REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate

Standing in the Humus of Life

This parable begins 'Two men went up to the Temple to pray'. But only one of them actually prayed: 'God be merciful to me, a sinner'. The other informs God how well he is doing in the piety stakes. Notice that he strings together a whole lot of verbs, all in the first person singular! This means he is in mortal danger of staying in the first person singular after death, which is Hellish. The other is said to be 'humble'. I like the English companion word: 'humus'. He is wellgrounded, knows where he is standing, sometimes in the manure of life. It takes courage and humility to admit to God exactly where we stand. We can do so in Confession, or less formally simply praying: 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner'. We could pause for a moment to humbly pray so that we may hope to hear Our Lord say: 'This woman, this man, this boy, this girl, went home at rights with God.'

Archbishop Christopher has proposed a new Diocesan Pastoral Council (DPC) that will assist him in the core mission of the Church in this Archdiocese:

Evangelising: spreading the good news of Jesus to all

Service: being instruments of mercy and responding to the needs of the poor *Promoting*: human flourishing in a fulfilled creation

The Working Party, formed by Archbishop Christopher, is seeking your views, as parish and other communities and as individual members of the Church. Four questions have been framed to gather views that might be a single sentence or a more extensive responses:

Why should the Archbishop constitute a Diocesan Pastoral Council? In your view what role might a Diocesan Pastoral Council play in the life of the Archdiocese?

- To fulfil its synodal mission, a Pastoral Council should be both representative and skilled – what advice can you offer to the Archbishop about how best to achieve these goals?
- Are there elements/issues that you believe the Summary or the full Report have missed that are important for the Archbishop to consider?

The theme this year is "We cannot remain silent about what we have seen and heard' [Act 4: 20]

Pope Francis states 'It is a message of hope – Jesus Christ is risen and we cannot keep his love, compassion, and mercy to ourselves. It also challenges us to stand up and speak out on behalf of those who are weaker. All too often, the voices that need to be heard are not the loudest. For them, we cannot remain silent.' Pope Francis continues in his message for World Mission Sunday reminding us 'that as Christians we cannot keep the Lord to ourselves' as ' we recall with gratitude all those men and women who by their testimony of life help us to renew our baptismal commitment to be generous and joyful apostles of the Gospel'.

As we recall the many missionaries who leave behind their families and friends to take the Gospel to so many in other countries we are inspired by their witness and ministry to be courageous ourselves. Today Jesus 'needs messengers and agents of compassion' Concluding his message, Pope Francis stresses that, 'always but especially in these times of pandemic, it is important to grow in our daily ability to widen our circle, to reach out to each other who, albeit physically close to us, are not immediately part of our 'circle of interest'

To be on Mission, Pope Francis adds, 'is to be willing to think as Christ does, believe in Him that those around us are also our brothers and sisters.' Quotes taken from Pope Francis' World Day Mission Message, October 2022]

Praying with the right attitude

In contrasting the prayer of the proud Pharisee with the prayer of the Tax Collector in today's Gospel [Luke: 18: 9-14] Jesus teaches his disciples to pray humbly. Jesus again surprises his listeners by showing the Tax Collector as an example of faith rather than the Pharisee.
