Dear Parishioners,

During this coming Lent, our Parish will be offering two new processes in our faith. Firstly, 'EXERCISE IN SYNODALITY' and secondly "SCIENCE AND FAITH".

Christian Smith, the American convert Catholic sociologist at the University of Notre Dame, has asserted that 70% of young people leave the church in the USA because they cannot reconcile the findings of science and the teaching of their Catholic faith.

A couple of years ago, when I enquired at the Catholic Education Offices, of both Sydney and Broken Bay, I was advised that neither of these bodies offered combined courses in Faith, Science and Reason. These were taught only as stand-alone subjects.

The writings of Fr John Go, SJ a Doctor of Education, and author of "Religious Education from a Critical Realist Perspective", has demonstrated that not only was such a course not available, but the teachers he had surveyed were ill equipped to teach such a combined course.

Bishop Anthony Randazzo, Bishop of Broken Bay, acknowledged "my frustration regarding the lack of combined course" in a letter to me, dated 11th September, 2024.

Therefore, I am offering a six week **READING COURSE**, (30 pages per week) for ten lucky people. The text, "SCIENCE and FAITH" will be available for free, for the first ten people who enrol.

If young people don't have this course on offer at schools, then I believe parents (as the first and best teachers of their children) should have the opportunity to assist their children with knowledge, they too, haven't probably received formally.


