#### Gospel Lk 23:1-49

The elders of the people and the chief priests and scribes rose, and they brought Jesus before Pilate. They began their accusation by saying, 'We found this man inciting our people to revolt, opposing payment of tribute to Caesar, and claiming to be Christ, a king.' Pilate put to him this question, 'Are you the king of the Jews?' 'It is you who say it' he replied. Pilate then said to the chief priests and the crowd, 'I find no case against this man.' But they persisted, 'He is inflaming the people with his teaching all over Judaea; it has come all the way from Galilee, where he started, down to here.' When Pilate heard this, he asked if the man were a Galilean; and finding that he came under Herod's jurisdiction he passed him over to Herod who was also in Jerusalem at that time. Herod was delighted to see Jesus; he had heard about him and had been wanting for a long time to set eyes on him; moreover, he was hoping to see some miracle worked by him. So he questioned him at some length; but without getting any reply. Meanwhile the chief priests and the scribes were there, violently pressing their accusations. Then Herod, together with his guards, treated him with contempt and made fun of him; he put a rich cloak on him and sent him back to Pilate. And though Herod and Pilate had been enemies before, they were reconciled that same day. Pilate then summoned the chief priests and the leading men and the people. 'You brought this man before me' he said 'as a political agitator. Now I have gone into the matter myself in your presence and found no case against the man in respect of all the charges you bring against him. Nor has Herod either, since he has sent him back to us. As you can see, the man has done nothing that deserves death, so I shall have him flogged and then let him go.' But as one man they howled, 'Away with him! Give us Barabbas!' (This man had been thrown into prison for causing a riot in the city and for murder.) Pilate was anxious to set Jesus free and addressed them again, but they shouted back, 'Crucify him! Crucify him!' And for the third time he spoke to them, 'Why? What harm has this man done? I have found no case against him that deserves death, so I shall have him punished and then let him go.' But they kept on shouting at the top of their voices,

their shouts were growing louder. Pilate then gave his verdict: their demand was to be granted. He released the man they asked for, who had been imprisoned for rioting and murder, and handed Jesus over to them to deal with as they pleased. As they were leading him away they seized on a man, Simon from Cyrene, who was coming in from the country, and made him shoulder the cross and carry it behind Jesus. Large numbers of people followed him, and of women too, who mourned and lamented for him. But Jesus turned to them and said. 'Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me; weep rather for yourselves and for your children. For the days will surely come when people will say, "Happy are those who are barren, the wombs that have never borne, the breasts that have never suckled!" Then they will begin to say to the mountains, "Fall on us!"; to the hills, "Cover us!" For if men use the green wood like this, what will happen when it is dry?' Now with him they were also leading out two other criminals to be executed. When they reached the place called The Skull, they crucified him there and the two criminals also, one on the right, the other on the left. Jesus said, 'Father forgive them; they do not know what they are doing.' Then they cast lots to share out his clothing. The people stayed there watching him. As for the leaders, they jeered at him. 'He saved others,' they said 'let him save himself if he is the Christ of God, the Chosen One.' The soldiers mocked him too and when they approached to offer him vinegar they said, 'If you are the king of the Jews, save yourself.' Above him there was an inscription 'This is the King of the Jews.' One of the criminals hanging there abused him. 'Are you not the Christ?' he said. 'Save yourself and us as well.' But the other spoke up and rebuked him. 'Have you no fear of God at all?' he said. 'You got the same sentence as he did, but in our case we deserved it; we are paying for what we did. But this man has done nothing wrong. Jesus,' he said 'remember me when you come into your kingdom.' 'Indeed, I promise you,' he replied 'today you will be with me in paradise.' It was now about the sixth hour and, with the sun eclipsed, a darkness came over the whole land until the ninth hour. The veil of the Temple was torn right down the middle; and when Jesus had cried out in a loud voice, he said, 'Father, into your hands I commit my spirit.' With these words he breathed his last. All kneel and pause a moment. When what had happened, they went home beating their breasts. All his friends stood at a distance; so also did the women who had accompanied him from Galilee, and they saw all this happen

# PALM SUNDAY - YEAR C

Today the Church begins the most solemn week in the Liturgical year, Holy Week. On this day the Church recalls the triumphant entrance of Christ into Jerusalem to accomplish his Paschal Mystery.

The liturgy of Palm Sunday portrays a most shocking contrast of experiences and emotions. At the beginning of the Mass, we bless palms and hear the Gospel that recounts the triumphant entrance of Jesus where he was welcomed with great joy and exultation. As we progress in the liturgy this excitement



soon turns to shock and horror where Jesus will cry out to the Father and take his last breath.

This contrast is stark as it is abrupt, yet this contrast is not unfamiliar to us. How many of us have travelled along in life with joy, optimism and hope to suddenly be confounded by loss, tragedy, or illness, which has left us questioning the seemingly stable foundations on which our lives were built to that point?

You see, the story which begins on Palm Sunday is not merely a commemoration of historical events. What we participate in today and this whole week *is* the human drama; it is my story and it is your story. As Jesus enters his final week, he takes all of humanity with him. We are not just spectators to these events. We, as members of Christ are intimately joined to him and all of us in a unique and very personal way share in his suffering, death, and resurrection.

I invite us all to enter more deeply into the Paschal Mysteries this week and allow these mysteries to speak to and resonate with us in our own personal situations. This week, permit Jesus to reveal himself to you in his vulnerability; in his betrayal from friends, in his abandonment, and in his loneliness.

Whatever our situation, let us journey into the discomfort of Holy Week together, knowing that our God, our brother and our friend, Jesus Christ, goes before us and with us and is leading us on to the joys of Easter.

#### THE LITURGIES OF FIRE, LIGHT, the WORD, **BAPTISM** and the EUCHARIST

The liturgies of the Easter Triduum are filled with symbols that invite us to enter into the great story of God's love that extends from the dawn of time to the dawn of Jesus. the Morning Star on Easter Morning. There is an ebb and flow in the ceremonies as hope washes over us, and then recedes in the face of denial, betrayal, human frailty and death, but returns in a new and powerful way in Jesus' rising.

#### **HOLY THURSDAY NIGHT**

The night before Jesus dies he gathers with his friends and as their Master, does something extraordinary – he washes their feet. This act of service shows us what perfect and complete love looks like. At the end of the liturgy, the church is stripped and left bare – a stark reminder to us as a Church to strip back power and focus on service and love as Jesus did.

#### **GOOD FRIDAY**

In this liturgy, after the Passion is proclaimed, the Cross is unveiled for us, calling us to veneration. The suffering servant is now revealed to us – Jesus who runs love's race to the finish, enduring death on a cross so that we might know that nothing can separate us from God's love.

#### **HOLY SATURDAY**

Gathering in darkness, our hope is rekindled in the blessing of the fire and the inscribing of the Paschal Candle that proclaims the victory of the crucified one of Alpha and Omega. "Christ our light" resounds in the darkness, and we receive the call to take that light into our lives and the world proclaiming:

#### HE IS RISEN INDEED! ALLELUIA!

The final word is not had by darkness and death, but by Hope and Love! (adapted from Chris Monaghan CP – It's all about Hope)

THE GREAT GIFT OF EASTER IS HOPE – CHRISTIAN HOPE, WHICH MAKES US HAVE THAT CONFIDENCE IN GOD. IN GOD'S ULTIMATE TRIUMPH, AND IN GOD'S GOODNESS AND LOVE, WHICH NOTHING CAN SHAKE.
