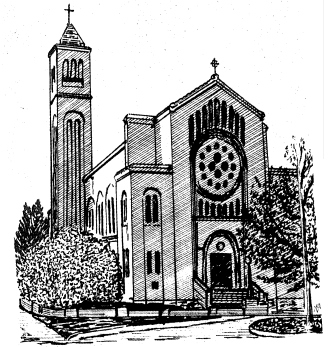

Dear parishioners and visitors,

Today, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday, marks the beginning of NAIDOC Week (June 4th-11th). In these days we recognise and celebrate the gifts of all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholics; and the deep, ancient culture which lives through them. As we reflect on our past, and look to our hope-filled future, one remarkable figure stands tall. Aboriginal Elder, Deacon Boniface Perdjert, who died in March of 2019.

An Elder of the Kardu Diminin clan, and the most senior traditional owner of the land on which Wadeye (Port Keats) is now built, Deacon Boniface was Australia's first permanent Aboriginal deacon. A man of profound spirituality and service, Boniface seemed to understand and embrace his baptism and subsequent diaconal calling, in a way which was both intensely humble and refreshingly human. It was these traits which made him a true evangelist, proposing the Person of Christ, from and in the place, culture and life through which he was called, and which was deeply a part of who he was. He once said: "Jesus told us ... to love God with whole hearts, mind and spirit, that means the whole of me and the whole of me is Aboriginal. There is no other way for me to love him."

Described as a man of deep inner serenity, Boniface clearly knew Jesus intimately, with an enviable wisdom which still has much to say today, in the legacy bestowed on the country, people and church which he loved. Boniface realised and witnessed to those around him, that wounds are the sign of authenticity, that human history is the palette through which God speaks, and that hope is something not to be achieved, but lived. This is the truth of evangelisation. Not ever abandoning one's identity, but seeing it always, in and through the light and lens of Christ. He writes:

"When I read the gospels, I read them as an Aboriginal. So many of the things Christ said and did, and the way he lived, makes me think of the good things, of our way of life. Christ did not get worried about material things. He looked at them as things that get in the way, and make it hard to get to our true country. He was born in the countryside, in a cave, like many of us have been born. He walked about like us, with nowhere to lay his head. He died with nothing on a cross. So many of our people die with nothing. He was strong on sharing. We do a lot of things like that - but of course he went further. In the Eucharist, he shared himself as nobody else could."

Where we come from, is a part of who we are, and from here Christ uses us; to enrich and teach both ourselves and those around us. He uses every part of who we are. Dcn Boniface's spirituality transcended so many of the passing earthly concerns which trap us in a modern materialistic bubble. Upon Boniface's death, the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholic Council (NATSICC) wrote: "A trailblazer for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholics [Boniface] not only walked between two worlds - Catholic and Traditional - he brought them together. His words and actions spoke loudly to the members of the Wadeye Community... but also to the Catholic Hierarchy with whom he shared his wisdom on many official occasions."

Friends, Deacon Boniface illustrated in the most simple, yet strikingly alluring way - how the ancient culture running through his veins and the faith he cherished, came together - this is evangelisation. He saw a 'continuity, rather than a rupture, between his people's history and the Gospel message. "God did not begin to take an interest in people with the incarnation of His Son, nor with Abraham", he says. "My people existed here in Australia thousands of years before Abraham. In all that time, God was working with my people. He worked through their culture. He was saving us, despite our human weakness. He was preparing us for the day when we would see the features of Aborigines in the image of His Son."

I see Boniface's life echoed in our Archbishop's Pastoral Letter, "BREATH IN...BREATH OUT". In it, the Archbishop reflects upon the call to evangelisation in light of the approaching Plenary Council. "We breathe in the life and power of the Holy Spirit... (RECEIVE!) We breathe out the Holy Spirit when we witness Jesus to all (GO!)" For as seen in Dcn Boniface's own life, and as articulated by Archbishop Christopher, "evangelisation is not SOMETHING we teach. It is SOMEONE (Jesus) we propose by witnessing in all sorts of ways...", whereby all "panoramas of human longing are the new horizons of evangelisation... where the Kingdom of God awaits to bud forth."

Friends as we give thanks for Indigenous brothers and sisters, we recall the mission entrusted to us in the history, culture and times in which we live. God uses us in every moment, he uses who we are, past, present and future, to make himself known and loved. "It is time to renew our life in the Archdiocese in the light of the Plenary Council and respond within our Catholic Tradition with courage and hope." For indeed, as Archbishop Christopher reminds us, and as Boniface witnessed, "The Church is always being renewed in history."

REST IN PEACE: FR BRIAN MAHER - Born September 12th 1936, in Corowa, Fr. Brian attended St. Lawrence's, Galong, and later, St. Gregory's, Campbelltown. After majoring in Agriculture from the University of Sydney (1972), and after subsequent education degrees, Brian entered St. Columba's College, Springwood in 1959, and St. Patrick's College in 1963. Brian was ordained by Archbishop Eris O'Brien on July 16, 1966. Over years of faithful service, Fr. Brian was appointed to Cootamundra 1966-1968; Braddon 1968; Cooma 1971; the Cathedral 1974; Queanbeyan 1976; Goulburn 1977; Braddon 1978-1986; Bungendore 1986-1992; and Aranda 1992-2007. We have been blessed by magnificently generous shepherds in our Archdiocese. We pray for Fr. Brian, and rejoice in thanksgiving, in the gift of God, which he faithfully brought to us over a life of ministry. *May he now rest in the Peace of his Lord, and rise in Glory.* Fr. Brian's Requiem Mass was offered on Friday the 2nd, in St. Vincent's Church, Aranda.

- In accordance with government restrictions, 260 people are permitted in the Cathedral, respecting the 2sqm p/p rule.

First Reading

Ez 2:2-5

The spirit came into me and made me stand up, and I heard the Lord speaking to me. He said, ‘Son of man, I am sending you up to the Israelites, to the rebels who have turned against me. Till now they and their ancestors have been in revolt against me. The sons are defiant and obstinate; I am sending you to them, to say, “The Lord says this.” Whether they listen or not, this set of rebels shall know there is a prophet among them.’

Second Reading

2 Cor 12:7-10

In view of the extraordinary nature of these revelations, to stop me from getting too proud I was given a thorn in the flesh, an angel of Satan to beat me and stop me from getting too proud! About this thing, I have pleaded with the Lord three times for it to leave me, but he has said, ‘My grace is enough for you: my power is at its best in weakness.’ So I shall be very happy to make my weaknesses my special boast so that the power of Christ may stay over me, and that is why I am quite content with my weaknesses, and with insults, hardships, persecutions, and the agonies I go through for Christ’s sake. For it is when I am weak that I am strong.

Gospel Reading

Mk 6:1-6

Jesus went to his home town and his disciples accompanied him. With the coming of the sabbath he began teaching in the synagogue and most of them were astonished when they heard him. They said, ‘Where did the man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been granted him, and these miracles that are worked through him? This is the carpenter, surely, the son of Mary, the brother of James and Joset and Jude and Simon? His sisters, too, are they not here with us?’ And they would not accept him. And Jesus said to them, ‘A prophet is only despised in his own country among his own relations and in his own house’; and he could work no miracle there, though he cured a few sick people by laying his hands on them. He was amazed at their lack of faith.
