Wake up to the Poetry

Our Lord loved to unfurl the scroll of the Prophet Isaiah in his local synagogue. The poetic image of swords being hammered into ploughshares reverberated into his renouncing violence against the Roman occupying army in his own time. When will this picture come true for all human beings for all time?Only God knows! We don't know any more than we know when a burglar might target our home. But our ignorance of God's timetable is no excuse for being fatalistic and sleepy. We have our own span of life providing the timetable for our own contribution to the hammering of swords into ploughshares. Recent Popes, especially St John Paul II, have taken up this theme for our times, teaching more restrictive criteria for using armed force, even dropping the term 'just war' to very small print in the Catechism.We could pause for a moment to pray to be awake to our opportunities to shape society in the light of the vision of Isaiah and the practice of Jesus the Prince of Peace.

WORTH THE WAIT

I he beginning of this new Liturgical Year (Year A) is a good time for us Catholics to reflect on how blessed we are to have a liturgy that provides us, over a three year cycle, with most of the text of the four Gospels of the New Testament at Sunday Mass.

For this year (Year A) Matthew is the major source of the Sunday Gospel readings. In the following two years we have Mark (Year B) and Luke (Year C). John might be seen as a sort of fourth man used to supply some deeper insights he gained through many decades of prayer and meditation, on the life of his beloved Master. The Confraternity of Divine Worship which selects readings appropriate to the Season tries to find readings in the Hebrew Scriptures (including the Psalms) which gel with the Gospel.

In his Gospel, Matthew's aim is to show that God's saving plan for the Jewish people is realised in the person of Jesus Christ. He is writing for a Jewish Christian readership In the First Century AD. He repeatedly draws attention to the Hebrew Scriptures where they point to Jesus as being prefigured in some characters, like Moses the Liberator, or in the sayings of the Prophets.

The history of the Jewish people is one of waiting for God's intervention and the fulfilment of his Covenant with Abraham, Noah and Moses. For us Christians, God's intervention began when the Virgin Mary, under the power of the Holy Spirit, conceived a child. Mary became the first Adventist as she waited for the arrival of that child. Joseph, her husband, receives angelic guidance that Mary would "bring forth a son and you shall call his name Jesus." (Matt 1:21)

The Church in its Liturgy encourages us to relive the nine months of Mary's pregnancy by having a feast for the Conception (The Annunciation), then The Visitation of Mary to her cousin Elizabeth, already six months pregnant with John the Baptist, whose birthday we also celebrate. And yet four weeks out from celebrating the birth of Christ the Church asks us to think about the after life.

Let us think about life being lived at two levels. At one level, Mary and Joseph were ordinary law abiding citizens. That's why they were on their way to Bethlehem, Joseph's ancestral town, as required by the Roman census. But at another level they are divine agents in an event that will change the course of human history. God will enter into and become part of humanity in the person of Jesus of Nazareth, later to be called the Christ, the anointed one of God.

The roller-coaster history of the Jewish people was aimed at achieving this moment in time. And why? To show the Jewish people and through them, the whole world that God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. (See John 3: 16-17)

We are blessed to believe in Jesus Christ, true God & true Man. Stay awake. Be alert. Today Jesus through Matthew gently reminds us that "The Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect." (Matt 24:44) At another level he is already here. Speak to him.
