Jeremiah

You bore me to be a man of strife for the whole world.

The king's leading men spoke to the king. 'Let Jeremiah be put to death: he is unquestionably disheartening the remaining soldiers in the city, and all the people too, by talking like this. The fellow does not have the welfare of this people at heart so much as its ruin.' 'He is in your hands as you know,' King Zedekiah answered 'for the king is powerless against you.' So they took Jeremiah and threw him into the well of Prince Malchiah in the Court of the Guard, letting him down with ropes. There was no water in the well, only mud, and into the mud Jeremiah sank. Ebed-melech came out from the palace and spoke to the king. 'My lord king,' he said, 'these men have done a wicked thing by treating the prophet Jeremiah like this: they have thrown him into the well where he will die.' At this the king gave Ebed-melech the Cushite the following order: 'Take three men with you from here and pull the prophet Jeremiah out of the well before he dies.'

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REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate

I have come to bring fire

A fierce fire in a eucalyptus forest bursts open the seed pods, cleanses the soil of smothering undergrowth, and returns nutrients to the soil to germinate the seeds. It is that sort of fire which Jesus brings to the earth. So, at Pentecost, He sent His Holy Spirit '. . . like tongues of fire', bursting the early disciples out of the protective shell of the 'Upper Room', allowing them to be germinated as seeds of the early Church. It is the same in every generation which has to ask: What personal, family or social situations provide a hard casing which must be cracked open? What is the smothering undergrowth which prevents our germination as fearless disciples? Jesus himself felt smothered by the small-minded people of Nazareth to which He never returned. He warns that families and good friends can try to smother the spark He wishes to ignite. We might pause for a moment to pray that the fiery Holy Spirit might enable us to become a stand of tall trees reaching for the Risen Son in all His glory.

Mary is our Saint - a down to earth woman who 'saw a need and did something about it'!

Listening to the Readings and Prayers at Mass all leads to understanding that Mary is a Saint for our times.

Her grounded spiritual approach to life enabled her to travel to establish new foundations and to meet the needs of the sisters and the needs of the times. Her iournevs took her to many places by many means of transport. As a woman of her time, she imbibed a remarkable knowledge of the land and the conditions that ordinary Australians endured. She responded with compassion and the 'down to earthness' which is the hallmark of the Josephite Sisters today. Mary responded to God by using her gifts.

Mary, like all of us, was given gifts to use for the Kingdom. It is up to us to discover them, to use them in our lives, not to hide them and refuse to acknowledge their

Let us look at the gifts Mary had in her life:

- 1. Her faith enabled her to accept whatever happened as gifts from a loving Father.
- 2. Her faith encouraged her to share it, so that it would enrich the lives of others as
- 3. There was a **tenacity** about her that probably came from her Scottish genes, and a practical outlook on life. Her feet were firmly fixed on the ground.
- 4. Her **personality** drew others to her not only young women, but those she met during her travels and her work, men, women and children. Mary obviously had a sense of humour.

The Solemn Blessing at the end of Mass is worthy of our reflection: Through the example of St Mary of the Cross may we learn to recognise God's will for us and trust in God's providence.

May Mary's life of service awaken in us a deep respect for the poor and a strong will for justice.

May we share in her courage, see with the eyes of Christian love, and learn from her witness.
