple. The wine is running out. A fiasco is impending. A hero was needed to step in and save the situation. Jesus and Mary are good candidates for hero status. But, it is the servants who are the unsung heroes. They take a huge risk. They are going to look utterly stupid if they give the steward water to ladle out. Nevertheless, they follow the stranger's directions exactly and end up serving the best of wines, saving the couple from terrible embarrassment. The Divine Glory is not going to enter people's lives with great pyrotechnics. Rather, when we do as Jesus requires, even if it looks ridiculous to the crowd, His healing and enhancing Presence can enter and save a situation of apparent disaster We could pause for a moment to pray for a certain naïve trust in the Lord as we follow his directions, so that Cana may enter someone's life, so that His glory may be seen.

# WATER INTO WINE

Because I believe it is beneficial to use my imagination when I am reading a passage from scripture, I try see if I can read the episode as a short drama. Where does the scene take place? Who are the main characters? What roles do they play? Any minor characters? Any extras? Is there any conflict or confrontation? (Always good for a bit of drama!) Is it resolved? Has it a social or a moral or a religious message?

Today's Gospel (John 2: 1-12) presents a problem that could happen at any rural Jewish wedding in the first century A.D. For whatever reason the supply of wine has run out. A social disaster for the groom's father who traditionally is responsible for arranging the marriage of the young couple and the wedding celebration. To fail to provide enough food and/or drink for the invited guests did not bode well for the bride's future.

I can imagine the murmuring and muttering starting among the guests as the servants are slow to re-fill the empty goblets. Mary, the mother of Jesus, good neighbour that she is, tells her son. While Jesus's reply may appear dismissive, "Woman, why turn to me?", the fact that Mary then tells the servants: "Do whatever he tells you," indicates that she expects Jesus will help. And help he does.

St John Paul 2 thought this miracle so significant he nominated it as the Second Luminous Mystery of the Rosary - Christ's self-revelation at the Marriage at Cana. John the Evangelist says of it "This was the first of the signs given by Jesus .... He let his glory be seen, and his disciples believed in him."


The miracles that are recorded later in the four Gospels - those concerned with healing illnesses, feeding the hungry, controlling natural events, or raising the dead were quite public and news of them spread rapidly. Here, as far as we know, only the servants who obeyed Jesus's instruction to fill six huge stone jars with water knew what really happened.

We note Mary's initiative and the disciples begin to realise that Jesus had powers that were divine in origin. Later commentators have read the scene as a living parable.

God the Creator Father has sent his Son to take his Chosen People, the Jewish nation, as his bride. He wants them to enjoy life; to be happy, joyous and free like guests at a wedding feast. His teaching will be like new wine. A journey of joys and sorrows and luminosity lies ahead.

The hosts of this wedding at Cana in Galiee had run out of an important ingredient for their celebration, and Mary intercedes for them. In ancient Judaism, weddings would last for a whole week (Judg 14:12; Tb 11:19)-the festival was seven days of feasting with family and friends gathered to celebrate the coming together of a bridegroom and his bride; wine is a symbol of joy and adds to the warmth of the celebration. So, it would be easy to run

out of food or wine, as Mary notices here that the depletion of wine has become a problem for the host. She makes an implicit request to Jesus 'They have no wine.' (CCC 1613)

Mary appears perfectly confident that Jesus will respond favourably to her request. This incident gives us an earthly sign of her heavenly role in bringing our needs to her Son. Jesus turns water-symbolic of the rituals of the Old Covenant-into wine, symbolic of the gift of the Holy Spirit in the New Covenant. The wine he made was better than what they had before and was more abundant than they needed. Here is solid scriptural basis for the intercessory power of Our Lady, and for her role in the lives of Christians everywhere. It is timely that we encourage the faithful to renew devotion to Our Lady in their lives, and in the lives of their families; that Mary might intercede for them, guiding them to Christ, teaching them to be more like him (CCC 2617-2619, 2634-2636).

John singles out Jesus' action at the wedding at Cana as the first miracle of his public ministry; he uses the Greek word semeion (a sign) to describe miracles that are performed by Jesus that are outward signs of an invisible spiritual significance or spiritual reality-in this case, his "hour" of the Cross. Some light is thrown on this in Isaiah (25:1-9) saying that when the age of salvation comes, there will be a feast of fine well-strained wines, and all the nations will come to this feast, and that when they drink of this wine and eat of this sacrificial banquet, they will swallow up death forever and their sins will be forgiven. In Jewish tradition it came to become called the "messianic banquet", the banquet of the messiah, which would be particularly characterized by super abundant wine.

Awareness of Jesus' impending passion and death is present throughout John's Gospel. The language used in today's reading (Jn 2:1-11), when Jesus protests his mother's wishes saving that his "hour" has not vet come, is anticipating his passion: a sign also of the final wedding feast of God and his people. We see that language also when John reports Jesus' Last Supper with his disciples and washing their feet (13:1-5); he writes that Jesus knew then that his "hour" had come, viz., the appointed time for his Passion and Death.

After Cana Mary is not mentioned until, along with her sister Mary, the wife of Clopas Mary of Magdala, and the disciple whom he loved all stand with Jesus who, in his final hour, is near death on the Cross (19:25-27). Jesus entrusts his mother to the beloved disciple and the beloved disciple to her. Thus, the beloved disciple represents all disciples, indicating the relationship all we Christians now have with Mary mother of Christ and mother of the Churchour spiritual mother in Christ (CCC 963, 970). We see here the nascent Christian community which, from now on to the end of time, remains the power of God active in the Church, in a community of believers.

Our first reading from the prophet Isaiah (62:1-5) is a prophecy of the New Jerusalem, describing the Age of Salvation, in which the city of Jerusalem (Zion) would be made even more glorious than it was at the time of Solomon. Jerusalem is depicted as a woman, as a bride; and God, the Lord, is depicted as her groom, her husband, the divine bridegroom. Speaking to Jerusalem directly, he urges vigilance for the last day. It has a vivid Scriptural image, (sign) for the spousal relationship between God and his people: "Like a young man marrying a virgin, your rebuilder will wed you, and as the bridegroom rejoices in his bride, so will your God rejoice in you" (62:5). John will show that Jesus' provision of abundant wine for the wedding feast in Cana signifies that the day foreseen by Isaiah has arrived, and how Jesus himself is the bridegroom, who gives everything in love for his bride. "These [signs] are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name" (20:31; 1 Jn 5:13). (CCC 219, 1611)

In the second reading (1 Cor 12:4-11), Paul addresses the church he founded in Corinth (the capital city of the Grecian province of Achaia) along with Silas and Timothy c. AD 50 -51. The Corinthians were a boisterous lot, tending to be a factional, divisive community especially around the charismatic gifts, with members acting in competition with one another for personal self-gratification rather than charitably for the unity of the community. Paul explains that as every good thing we have comes from God, we are to use our gifts and talents for the good of others thus allowing God to work through us as God's family in the world (CCC 249, 308). The judgement of the Church ensures that the common good is served by the charismatic gifts of the baptised (CCC 801, 873, 951, 1508). Fr. Martins
