Render to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's.

Many are familiar with Jesus' encounter with the disingenuous Herodians and Pharisees in today's Gospel. Accosting Jesus, they again try to 'trap' him, this time over the paying of taxes to Caesar. Was it right or was it wrong for 'faithful' Jews to render such tribute?

For this group it was a black and white issue, or so they want it. An emphatic 'yes' or 'no' – and a tastefully divisive one at that! Such is almost always the mindset of narrow-minded partisans. Indeed today, we are not short of any such examples – they who know only extremes, blinded to the possibilities and truth, which lay between.

It was a trick question, designed as a Catch-22, and they knew it. If Jesus answered, 'No,' the Herodians would charge Him with treason against Rome. If He said 'Yes,' the Pharisees would accuse Him of disloyalty to the Jewish nation, and He would lose the support of the masses.

The answer Jesus gives to their question however, in turn, traps *them*. It is a lesson which echoes through the ages, and is directed as much to us here and now, as it was to those who gathered all those centuries ago.

"Render to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's."

Reflecting on Jesus' words, it should be clear to us, what it is that we ought to be rendering to God, what it is that we owe Him. Since the soul of every human person belongs to the God who made it, in His image, all its faculties and purposes ought to return to Him, in the sense of paying the tribute of their worship, dues and service.

Saint Augustine described this passage several times in his homilies. "If Caesar reclaims his own image impressed on the coin", he says, "will not God demand from man the divine image sculpted within him?" (En. Ps., Psalm 94:2). And further, "as the tribute money is rendered to him [Caesar], so should the soul be rendered to God, illumined and stamped with the light of his countenance" (*ibid.*, Ps 4:8).

'Caesar' represents whatever duly established civil government we happen to be subject to. Yet the question becomes, What is it that we owe to Caesar? What obligations do we have toward the community to which we belong and the government that guides and directs it?

We must admit, that we are often confronted with onerous difficulties when it comes to showing an active fidelity toward a government, by freely meeting the obligations we have toward it as citizens, and that is because, we can honestly say, the government, such as it is, is not always worthy of fidelity. The most important obligation of any government, in justice, is to promote a true common good for its citizens, that is to say, to create a cultural atmosphere in which moral virtue is fostered and protected. Where life is protected. There are today hundreds of civil governments throughout the world, most of which fall far short of meeting that obligation. How many of them would even regard it as an obligation? And consider a government that is positively tyrannous, where the people are effectively dehumanised, and rank not so much as citizens but as slaves and commodities to be disposed of when their 'use' expires

When Jesus said, "Render to Caesar the things that are Caesar's," He drew a sharp distinction between two kingdoms. The kingdom of this world, where we must play our faithful part that justice may reign. And the eternal Kingdom not of this world, where Christ Reigns. Christians are part of both kingdoms, at least temporarily. Under Caesar, we have obligations and duties to loyally build up a community where justice and order can flourish, yet never at the compromise of the eternal Kingdom, which pervades and manifest itself in the present.

It is right and just to live as good and law abiding citizens, indeed this is what Jesus demands. Yet we are to do so in a way that we never forget, that the Christian is first and foremost a citizen of heaven; rendering the first tributes to Christ the Eternal King, of whom we bear not just a likeness, but his very image.

SAINTS OF THE WEEK



Saint John Paul II 1920-2005 Feast: 22 October

St John Paul II was born Karol Wojtyla in Poland. He studied in an underground seminary during World War II and was ordained a priest in 1946. St John Paul II became Pope in 1978, with a great focus on evangelisation. He made pastoral visits around the world, becoming the most travelled Pope in history! St John Paul II continued to work despite poor health, giving witness to the world of patiently bearing all suffering.



Saint Teresa of Kolkata 1910-1997 Feast: 5 September

St Teresa knew from a young age that Jesus hears the cries of the poor. At 18 she became a Sister of Loreto but later devoted herself to serving the poorest people in Kolkata (and around the world), by bringing them the love of Christ. St Teresa founded the Missionaries of Charity and received the 1977 Nobel Peace Prize for her work - which started with prayer and seeing Jesus in every person

Thus says the Lord to his anointed, to Cyrus, whom he has taken by his right hand to subdue nations before him and strip the loins of kings, to force gateways before him that their gates be closed no more: It is for the sake of my servant Jacob, of Israel my chosen one, that I have called you by your name, conferring a title though you do not know me. I am the Lord, unrivalled; there is no other God besides me. Though you do not know me, I arm you that men may know from the rising to the setting of the sun that, apart from me, all is nothing.

Second Reading 1 Thessalonians 1:1-5

From Paul, Silvanus and Timothy, to the Church in Thessalonika which is in God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ; wishing you grace and peace from God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. We always mention you in our prayers and thank God for you all, and constantly remember before God our Father how you have shown your faith in action, worked for love and persevered through hope, in our Lord Jesus Christ. We know, brothers, that God loves you and that you have been chosen, because when we brought the Good News to you, it came to you not only as words, but as power and as the Holy Spirit and as utter conviction.

Gospel Mt 22:15-21

The Pharisees went away to work out between them how to trap Jesus in what he said. And they sent their disciples to him, together with the Herodians, to say, 'Master, we know that you are an honest man and teach the way of God in an honest way, and that you are not afraid of anyone, because a man's rank means nothing to you. Tell us your opinion, then. Is it permissible to pay taxes to Caesar or not?' But Jesus was aware of their malice and replied, 'You hypocrites! Why do you set this trap for me? Let me see the money you pay the tax with.' They handed him a denarius, and he said, 'Whose head is this? Whose name?' 'Caesar's' they replied. He then said to them, 'Very well, give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar – and to God what belongs to God.'
