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REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate

The Beatitudes ... A Call to Action Jesus doesn't start in a fantasy dream world of perfection. Jesus looks at the world as it often is for many people, perhaps for most people around the world: 'the poor in spirit', 'those who mourn', 'those who are gentle', 'those who hunger and thirst for justice'. Jesus astonishes the crowd by saying that such people are 'Blessed'. How can this be? The answer lies in our Lord's emphasis on the new community he is establishing under the reign of God: what he calls 'the Kingdom of God'. Those in such wretched circumstances will have things set right, but only if followers of Jesus do everything possible to lift the poor out of the poverty which crushes their spirit, do everything to comfort those who mourn, do everything possible to make sure the gentle share the earth's resources, do everything possible to satisfy the craving for justice. We could pause for a moment to pray the "Our Father" pledging ourselves to construct this new society where the Beatitudes can come true. "Thy kingdom come, they will be done on earth as it is in heaven?

Search for Happiness

The search for happiness is understood in many different ways in our society. There has been a great deal written about the search for happiness and its links to purposeful living and loving human relationships.

Martin Seligman PhD in his book: 'Authentic Happiness' [2002] states: 'Authentic happiness comes from identifying and cultivating your most fundamental strengths and virtues and using them every day in work, love, play and parenting....on the journey to lasting fulfilment, meaning and purpose.' [pgs xiii- xiv].

In an interview in 1999 the Dalai Lama reflecting on happiness from a Buddhist perspective asks his followers to reflect on what is truly valuable in their life; what gives meaning to their life. It is from here he says we set our priorities. He reflects: 'for our life to be of value we must develop good basic human qualities - warmth, kindness, compassion. Then our life becomes meaningful and more peaceful - happier.'

Jesus offers a different perspective on the path to Happiness.

In Matthew's Gospel [5:1-12] Jesus offers us the disconcerting message of the Beatitudes which open with the words 'HAPPY' By 'being poor in spirit, that is, lowly and meek; in looking to God alone for salvation; by being merciful and pure in heart ; by working for justice and peace. What a challenging plan for the pursuit of happiness!

The Beatitudes are happiness from a very different perspective. As Joy Bowen points out in the Spiritual Reflection Guide for St Vincent de Paul: 'Jesus embodies an all encompassing love and expresses his wisdom so beautifully in the Beatitudes to show us his interior landscape, a source of your joy. This not a set of regulations, but a vision of where transformation can grow eventually.' [Jan- April 2023 Guide]

It is not happiness the way we want and plan, but the way God wants it & desires it for us. Jesus came to heal a broken world - our own broken world today with its many rifts, wars and concerns. We must not be content with short lived-happiness. Let us turn away from our own self interest and confidently turn towards God's path day by day so that with St. Augustine we can pray:
