### Advent – Awaiting a New Age

Bishop David Walker, in 'Praying the Scriptures in Advent Year C' shares some of the following insights. Pope Leo the Great [440-461CE] when speaking about 'Advent' or Arrival' anticipated not Christ's Birthday but the world's conclusion, history's consummation. Bishop Walker states: We await a 'new age', a 'new deal' a 'new human society' where the deepest human hungers are satisfied – where 'giving' triumphs over 'getting', where peace surpasses violence, and where co-

operation replaces competition. In the Scriptures God's Kingdom is coming - that God's presence is taking flesh as food for the hungry, water for the thirsty, shelter for the homeless, comfort for the imprisoned, clothing for the naked. Leo's Advent Sermons were not about the coming of Christmas but about the joy that results when earth's bounty becomes shared boon - a shared blessing, not just higher corporate shared profits. The early Roman 'Advent' was not a time of preparation for will result when Christ returns to reign, and God is all in all.


The Liturgy Lectionary supplies the best response to this question. Bishop David points out: 'What we Christians await is not clearly Christmas – for although we the past. What God does in the birth of Jesus reveals, enacts and embodies our own future, for Christmas celebrates the 'incomprehensible God' who comes 'incomprehensively near' to us

# **CHRISTMAS MORNING TEA & FAREWELL**


The Parish will be holding a Christmas Morning Tea and a farewell for Fr Loi on Sunday 15th December after the 9 am Mass.





