Prayers of the Faithful 3rd Sunday of Lent 26 April 2020

Father: As your people, God our Father, and nourished by your Word broken for us, we give ourselves to Your loving care.

Reader: For the leaders of all nations: That leaders and their people work for and celebrate a peace that overcomes boundaries and divisions. We pray to the Lord.

All: Lord, hear our prayer.

Reader: For a deeper understanding of Christ's presence among us: That, like the Apostles on the road to Emmaus, we may journey confidently through life, knowing that Christ is always among us, especially in the Breaking of the Bread. We pray to the Lord.

All: Lord, hear our prayer.

Reader: For those who have lost their lives in war or who have been wounded or traumatised in the course of their service: May those who have sacrificed their lives enjoy forever that peace that only Christ can give and may the wounded and traumatised find healing in body and mind and be given the care that justice demands. We pray to the Lord.

All: Lord, hear our prayer.

Reader: For those families who have lost loved ones in violence common to all theatres of war. May they be consoled in the knowledge that sacrifice does not go unrecognised, and in the hope that hatred may one day be overcome by love and that forgiveness and mutual respect might replace the discord of war. We pray to the Lord.

All: Lord, hear our prayer.

Reader: For all those living and dead: May the God of compassion and forgiveness hear the prayers we now make in the silence of our hearts....... We pray to the Lord.

All: Lord, hear our prayer.

Father: God of mercy and forgiveness, we pray for peace in our world. May warfare be replaced by kindness. We ask you to hear our prayers through Christ our Lord. Amen

Could you please submit your thoughts by **Friday 8 May.** I will collate the contributions within a week and put them out in the bulletin for your 'listening responses' over a further 2 weeks. Once this process is complete I will submit our final thoughts to the Plenary Council by the end of May, and provide a copy to the parish through the bulletin.

We hope many of you will take this opportunity to participate in this process, even if you have not been able to do so previously. It is a chance to influence how our Australian Catholic Church responds to the Spirit in the 21st century.

We know that some parishioners have been connecting with some people. They have

been dropping off things or running errands. Others have

done phone or video calls to hear the voice or to see the smiling face.

What a great thing to do!

Not all of our elder parishioners can access all these things. But they may be able to receive messages. Some of us can remember when we were younger and our mothers or grandparents loved sending and receiving letters. They would keep the letters for years and read them over and over. A good example is of writer Roald Dahl and his Mother

So, we are launching a request for parishioners to write in messages and prayers of love, support and concern for our elder parishioners. If you can send them by email to belconnensouth@cg.org.au by lunchtime on Thursdays that will help. We can collate

them and someone from each residential care centre will receive them from us for distribution. You are very welcome to remain anonymous. Don't have the ability to email them? No problem. Pop them in an envelope and slide them in the mail slot of the parish office.

Hello,

I just wanted to let you know that I am thinking of you and keeping you in my prayers during this difficult time. I hope you are keeping well and are in good spirits. It can be hard to stay positive and have hope when faced with something like this, particularly as many of us are unable to see family and friends.

I have found the readings over Easter have given me hope and courage in these testing times. I often think of Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane, so worried about what was to happen that he sweated blood! His friends had abandoned him and betrayed him in what was a hopeless and dire situation. His subsequent suffering and death on the cross was witnessed by his mother and closest supporters who could only watch on helplessly. Yet, out of great suffering, pain, loss and death, came new life. Jesus' resurrection reminds me of the need to walk by faith and that, even when all seems lost, I should "let go and let God". This always fills me with great peace.

The View from my place in Evatt

I thought you may like to see the lovely autumn colours and flowers Canberra has at the moment. Autumn is my favourite time of year and many Canberrans are out walking and cycling to get a bit of fresh air. The evenings are cooling down but the days are still sunny, if a bit windy this week.

These are some photos from my front garden – it is a colourful riot of hardy plants like salvias (red, red/white, pink, white, purple and purple/white) and daisies (yellow and white), rock roses, lavenders and rosemaries. I also have native plants like correas, callistemons, ands a small groundcover wattle.

Having a garden is just how I was brought up. My mum lives in Tumut and loves her garden. Mum is 76 and working in her garden each day in the sunshine is giving her a lot of joy. It's her exercise and a chance to make something beautiful. Dad is 78 and has a vegetable patch. They currently have too many beans and I have too many tomatoes and zucchinis and we laugh that we can't share at the moment. Dad shares his produce with his sisters and friends.

We share plants with each other. She gave me some of my Salvias and seaside daisy. I have bought some plants at the local fetes at Miles Franklin, St Monica's and St Matthews and others at the Hall Markets or nurseries.

The garden is shaded by two large iron bark gums which are our street tree (you can see the trunks in the second picture). In the second photo you can also see our cherry tree on the right and a miniature lemon tree on the left (the lime green leaves).

My garden is next to a laneway and so people can walk past and see it from the front and side. Every day we also get visitors in the form of bees, butterflies, and birds like honeyeater, white cockatoos and Currawongs.

The Currawongs are enjoying the fruit on my large "true service" tree out the front. Here is a photo of them jumping around eating the fruit.

As you can see, I haven't got around to putting in a lawn at the front yet. Time seems to get away from me with work and caring for my twelve-year-old son and I miss the good times in autumn!



In my backyard, our pear tree is so bright with its autumn leaves. I took this photo yesterday as the morning sun was just striking it.

I also have a vegetable patch. This year I grew lots of tomatoes, put them on a trellis to grow up. I got lots of zucchinis this year. The beans didn't grow very well with the heat, but I resowed another crop and I might get a few beans before

the big frosts arrive. I also grow rhubarb (my mum and I like rhubarb and apple with custard), raspberries and I have a fijoa tree but I don't think it will give me any fruit this year.

To give the local kids a treat, we have put out some teddy bears in our front garden for them to enjoy. I have included them as they might give you a smile.

I hope you are able to sit in your residence garden soon and enjoy the sun. We will have many blue-sky days to come this autumn.
