It's not just coincidence, not just 'by-chance' that Jesus' path crosses the woman suffering the haemorrhage in today's gospel. The woman had suffered this affliction 12 agonising years and the law considered her ritually unclean; inflicting upon her a painful social and religious isolation which was more than physical.

Yet now, Jesus passes by, close - that the woman might reach out. He invites her to act upon her faith. And this, she does. The woman takes a great risk however in doing so, knowing and believing not just that Jesus could, but that he desired to heal her, contrary to everything the world, the society and the crowd, had told her for so long.

Immediately, after reaching out, Jesus seeks her out, desiring more than just her physical healing. He calls her and face-to-face utters, not "woman", but "daughter". In the midst of her turmoil and isolation, Jesus reveals her real identity; one which had been obscured from her for so long. She is a daughter of God. His words, "Daughter, your faith has saved you," prove a far greater gift than any physical healing.

We too have the young daughter of Jairus, who parallels the older woman in her healing. Even her age echoes the number of years the older woman had suffered, 12. Jesus calls her too, "Daughter" or in Aramaic. "Talitha koum!" which means "Little one, arise!" She too encounters Jesus face-to-face and is healed.

Jairus came to ask Jesus' help not for himself but for another. His faith carried him to Jesus. He believed that Jesus' touch would be enough. His hope in the Lord, and not in his own strength, allowing him to intercede for others.

Yet at the same time, notice that the gospel writer, Mark, repeatedly reminds us of the bustling crowds which press in. This is significant. The crowds which gather on the 'other side' as they arrive (5:21); the crowds which follow as Jesus accompanies Jairus (5:24); the crowd which press in as the woman winds her way through to Jesus (5:27); even the disciples' testimony of the enormous crowd which had gathered: "You see how the crowd is pressing upon you and yet you ask, "Who touched me?" (5:30)

This question "Who touched me?" is at the gospel's heart. The disciples see Jesus 'hemmed in' on every side, yet Jesus is not hemmed in at all. On many occasions in his ministry, all the way to his place before the Sanhedrin and Pilate, and finally on the Cross, Jesus seemed exactly that, hemmed in - yet in these moments Jesus was never freer. And neither are the two who approach Jesus 'hemmed in'.

Both are set apart, freed by faith. The woman's faith told her she was not an outcast, even though the crowd told her exactly that. She concluded, no matter the consequences, she was going to touch Jesus. Her faith set her apart and her faith was satisfied.

Jairus' faith too is tested when 'the crowd' alerts him: "Your daughter has died; why trouble the teacher any longer?" As if to say: "It's over... He may perform miracles, multiplying loaves, which we love to watch! But we're dealing with death! Your cause is beyond hope." Faith, however, does not lose hope, but in the greatest moments when we feel most 'hemmed in', suffocated by the doubt and faithlessness of the world crowded around, Jesus invites us to reach out again, and again. Faith sets no limits. Of course, fear challenges our heart, especially when the unbelieving crowd does nothing, but stand around "weeping and wailing unrestrainedly." (Mk 5:38). Yet the Christian - just like Jairus and the woman - clings to Jesus' words: "Do not be afraid; just have faith."

Friends, we certainly live in a culture which lies about Jesus and who and when one can approach him. Perhaps even subconsciously in our hearts we fall victim to the crowd declaration that we are 'hemmed-in' in some way, beyond the reach of Jesus garment. Yet we do not come to Mass, or even pray, to please the crowd which is the world, but to encounter the God of Truth and Love. The God who invites us to come, to stretch out. We come because He calls us and frees us, heals and forgives us, from where we are.

In the presence of Christ, faith fortifies us to cling to those words of Jesus. And this faith promises not simply or always physical healing, but the true healing we long for - knowledge that we are beloved sons and daughters of God. Wherever we find ourselves at this point in our lives, let us drown out the chatter of the crowd, and seek only Jesus in faith and sacrament.

Readings of the Day – 13th Sunday in Ordinary Time —Year B

First Reading Wis 1:13-15; 2:23-24

Death was not God's doing, he takes no pleasure in the extinction of the living. To be – for this he created all; the world's created things have health in them, in them no fatal poison can be found, and Hades holds no power on earth; for virtue is undying. Yet God did make man imperishable, he made him in the image of his own nature; it was the devil's envy that brought death into the world, as those who are his partners will discover.

Second Reading 2 Cor 8:7. 9. 13-15

You always have the most of everything – of faith, of eloquence, of understanding, of keenness for any cause, and the biggest share of our affection – so we expect you to put the most into this work of mercy too. Remember how generous the Lord Jesus was: he was rich, but he became poor for your sake, to make you rich out of his poverty. This does not mean that to give relief to others you ought to make things difficult for yourselves: it is a question of balancing what happens to be your surplus now against their present need, and one day they may have something to spare that will supply your own need. That is how we strike a balance: as scripture says: The man who gathered much had none too much, the man who gathered little did not go short.

Gospel Reading Mk 5:21-43

When Jesus had crossed in the boat to the other side, a large crowd gathered round him and he stayed by the lakeside. Then one of the synagogue officials came up, Jairus by name, and seeing him, fell at his feet and pleaded with him earnestly, saying, 'My little daughter is desperately sick. Do come and lay your hands on her to make her better and save her life.' Jesus went with him and a large crowd followed him; they were pressing all round him. Now there was a woman who had suffered from a haemorrhage for twelve years; after long and painful treatment under various doctors, she had spent all she had without being any the better for it, in fact, she was getting worse. She had heard about Jesus, and she came up behind him through the crowd and touched his cloak. 'If I can touch even his clothes,' she had told herself 'I will be well again.' And the source of the bleeding dried up instantly, and she felt in herself that she was cured of her complaint. Immediately aware that power had gone out from him, Jesus turned round in the crowd and said, 'Who touched my clothes?' His disciples said to him, 'You see how the crowd is pressing round you and yet you say, "Who touched me?" But he continued to look all round to see who had done it. Then the woman came forward, frightened and trembling because she knew what had happened to her, and she fell at his feet and told him the whole truth. 'My daughter,' he said 'your faith has restored you to health; go in peace and be free from your complaint.' While he was still speaking some people arrived from the house of the synagogue official to say, 'Your daughter is dead: why put the Master to any further trouble?' But Jesus had overheard this remark of theirs and he said to the official, 'Do not be afraid; only have faith.' And he allowed no one to go with him except Peter and James and John the brother of James. So they came to the official's house and Jesus noticed all the commotion, with people weeping and wailing unrestrainedly. He went in and said to them, 'Why all this commotion and crying? The child is not dead, but asleep.' But they laughed at him. So he turned them all out and, taking with him the child's father and mother and his own companions, he went into the place where the child lay. And taking the child by the hand he said to her, 'Talitha, kum!' which means, 'little girl, I tell you to get up.' The little girl got up at once and began to walk about, for she was twelve years old. At this they were overcome with astonishment, and he ordered them strictly not to let anyone know about it, and told them to give her something to eat.
