There was a lawyer who, to disconcert Jesus, stood up and said to him, 'Master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' He said to him, 'What is written in the Law? What do you read there?' He replied, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbour as yourself.' 'You have answered right,' said Jesus, 'do this and life is yours.'

But the man was anxious to justify himself and said to Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?' Jesus replied, 'A man was once on his way down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of brigands; they took all he had, beat him and then made off, leaving him half dead. Now a priest happened to be travelling down the same road, but when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. In the same way a Levite who came to the place saw him, and passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan traveller who came upon him was moved with compassion when he saw him. He went up and bandaged his wounds, pouring oil and wine on them. He then lifted him on to his own mount, carried him to the inn and looked after him. Next day, he took out two denarii and handed them to the innkeeper. "Look after him," he said, "and on my way back I will make good any extra expense you have." Which of these three, do you think, proved himself a neighbour to the man who fell into the brigands' hands?' 'The one who took pity on him,' he replied.

Jesus said to him, 'Go and do the same yourself.'

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REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate The Neighbourliness of Global Citizens

The lawyer asked a self-serving question: 'Who is my neighbour?' He could then set the limits, the boundaries of those close enough to merit his concern. Jesus replies with a story to show that the better question is: 'To whom should I be neighbourly?'

The answer is: To any person who is wounded in any way - physically, psychologically, socially, economically. And we have to do so overcoming the labelling, even bigotry, which can conveniently put a person outside the range of our concern. When we act like the Samaritan, we deserve the title 'Catholic' which means universal.

Pope Francis says that Christ is constantly inviting us, as he invited Thomas, to touch His wounds which are to be found in the wounded of our own time.

LIVING FAITH IN THE EVERYDAY



To Whom Can I Be Neighbour?

The Gospel this weekend is the familiar Parable of the Good Samaritan. We are asked by some Scripture scholars to reframe the question of 'Who is my neighbour?' to 'To Whom Can I be Neighbour?' This is a very timely reframing in midst of Australia and the world at this time.

In the face of vet more natural disasters and resurgence of Covid, a weary community is digging deep to respond to the Gospel - to not be the person who 'passes by the person in need'. Perhaps it is instructive to draw on some insights about Charity and Justice.

Ron Rolheiser OMI reminds us that 'Charity is giving away some of your time, energy, resources, and person to help to others in need. And that's an admirable virtue, the sign of a good heart. Justice, on the other hand, is less about directly giving something away than it is about looking to change the conditions and systems that put others in need. One-to-one charity, as the parable of the Good Samaritan makes clear, is what's demanded of us, both as humans and as Christians.

Rolheiser goes on to challenge 'The lesson is that being good-hearted alone is not enough. It's a start, a good one, but more is asked of us. I suspect most of us already know this, but perhaps we're less conscious of something less obvious, namely, that our very generosity itself might be contributing to a blindness that lets us support the exact political, economic, and cultural systems which are to blame those we're attending to in our charity. This is particularly challenging for us during NAIDOC Week (Theme: Get Up! Stand Up! Show Up!) when the limitations of structures are very apparent both within society and our Church. This week is the Final Session of the Plenary Council of the Australian Catholic Church gathering in Sydney and the passing in the first day, of the following motions is cause for hope:

Under the Reconciliation: Healing Wounds, Receiving Gifts theme, the members voted to pass a motion that would, among other things, commit the Church to say sorry to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people for the part played by the Church in the harm they have suffered, as well as endorsing the Uluru Statement from the Heart.

The second theme considered was *Choosing Repentance – Seeking Healing*. The members voted for the Plenary Council to say sorry to abuse victims and survivors, their families and communities and recommit the Church to respond with justice and compassion to those who have suffered from the trauma of abuse. In a further motion members voted to request the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference, Catholic Religious Australia, and the Association of Ministerial PJPs, with assistance from appropriate experts, to study, acknowledge and address systemic factors which have facilitated abuse within the Church. There is much that continues for all of us to **do** and to **be** in response to the final verses of the Gospel to 'go and do the same yourself' (Luke 10:37) in responding to the question: To Whom Can I Be Neighbour?
