

Solemnity of Saint Mary of the Cross

Today, on the feast day of our own Saint Mary of the Cross, Jesus' directions in the Gospel arrest our attention. 'I'm telling you not to worry about your life', he says. Really!? How can we not? Especially in these days, where all we can seem to do is worry!

The Saint we celebrate today was too, certainly no stranger to worry. Saint Mary McKillop had copious fears and struggles, especially leading up to the founding of the *Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart* (the "Josephites"). She also had many personal pains, and losses, as well as grave health burdens to carry. So the fact that we now honour Saint Mary with the title 'of the Cross' – not, 'of the roses' or even, 'of the Infant Jesus' – gives us a clear indication of what her life consisted. Crosses, challenges and questions.

And yet the fact is, many times Mary did not know the answer to these questions. Indeed, her own letters reveal how many worries and anxieties she actually had. At times she must have felt like the widow in the first reading, crushed with worries of the unknown and seemingly insurmountable.

The unexpected and extraordinary thing however – and surely the greatest signs to us of the kind of woman Mary was – was that none of this crushed her. This remarkably faith-filled woman, whom we call Australia's Saint, never let any of these questions or fears have the last word. Rather, in many ways, it's what made her the Saint she is.

Back in 1957 there was a gameshow taking television by storm. And for those lucky enough to have a TV, the show was called "Who Do You Trust?" The idea was that you were asked a number of questions, which, if you felt you were unable to answer, you could 'pass' to another (whom you 'trusted') to answer correctly for you. With the wonder of *Youtube* I watched an episode with intent. In this episode, before 'passing' the question, the host Johnny Carson asks: 'Who do you trust?' 'In whom does the answer rest?' 'Who do you trust to get you the points?'

What was most intriguing however, was that when many asked their partner to answer, oftentimes they were perplexed by the answers they received. Yet they soon showed themselves surprised when they turned out to be correct.

I can only recall this as we today consider the life of our own St. Mary MacKillop. Strange, I know. But it is, in a sense, how Mary lived her extraordinary life. Often St. Mary didn't know the answers to many of the challenges that would face her... yet instead of becoming upset, angry or even worse simply giving up, very bravely, she simply turned to the one she trusted most! Here, she always found the answer. How we would benefit to always do the same.

And you see... and this is the incredible truth, this is what made Mary a saint. *She knew the One she trusted.* In 1874 Mary wrote "When I could not see my way, God kept my heart full of trust to make all come right."

And so the question 'our saint', St. Mary of the Cross, poses to us today is exactly that: *Who do you trust?* Is there any greater question that could be asked?

In the game show – the 'catch' as they say – was that you could have another person answer for you only *once*. But for you and I, the rules are very different. Mary knew this much. Many things change in our lives... people too. Many come and go! Yet the One Who remains, who never changes... always there to answer the questions, even when to us, they make no sense – is Christ! A firm, unmovable rock. He is *Certainty* himself, in the midst of so much uncertainty.

This is the truth we see radiate in the life of our own St. Mary of the Cross MacKillop. And so, let us proudly call on St Mary's intercession, and learn from her, especially as we endure this pandemic and the trials of our time. Let us ask her to guide the upcoming Plenary Council too, that the Spirit of Trust and so sanctity may radiate for centuries to come, in this Great South Land, of the Holy Spirit.

Saint Mary of the Cross. Pray for us, always.

Entrance Antiphon: *Come, you blessed of my Father, says the Lord: I was sick and you visited me. Amen, I say to you: whatever you did for one of the least of my brethren, you did it for me.*

First Reading

1 Kgs 17:7-16

And then the word of the Lord came to Elijah, 'Up and go to Zarephath, a Sidonian town, and stay there. I have ordered a widow there to give you food.' So he went off to Sidon. And when he reached the city gate, there was a widow gathering sticks. Addressing her he said, 'Please bring a little water in a vessel for me to drink.' She was setting off to bring it when he called after her. 'Please,' he said 'bring me a scrap of bread in your hand.' 'As the Lord your God lives,' she replied 'I have no baked bread, but only a handful of meal in a jar and a little oil in a jug; I am just gathering a stick or two to go and prepare this for myself and my son to eat, and then we shall die.' But Elijah said to her, 'Do not be afraid, go and do as you have said; but first make a little scone of it for me and bring it to me, and then make some for yourself and for your son. For thus the Lord speaks, the God of Israel: "Jar of meal shall not be spent, jug of oil shall not be emptied, before the day when the Lord sends rain on the face of the earth.'" The woman went and did as Elijah told her and they ate the food, she, himself and her son. The jar of meal was not spent nor the jug of oil emptied, just as the Lord had foretold through Elijah.

Second Reading

Col 3:12-17

You are God's chosen race, his saints; he loves you, and you should be clothed in sincere compassion, in kindness and humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with one another; forgive each other as soon as a quarrel begins. The Lord has forgiven you; now you must do the same. Over all these clothes, to keep them together and complete them, put on love. And may the peace of Christ reign in your hearts, because it is for this that you were called together as parts of one body. Always be thankful. Let the message of Christ, in all its richness, find a home with you. Teach each other, and advise each other, in all wisdom. With gratitude in your hearts sing psalms and hymns and inspired songs to God; and never say or do anything except in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.

Gospel Reading

Mt 6:25-34

Jesus said to his disciples: I am telling you not to worry about your life and what you are to eat, nor about your body and what you are to wear. Surely life is more than food, and the body more than clothing! Look at the birds in the sky. They do not sow or reap or gather into barns; yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not worth much more than they are? Can any of you, however much you worry, add one single cubit to your span of life? And why worry about clothing? Think of the flowers growing in the fields; they never have to work or spin; yet I assure you that not even Solomon in all his royal robes was clothed like one of these. Now if that is how God clothes the wild flowers growing in the field which are there today and thrown into the furnace tomorrow, will he not much more look after you, you have so little faith? So do not worry; do not say, "What are we to eat? What are we to drink? What are we to wear?" It is the gentiles who set their hearts on all these things. Your heavenly Father knows you need them all. Set your hearts on his kingdom first, and on God's saving justice, and all these other things will be given you as well. So do not worry about tomorrow: tomorrow will take care of itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own.
