A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

There are three things that last: faith, hope and love; and the greatest of these is love.

Be ambitious for the higher gifts. And I am going to show you a way that is better than any of them. If I have all the eloquence of men or of angels, but speak without love, I am simply a gong booming or a cymbal clashing. If I have the gift of prophecy, understanding all the mysteries there are, and knowing everything, and if I have faith in all its fullness, to move mountains, but without love, then I am

nothing at all. If I give away all that I

possess, piece by piece, and if I even let them take my body to burn it, but am without love, it will do me no good whatever. Love is always patient and kind; it is never jealous; love is never boastful or conceited; it is never rude or selfish: it does not take offence, and is not resentful. Love takes no pleasure in other people's sins but delights in the truth; it is always ready to excuse, to trust, to hope, and to endure whatever comes. Love does not come to an end. But if there are gifts of prophecy, the time will come when they must fail; or the gift of languages, it will not continue for ever; and knowledge – for this, too, the time will come when it must fail. For our knowledge is imperfect and our prophesying is imperfect; but once perfection comes, all imperfect things will disappear. When I was a child, I used to talk like a child, and think like a child, and argue like a child, but now I am a man, all childish ways are put behind me. Now we are seeing a dim reflection in a mirror; but then we shall be seeing face to face. The knowledge that I have now is imperfect; but then I shall know as fully as I am known. And he went on, 'I tell you solemnly, no prophet is ever accepted in his own country There were many widows in Israel, I can assure you, in Elijah's day, when heaven remained shut for three years and six months and a great famine raged throughout the land, but Elijah was not sent to any one of these: he was sent to a widow at

Zarephath, a Sidonian town. And in the prophet Elisha's time there were many lepers in Israel, but none of these was cured, except the Syrian, Naaman.' When they heard this everyone in the synagogue was enraged. They sprang to their feet and hustled him out of the town; and they took him up to the brow of the hill their town was built on, intending to throw him down the cliff, but he slipped through the crowd and walked away.

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REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate **God-given Identity**

Nazara was a village of 300-400 people and it had a small town mentality. The inhabitants were enraged when Jesus found good precedent for extending his saving mission to foreigners outside the community of the Chosen People. Jesus embodied the boundarybreaking nature of God's grace. Many Christians recite the old formula: 'No salvation outside the Church.' But we Catholics believe that, by responding to God's (often anonymous) grace, a person can lead a good life which prepares them for heavenly glory. This means that the billions around the world who will never hear the Gospel, or who hear it distorted through the megaphone of an alien culture, can be saved. There is no limit/boundary to the Merciful God's finding a way into the hearts of all human beings. We could take a moment to pray in gratitude for our graced privilege of being members of the Church, nourished within it by the Sacraments and the Gospel, but whose boundaries can never circumscribe the mercy of God.






Bench Ministry By Request

FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - YEAR C

The three Readings in the Mass today are very personal to us all. When God speaks to the people in the Old Testament and especially to the Prophets, in this case, Jeremiah, we have to know that God is speaking to us personally. The beautiful words, 'Before I formed you in the womb I knew you' would always bring us great joy if only we believed it!!! Yes God is asking big things of Jeremiah, but when God asks deeds of us we are always given the necessary graces to comply and God will always be with us. We can often wonder



about that. Life does throw up many difficulties but the great fact is that God remains with us no matter what. Do we sometimes forget that?

We have often heard the beautiful hymn to love in St Paul's reading to the Corinthians. Try replacing the 'word' love with 'Christ' in your prayer.. it just may help you understand that is what God is. We hear that often enough too... God is Love.

Some of the most important lines in Paul's letter: 'If I have all the eloquence of great speakers or of angels, but speak without love, I am simply a gong booming or a cymbal clashing; faith , without love, understanding, without love. prophecy without love ..all a complete waste. Sometimes we can forget the most basic. Our Spiritual Life is useless without Love. This Love is the one that forgives, that does not judge, that gives a person a fair go etc. The word Love is often thrown around without understanding its effect on our actions. Who wants to sound like a gong booming?

The Gospel follows on from last Sunday when Jesus begins his public life of preaching. At first the hearers were amazed at this man's gracious words... but... hang on... this is Joseph's Son...this can't be right! The penny drops and the listeners begin doubting that any good could come from a local. Do we sometimes judge our neighbours, our locals and put them in a box before we really hear 'their gracious words'?

This week as we slowly get into the New Year, still combatting Covid, try and take God at God's Word and really take time to reflect on the goodness around us, in our family, our work mates, our beautiful landscape and join with the Psalmist: 'It is you, O Lord, who are my hope, my trust, O Lord from my youth. On you I have leaned from birth, from my mother's womb you have been my help.'

LIVING FAITH IN THE EVERYDAY The Vocation of the Prophet

A true prophet is one who speaks on behalf of God, telling the people of Israel what they do not want to hear after they have broken God's Covenant and, consequently, need to repent. The prophet's denouncement angers Jewish authorities or the gathered crowd turning them against him - often violently. We see this in today's first reading (Jer 1:4-5,17-19).

It tells the story of Jeremiah's calling and God's prediction that he is going to be opposed to the point of rejection by his own people in Jerusalem. Jeremiah had invited deeper trust that a Saviour will come. It is clear to Jeremiah that they are not going to repent, but still his task remains to preach the truth to them and proclaim the message of repentance or face the destruction of the city of Jerusalem. Jeremiah met with constant opposition as the Jerusalem priests and leaders did not repent; they even tried to kill him. Still Jeremiah remained convinced that God's will is inevitable, intractable, inviolable; it will be done despite human efforts to thwart it. Eventually Jerusalem was destroyed (c. B.C. 587), the people deported to Babylon and the temple burned to the ground. The people had to learn the hard way before they repented in sackcloth and ashes and returned to God.

Today's Ps 71, a prayer for lifelong protection and help during persecution, is meant to give us hope since for God is our rock and refuge no matter what happens in life by way of opposition and persecution – 'I will sing of your salvation'! It links the prophet Jeremiah, and the suffering and persecution he faced, to Jesus who's rejected in Nazareth and who'll ultimately face the cross. We see that it's of little use putting trust in our own power for it is God only who has the power to save (cf. Mt 5:11-12).

The parallels between the rejection of Jeremiah and the rejection of Jesus in Nazareth will become clearer from today's Gospel reading onwards: both were outstanding and prophetic (Lk 4:21-30 cf. Mt 16:13-14; Mk 13). Jesus is the fulfillment of the Old Testament prophecy of Jeremiah as the Saviour who has now come amongst his people as the 'new' Jeremiah. Having just read from the prophet Isaiah in the synagogue at Nazareth, Jesus concludes: 'This text is being fulfilled today even while you are listening.' We'd expect that to have made the people joyful but, due to their pride, many are not.

Although the initial response to Jesus was positive as these villagers of Nazareth had known Jesus his whole life: 'he won the approval of all, and they were astonished by the gracious words that came from his lips' Yet Jesus knows that they will not believe until he gives a sign in his own hometown as he had at Capernaum on the northern shore of the Sea of Galilee. Jesus continues: "In truth I tell you, no prophet is ever accepted in his own country." What really angers the crowd is Jesus quoting instances of God's care being shown to those outside His 'chosen people' – to Gentiles, bypassing the wicked Israelites.
