This was not because we had no right to be, but in order to make ourselves an example for you to follow.
We gave you a rule when we were with you: not to let anyone have any food if he refused to do any work. Now we hear that there are some of you who are living in idleness, doing no work themselves but interfering

with everyone else’s. In the Lord Jesus Christ, we order and call on people of this kind to go on quietly working and earning the food that they eat.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke
Your endurance will win you your life.
When some were talking about the Temple, remarking how it was adorned with fine stonework and votive offerings, Jesus said, ‘All these things you are staring at now – the time will come when not a single stone will be left on another: everything will be destroyed.’ And they put to him this question: ‘Master,’ they said, ‘when will this happen, then, and what sign will there be that this is about to take place?’ ‘Take care not to be deceived,’ he said, ‘because many will come using my name and saying, “I am he” and, “The time is near at hand.” Refuse to join them. And when you hear of wars and revolutions, do not be frightened, for this is something that must happen but the end is not soon.’ Then he said to them, ‘Nation will fight against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be great earthquakes and plagues and famines here and there; there will be fearful sights and great signs from heaven. ‘But before all this happens, men will seize you and persecute you; they will hand you over to the synagogues and to imprisonment, and bring you before kings and governors because of my name – and that will be your opportunity to bear witness. Keep this carefully in mind: you are not to prepare your defence, because I myself shall give you an eloquence and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to resist or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, relations and friends; and some of you will be put to death. You will be hated by all men on account of my name, but not a hair of your head will be lost. Your endurance will win you your lives.’

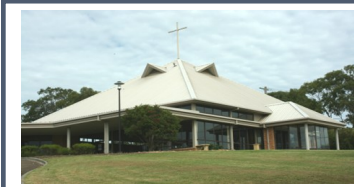

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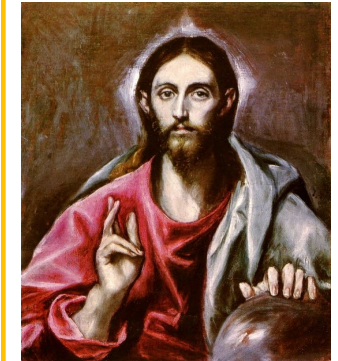

We acknowledge the traditional custodians of the land, the Walbunja people of the Yuin Nation.

We pay our respects to their elders, past, present and emerging.

Remember, you are not to prepare your defence beforehand, for I myself shall give you a wisdom in speaking that all your adversaries will be powerless to resist or refute.

As the Church year draws to a close, today’s readings invite us to look honestly at the end of things — not with fear, but with faith and hope.

The prophet Malachi warns that “the day is coming, blazing like an oven” — a vivid image of God’s justice that burns away all arrogance and evil.

Yet for those who “fear the Lord’s name,” this same day brings healing and renewal, like “the sun of justice with its healing rays.” God’s justice is not meant to destroy the good, but to restore what is right and true.

The first reading also presents a vivid image of refining fire that reflects God’s purifying love, which cleanses souls after death. In this light, we pray for the departed — that through God’s mercy, what is imperfect may be burned away, and they may enter fully into His healing light.

Psychologist Jordan Peterson, drawing on Carl Jung’s idea of the shadow, teaches that personal growth requires confronting and sacrificing the corrupt or decaying parts of ourselves — the pride, lies, and habits that hold us back. Through this painful but purifying process, often described as “burning off the dead wood,” we shed what is false to make room for what is vital. In facing our shadow and embracing responsibility, we find renewal and meaning, living out Peterson’s insight: “If you let what is unnecessary die, what is vital will grow.

” St. Paul reminds the Thessalonians — and us — that following Christ means living responsibly, not idly. His call to “work quietly and eat your own food” speaks to integrity and example. Faith is not an excuse for withdrawal, but a reason to serve diligently and contribute to the life of the community. This recalls Jesus’ teaching from Ash Wednesday: to give, fast, and pray in secret, not for recognition, but for genuine transformation.

In today’s Gospel, the disciples marvel at the beauty of the temple — built from costly stones and gifts from the people. Yet Jesus points beyond its grandeur to a deeper truth: all earthly things, even sacred ones, will pass away. Wars, disasters, and persecution will come, but the faithful are not to lose heart. “By your perseverance you will secure your lives,” Jesus promises.

This passage also reminds us that true wisdom is not our own but a gift from Christ dwelling within us. In moments of trial, we are called to trust the Spirit’s guidance rather than rely on clever words or self-assurance. When we surrender our fear and let God speak through us, our witness becomes powerful — not because of eloquence, but because it is rooted in divine truth. Before you speak, think; before you act, pray — so that your words and deeds flow from God’s wisdom, not your own.

May we be people of steady faith, honest work, and quiet perseverance — confident that the Lord who rules with justice will also heal with love.
