More than a Word...

I fear what practitioners and surgeons, not to mention OH&S Australia would make of Jesus' methods of healing in this Sunday's today. Jesus puts his fingers into the man's ears and touches his tongue with spittle. And stranger still, it works! Immediately, we hear the man's ears are opened!

Yet reality is, throughout the gospels we're continually hearing of these encounters of Jesus healing. That's what Jesus does! In fact, we've come to expect it; almost like a magician.

Today's culture however has lost much of the sense of the extraordinary intimacy that Jesus reveals about the heart of God in these healings. Jesus can often be portrayed almost as a mythical figure, who heals... but doesn't necessarily know or enter into a relationship with the one He heals. We pray: "Jesus, help me with this, or heal me of that....or...if I go to Mass or do a Novena, give me this, and then I'll be fine..."

We seek his healing, but not his heart! We seek a remedy, but not a relationship!

And when a person does this, no wonder he remains unfulfilled and unsatisfied! Mass becomes an obligation. Faith becomes a set of rules! What a terrible life to live.

In the Gospel Jesus heals a man. Yet it's not so much the *fact* that He heals, so much as the *way* that He chooses to heal. It is not through words alone, but touch; a graphic, intimate, almost invasive touch.

Jesus could have just spoken, as He did with Simon Peter's mother in law, and in the beginning of Creation. But He *chooses* to do more. There is an Incarnational necessity and intention to His reaching and transforming us.

This *modus operandi* of God, is not for His own benefit, but for the benefit of the one He heals. The benefit of you and I. Why? Because fundamental to Christ, is relationship. Looking to His Father in Heaven he cries, *Ephphatha*, 'be opened!'

Our God does not just want to heal, He wants to love, protect and save in and through a most perfect and close relationship, showing Himself *shockingly united* to the one who suffers.

But it doesn't stop there. "Jesus took him off by himself!" It was a private affair, not a loud spectacle, with lights and apparitions... Instead, it was quiet and almost undetectable.

God's desperate unity with humanity is perhaps most beautifully evident in the fact that – we read in the original Greek – "He groaned". This is not a God disconnected and unable to sympathise with human suffering.

God is not a God off in the distance, far removed! He is a God who feels our frustration and so our pain... a God who shares the burden. He takes to Himself human flesh with all its mess, in order to restore and save it.

Friends, Christ shows us in the Eucharist above all, that just as he held and touched the deaf man, he holds and makes contact with us. This much is true.

As you receive Jesus in the Eucharist, Christ comes to you in the same way that he came to all those He heals in the gospels. Not to simply speak a word, but to embrace! Once more you hold God in your hands, and when you consume Him, He will strengthen and change you, giving you ears to hear His Voice and a changed heart, to feel His tender caress.

Entrance Antiphon: You are just, O Lord, and your judgment is right; treat your servant in accord with your merciful love. **Responsorial:** Praise the Lord, my soul!

Gospel Acclamation: Alleluia, Alleluia! Jesus preached the Good News of the kingdom and healed all who were sick.

First Reading Isaiah 35:4-7

Say to all faint hearts, 'Courage! Do not be afraid. 'Look, your God is coming, vengeance is coming, the retribution of God; he is coming to save you.' Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, the ears of the deaf unsealed, then the lame shall leap like a deer and the tongues of the dumb sing for joy; for water gushes in the desert, streams in the wasteland, the scorched earth becomes a lake, the parched land spring of water.

Second Reading James 2:1-5

My brothers, do not try to combine faith in Jesus Christ, our glorified Lord, with the making of distinctions between classes of people. Now suppose a man comes into your synagogue, beautifully dressed and with a gold ring on, and at the same time a poor man comes in, in shabby clothes, and you take notice of the well-dressed man, and say, 'Come this way to the best seats'; then you tell the poor man, 'Stand over there' or 'You can sit on the floor by my foot-rest.' Can't you see that you have used two different standards in your mind, and turned yourselves into judges, and corrupt judges at that? Listen, my dear brothers: it was those who are poor according to the world that God chose, to be rich in faith and to be the heirs to the kingdom which he promised to those who love him.

Gospel Mark 7:31-37

Returning from the district of Tyre, Jesus went by way of Sidon towards the sea of Galilee, right through the Decapolis region. And they brought him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they asked him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, put his fingers into the man's ears and touched his tongue with spittle. Then looking up to heaven he sighed; and he said to him, 'Ephphatha,' that is, 'Be opened.' And his ears were opened, and the ligament of his tongue was loosened and he spoke clearly. And Jesus ordered them to tell no one about it, but the more he insisted, the more widely they published it. Their admiration was unbounded. 'He has done all things well,' they said 'he makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.'
