Construction

A woman was once driving through a long stretch of roadworks. It had it all. Rocks, gravel, tar. 20 zones. 40 zones. Stops and starts. Finally, at the end, a sign read: "End of construction. Thank you for your patience." This woman was Ruth Bell Graham, the wife of TV evangelist Billy Graham. Ruth was so touched by the message she actually requested the words be placed on her headstone. And they were!

As we journey through life more and more we become confronted with the truth of how fragile and dependent we really are. I know I am. And while eye-opening, it's not a bad thing to be reminded of. Yet how often do we try to fake our independence or even 'fix' this apparent weakness?

The fact is, we are sons and daughters, who do not need to try and be our own strength or success, or even fulfil our own meaning. We have a Father, a purpose, a story, a home.

Our lives are made of successes and failures, fulfilment and brokenness. The dizzy heights of joy and consolation. The detours and bumps of disappointment and set-back. Jesus even admits this reality, calling us to take up your cross and follow him, daily. Simply put, you and I are, "under construction"; we are daily in the process of becoming (Eph 4:13). With Isaiah then, we too profess: "For my part, I made no resistance, neither did I turn away." (Isaiah 50:5).

In the Gospel, Peter and the disciples reach a significant moment in their being 'moulded' as Jesus' followers. Jesus asks them, "Who do you say that I am?" (Mk 8:29). This is the Christian Question. It is a question which demands a daily, personal response, and yet it is one which is always founded on the communal reply of the whole Body, the Church. How we answer this question is also important. If Jesus is just some moral teacher, exemplifying the 'good life', then he becomes one among the many. While inspiring, his teachings will not shape us... We may even leave his word behind if a more attractive idea comes along. But if he is God, then everything Jesus says has eternal, life-giving value. What he says, we must do – keeping in mind that following Jesus is a life-long call.

My thoughts turn here to a carving over the north porch of the Cathedral of Our Lady of Chartres. France; a carving mostly hidden from sight - much like the truth it echoes. One almost needs eyes of faith which want to find and see. It depicts Adam (and so, all of us), created as an act of love. This sculpture isn't just great art, but a very effective theology.

Adam lays upon the Eternal Word, upon Jesus' lap – created as a bearer of God's image. Christ's hands, powerful and gentle, form and mould the crown of His creation. You and I. The Christian is one 'under construction' and this takes patience - God is working, not done with us yet

To Jesus' question today, Peter responds, "You are the Christ" - God become flesh. And because of this, Peter is willing to leave behind everything and follow (Mk 8:29). And yet it soon becomes clear that

Peter still does not understand what it means to follow Jesus. "If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me." (Mk 8:34). Peter thought he had Jesus all figured out... He didn't. Indeed, even Peter and his faith were still "under construction".

Learning daily what it meant to be a disciple. We are all, a work in progress. Or rather, a masterpiece becoming. I don't write this because it sounds good, but... because it is TRUE. How beautifully similar we are to Peter. And all who have followed Jesus up and down the ages. At times our faith is strong, confident and comforting. At other times, we feel our world and surety has fallen from beneath us. We have days when we fervently follow Jesus, and days when we stumble and fall to things beneath our dignity. Yet we must not forget, that like Peter our faith is under construction – we are a work in progress. Jesus is the Christ, the only one who can lead us through the construction of life – through the detours, curves, and bumps in the road – to his kingdom, where we will one day too hear the words: "End of construction. Thank you for your patience."

Entrance Antiphon: Give peace, O Lord, to those who wait for you, that your prophets be found true. Hear the prayers of your servant, and of your people Israel.

First Reading Isaiah 50:5-9

The Lord has opened my ear. For my part, I made no resistance, neither did I turn away. I offered my back to those who struck me, my cheeks to those who tore at my beard; I did not cover my face against insult and spittle. The Lord comes to my help, so that I am untouched by the insults. So, too, I set my face like flint; I know I shall not be shamed. My vindicator is here at hand. Does anyone start proceedings against me? Then let us go to court together. Who thinks he has a case against me? Let him approach me. The Lord is coming to my help, who dare condemn me?

Second Reading James 2:14-18

Take the case, my brothers, of someone who has never done a single good act but claims that he has faith. Will that faith save him? If one of the brothers or one of the sisters is in need of clothes and has not enough food to live on, and one of you says to them, 'I wish you well; keep yourself warm and eat plenty,' without giving them these bare necessities of life, then what good is that? Faith is like that: if good works do not go with it, it is quite dead. This is the way to talk to people of that kind: 'You say you have faith and I have good deeds; I will prove to you that I have faith by showing you my good deeds – now you prove to me that you have faith without any good deeds to show.'

Gospel Mark 8:27-35

Jesus and his disciples left for the villages round Caesarea Philippi. On the way he put this question to his disciples, 'Who do people say I am?' And they told him. 'John the Baptist,' they said, 'others Elijah; others again, one of the prophets.' 'But you,' he asked, 'who do you say I am?' Peter spoke up and said to him, 'You are the Christ.' And he gave them strict orders not to tell anyone about him. And he began to teach them that the Son of Man was destined to suffer grievously, to be rejected by the elders and the chief priests and the scribes, and to be put to death, and after three days to rise again; and he said all this quite openly. Then, taking him aside, Peter started to remonstrate with him. But, turning and seeing his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said to him, 'Get behind me, Satan! Because the way you think is not God's way but man's.' He called the people and his disciples to him and said, 'If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me. For anyone who wants to save his life will lose it; but anyone who loses his life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it.'
