Dear parishioners and friends,

As lockdown continues, it remains a challenging a period for many. It is painful to be 'cut off' from regular contact with family, friends, and community. It is hard to see so many businesses closed. But perhaps most trying is our inability be physically present at Mass and with each other in this holiest of moments.

This is time however not just to 'sustain' community, but to build it. Our living faith is now giving us the opportunity to be strengthened. Our second reading reminds us, we must not just listen to the word, we must act upon it. I am delighted by the witness given in these weeks, and in the way we have reached out. Many are writing letters, which have been emailed to our residents in aged care. As well as copious invitations to help others with grocery orders and other essential errands. Life can not be put on hold, and nor should love. Indeed, now we see the fruits of the undefeatable love and faith we profess. Today we see the reality that God never loves from a distance. Thank you to all who have reached out. The Church makes present the love of Christ in the world - especially in the darkness. We become the gentle reach of God's hand, affirming, strengthening and uplifting. The Lord has not left. His power has not been curbed. Nor is his compassion now put at a distance. Rather, Christ invites us to turn to him in a way we perhaps have not before. To pray in vulnerability as never before.

Let's use these days too, to embrace moments of silence and prayer, for "prayer does not go into a vacuum; nor is it merely something like a kind of psychotherapy...nor a kind of pious fiction to exercise and calm our souls. Prayer is directed at reality" (Ben XVI). Pope Francis echoes, "we have a Lord who is capable of crying with us, capable of walking with us in the most difficult moments of life". Indeed, "having faith does not mean having no difficulties, but having the strength to face them, knowing we are not alone."

Of course, we continue to pray for the Afghani people, especially children who continue to suffer so senselessly. We pray for those in Haiti, Myanmar, and around the world. There is so much to occupy our attention and prayers.

Friends, our Sunday readings contemplate the law. Yet not just any law. God's Law. Written on the human heart. Humanity has always struggled with laws; even today. And yet how necessary they are. When we recognise something of value, we envelop it with laws, to protect and ensure its flourishment. Nature reserves, road rules, or, on another level all together - the most precious gift of all, our children. Society uses rules, laws to govern and protect a story which most remain oblivious to. The story which gives you and I dignity and value; recognising the beauty of the world, and those who dwell in it.

While a poor example: consider sport. Would any person who loves rugby, say, "go onto the field, and just do what you want." "Play however you see fit, make it up as you go!" Of course not. This would be absurd, chaos even. Would we accept that logic in any other area of life we take seriously? No way. If you love the game, you accept and respect the laws which preserve the game's integrity and make it what it is. The laws make sense of, give direction and purpose, as well as an end; void of chaos and eventual sadness.

I am reminded of an article by a theologian Robert W. Jenson, which speaks of the dangers of a world which has *lost its story*. In the face of secularism Jenson asks: *what happened to humanity's story*? Or more to the point, how can one have the characteristics of a story, namely *order, direction* and *meaning*—which every person seeks— without a narrator or knowledge of a promise? He concludes, a world without story is a world without direction. An intriguing thought. Recently, such a problem has been illustrated perfectly, that when we lose our story, even something like euthanasia begins to look like a good idea!

One might see God's 'laws' as those which protect that story, that promise of *who* we are, and *for Whom* we are made. Moses makes these laws known, to be followed for life to flourish. As if to say, 'know your story'. God protects the integrity of those created in his image, protecting the moral and spiritual life that they grow in his likeness, that "my Joy may be in you, and your joy may be complete" (Jn 15:11). Yet we too see in the Gospel, what happens when we construct laws in our own service and image. When we cling not to God's story, as our narrator, but to our own story. The fact is, we are not the narrator of our own story. If our times have taught us anything... it is this.

Readings of the Day – 22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time —Year B



Entrance Antiphon: Have mercy on me, O Lord, for I cry to you all the day long. O Lord, you are good and forgiving, full of mercy to all who call to you.

Responsorial Psalm: The just will live in the presence of the Lord.

First Reading

Dt 4:1-2. 6-8

Moses said to the people: 'Now, Israel, take notice of the laws and customs that I teach you today, and observe them, that you may have life and may enter and take possession of the land that the Lord the God of your fathers is giving you. You must add nothing to what I command you, and take nothing from it, but keep the commandments of the Lord your God just as I lay them down for you. Keep them, observe them, and they will demonstrate to the peoples your wisdom and understanding. When they come to know of all these laws they will exclaim, "No other people is as wise and prudent as this great nation." And indeed, what great nation is there that has its gods so near as the Lord our God is to us whenever we call to him? And what great nation is there that has laws and customs to match this whole Law that I put before you today?'

Second Reading

It is all that is good, everything that is perfect, which is given us from above; it comes down from the Father of all light; with him there is no such thing as alteration, no shadow of a change. By his own choice he made us his children by the message of the truth so that we should be a sort of first-fruits of all that he had created. Accept and submit to the word which has been planted in you and can save your souls. But you must do what the word tells you, and not just listen to it and deceive yourselves. Pure, unspoilt religion, in the eyes of God our Father is this: coming to the help of orphans and widows when they need it, and keeping oneself uncontaminated by the world.

Gospel Reading

Mk 7:1-8. 14-15. 21-23

Jas 1:17-18, 21-22, 27

The Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered round Jesus, and they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with unclean hands, that is, without washing them. For the Pharisees, and the Jews in general, follow the tradition of the elders and never eat without washing their arms as far as the elbow; and on returning from the market place they never eat without first sprinkling themselves. There are also many other observances which have been handed down to them concerning the washing of cups and pots and bronze dishes. So these Pharisees and scribes asked him, 'Why do your disciples not respect the tradition of the elders but eat their food with unclean hands?' He answered, 'It was of you hypocrites that Isaiah so rightly prophesied in this passage of scripture: This people honours me only with lip-service, while their hearts are far from me. The worship they offer me is worthless, the doctrines they teach are only human regulations. You put aside the commandment of God to cling to human traditions.' He called the people to him again and said, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand. Nothing that goes into a man from outside can make him unclean; it is the things that come out of a man that make him unclean. For it is from within, from men's hearts, that evil intentions emerge: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, malice, deceit, indecency, envy, slander, pride, folly. All these evil things come from within and make a man unclean.'

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
