In days past the Lord humbled the land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, but in days to come he will confer glory on the Way of the Sea on the far side of Jordan, province of the nations. The people that walked in darkness has seen a great light; on those who live in a land of deep shadow a light has shone. You have made their gladness greater, you have made their joy increase, they rejoice in your presence as men rejoice at harvest time, as men are happy when they are dividing the spoils. For the yoke that was weighing on him, the bar across his shoulders, the rod of his oppressor, these you break as on the day of Midian.

1 Cor 1:10-13. 17

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

I appeal to you, my brothers and sisters, make up the differences between you.

I appeal to you, brothers, for the sake of our Lord Jesus Christ, to make up the differences between you, and instead of disagreeing among yourselves, to be united again in your belief and practice. From what Chloe's people have been telling me, my dear brothers, it is clear that there are serious

differences among you. What I mean are all these slogans that you have, like: 'I am for Paul', 'I am for Apollos', 'I am for Cephas', 'I am for Christ'. Has Christ been parcelled out? Was it Paul that was crucified for you? Were you baptised in the name of Paul? For Christ did not send me to baptise, but to preach the Good News, and not to preach that in the terms of philosophy in which the crucifixion of Christ cannot be expressed.

Gospel Mt 4:12-23

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

He went to Capernaum, that the prophecy of Isaiah be fulfilled.

Hearing that John had been arrested Jesus went back to Galilee, and leaving Nazareth he went and settled in Capernaum, a lakeside town on the borders of Zebulun and Naphtali. In this way the prophecy of Isaiah was to be fulfilled: Land of Zebulun! Land of Naphtali! Way of the sea on the far side of Jordan, Galilee of the nations! The people that lived in darkness has seen a great light; on those who dwell in the land and shadow of death a light has dawned. From that moment Jesus began his preaching with the message, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand.' As he was walking by the Sea of Galilee he saw two brothers, Simon, who was called Peter, and his brother Andrew; they were making a cast in the lake with their net, for they were fishermen. And he said to them, 'Follow me and I will make you fishers of men.' And they left their nets at once and followed him. Going on from there he saw another pair of brothers, James son of Zebedee and his brother John; they were in their boat with their father Zebedee, mending their nets, and he called them. At once, leaving the boat and their father, they followed him.

He went round the whole of Galilee teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the Good News of the kingdom and curing all kinds of diseases and sickness among the people.

The Voice of Jesus

Two sets of two brothers were running successful family businesses. But once Jesus passed by and called them, the Gospel says, at once they left their boats and followed him. I think because, hearing his voice, they realised that Jesus was the true vocalist of God.

Irish author and mystic, John O'Donohue, once wrote, 'Something in us senses and knows how perfectly the contours of the soul fit the divine embrace.' *

Maybe Simon Peter, Andrew, James and John sensed that, in this Jesus, there was a Soul whose contours perfectly fitted the divine embrace. They were prepared to risk everything for the chance to have their souls contoured along the same lines. The call: 'Follow me ...', was not to an isolated individual promising to save his soul, but to two brothers and then another two brothers. Immediately, a community was being formed and its task was to bring others into that Jesusfollowing community.

We could pause for a moment to hear the brothers beckoning us to follow the call of that voice sounded by Our Lord Jesus Christ.


Follow me and I will make you fishers of men...

Today's readings offer some interesting points and poses some questions for us:

What are the readings saying? Are they connected in any way? How do they apply to us/our culture centuries on from when they were written?

The reading from Isaiah talks about the people who walked in darkness saw a great light and their general happiness and welfare increased. In Corinthians this same idea is projected into a more modern time as we are beseeched not to

to spread the Good News.



The Gospel has Jesus inviting others to join spreading the Good News.

The invitation to join Him did not seem to be problematic at that time. It would seem improbable that a simple invitation today would see people drop all and "follow" in the same way. In times past many Catholics thought that answering "the call" meant entering the Seminary or joining a Religious Order.

Careful reading may help us find the connecting thread of these readings. The obvious thread is the invitation to follow Jesus. We need to be mindful that the world today is a vastly different place, but careful looking can help us discover the essence of what was written.

Through our Baptism we are called to discipleship. It may mean stepping out of our comfort zone so that our personal participation involves a more careful, active response to the call of faith. Matthew, in his manner of inviting others to join him is touching on theology- exploring, explaining and demonstrating the meaning of discipleship.

What is Jesus inviting/ asking us, His disciples to do? How can we spread the Good News? During this year are we willing/able to show others how to follow Jesus and find the light? Are we willing to pray for and with one another, resolve and accept differences? In doing so are we able to become united in our beliefs and practices?

Jesus, in His walking along the seashore inviting people to join Him in discipleship was fulfilling ancient, scriptural promises in the context of His time.

He is asking us to do the same.
