'Lord, how often must I forgive...?'

Forgiveness is one of the hardest teachings of Christianity, yet perhaps the most essential. To forgive, is to love. St Paul writes to the Corinthians: 'Love keeps no record of rights and wrongs..." (1 Cor 13:5).

Now all of this is well and good, but if you've ever really been hurt, you'll know that forgiveness is one of the most difficult, most radical things one can offer another – and I stress 'offer', because forgiveness is not always something that the other *wants* to receive. And that's ok too. The Christian can and must still forgive.

In fact the seriousness of forgiving others is so clear, that at the centre of the Our Father we pray: 'Father... forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us."

But don't ever think you're alone – a lot of people struggle to forgive. And for this reason it is important to reflect upon what forgiveness really means in our Christian faith.

To begin, forgiveness does not mean that you are no longer hurt, nor that you now need to have a relationship with the one who has hurt you, like before. These false ideas can trap us.

Many incorrectly believe that forgiveness means: 'It's ok... I don't feel bad anymore.' I 'feel' I have forgiven them. But really, you don't need to feel anything; because forgiveness is not a feeling – but a decision. It can be accompanied by feelings and when it is, that's great! ...but it *can't* be reduced to them. You don't need to be past the hurt, in order to forgive – otherwise we would all be stuck.

Forgiveness also, does not mean you need to trust the person again. In fact quite often a person has demonstrated that you should not trust them! And in some cases, to trust them again would be more foolish than forgiving.

Think of forgiveness in terms of justice. Justice is what I owe another person. Or what another owes me. So when it comes to forgiving another, you are saying: 'I am not going to make you pay me back – what you owe me!' 'I am not going to demand back from you, what you have unjustly taken from me'.

Jesus tells a parable about a King who has a servant owing him an incredible amount. In fact, more than could ever be paid back. The servant begs for forgiveness and the master "releases him from his debt." This same servant then goes out and sees a man who owes him a significantly smaller portion. And what does he do? He grabs him by the throat and throttles him: "pay me what you owe me!"

Here are the two different perspectives. "I release you from your debt" – that is forgiveness. And the other who obstinately refuses. But it has to be coupled with justice. I know what you owe me, and I chose to wave it.

We too can ask ourselves the question: what does a person owe me? Perhaps they've owed me for years. Well they've hurt me – they've cost me trust, reputation and even joy! Their actions have influenced by relationships, the way I see myself... etc... And the second thing is to say – "I am not going to demand they pay me back."

Such a decision takes great courage and grace. And while freeing, with deep hurts, it can be very difficult. The biggest thing forgivness does – is allows us to move forward. We're not left anchoring ourselves by holding someone by the throat.

Jesus is the architype of this forgiveness, and teaches Peter in the Gospel today, to learn to do the same.

What make us most like God? We can't heal, we can't create out of nothing... but what we can do... what we do possess, making us most like God – is our power to forgive.

SAINTS OF THE WEEK



Saint Mary of the Cross Mackillop 1842–1909

Feast: 8 August

St Mary grew up in Melbourne, before moving to South Australia to help educate her cousins. She began to also educate the local poor children with the support of her Parish Priest, Fr Julian Tenison Woods. Together they founded the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart, an Order committed to service, prayer, and teaching. St Mary is Australia's first canonized Saint.



Saint Andrew Kim Taegon 1821—1846 Feast: 20 September

The son of Christian converts, St Andrew Kim was baptised at the age of 15. He studied in the Philippines and at a seminary in Macau, and in 1844 became the first Korean to be ordained to the priesthood. He then returned to Korea to preach and evangelise, knowing this carried great risk of persecution. St Andrew Kim was martyred in 1846, and was canonized alongside 102 other Korean martyrs.

Entrance Antiphon: Give peace, O Lord, to those who wait for you, that your prophets be found true. Hear the prayers of your servant, and of your people Israel.

First Reading Sirach 27:30-28:7

Resentment and anger, these are foul things, and both are found with the sinner. He who exacts vengeance will experience the vengeance of the Lord, who keeps strict account of sin. Forgive your neighbor the hurt he does you, and when you pray, your sins will be forgiven. If a man nurses anger against another, can he then demand compassion from the Lord? Showing no pity for a man like himself, can he then plead for his own sins? Mere creature of flesh, he cherishes resentment; who will forgive him his sins? Remember the last things, and stop hating, remember dissolution and death, and live by the commandments. Remember the commandments, and do not bear your neighbor ill-will; remember the covenant of the Most High, and overlook the offence.

Second Reading Rom 14:7-9

The life and death of each of us has its influence on others; if we live, we live for the Lord; and if we die, we die for the Lord, so that alive or dead we belong to the Lord. This explains why Christ both died and came to life, it was so that he might be Lord both of the dead and of the living.

Gospel Mt 18:21-35

Peter went up to Jesus and said, 'Lord, how often must I forgive my brother if he wrongs me? As often as seven times?' Jesus answered, 'Not seven, I tell you, but seventy-seven times. 'And so the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who decided to settle his accounts with his servants. When the reckoning began, they brought him a man who owed ten thousand talents; but he had no means of paying, so his master gave orders that he should be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, to meet the debt. At this, the servant threw himself down at his master's feet. "Give me time," he said "and I will pay the whole sum." And the servant's master felt so sorry for him that he let him go and cancelled the debt. Now as this servant went out, he happened to meet a fellow servant who owed him one hundred denarii; and he seized him by the throat and began to throttle him. "Pay what you owe me", he said. His fellow servant fell at his feet and implored him, saying, "Give me time and I will pay you." But the other would not agree; on the contrary, he had him thrown into prison till he should pay the debt. His fellow servants were deeply distressed when they saw what had happened, and they went to their master and reported the whole affair to him. Then the master sent for him. "You wicked servant," he said. "I cancelled all that debt of yours when you appealed to me. Were you not bound, then, to have pity on your fellow servant just as I had pity on you?" And in his anger the master handed him over to the torturers till he should pay all his debt. And that is how my heavenly Father will deal with you unless you each forgive your brother from your heart.'
