2nd Sunday of Advent

This second week of Advent we encounter the voice of John the Baptist, in the Wilderness: "Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight!"

All four Gospels bring us to Jesus through this mysterious figure. John the Baptist comes preaching a baptism of repentance. And yet, what can puzzle us, is that Jesus is then baptised *by* John. Not because He is sinful, but that He might make clear to us, how truly united with us He is, and so too the nature of His Mission. Jesus has come to comfort and to save. To console and to reunite us to our God.

Jesus agrees with the Baptist's message, he endorses it. In being baptised He also reveals that He has taken the burden and consequences of our woundedness and sin upon Himself... as if He were the one who had offended.

In this season of advent, we prepare anew to conceive within ourselves, the God who comes in flesh and blood.

Let us then prepare the way! For the God who reveals Himself anew, is far more mysterious then we first suspect! Here and now, there is something more to be said by a God who is far more merciful than we could ever believe. Something more to be said by a God who is far more patient than we have ever known. Something more to be said by a God who has entered space and time, in order that He might seek us out and come to us – in the vulnerability of a Child... to save His people!

May our hearts be humble and vulnerable enough to re-learn daily what Jesus is offering. Let us relish advent days of reflection, prayer and joyful expectation. For in the midst of our personal and communal darkness, we are reminded that in Jesus we have every reason to rejoice. For where John announced that the time was up... Jesus professed, it is not yet the end, but the beginning of a great flood of mercy! *An Advent*. God has come to find us... let us prepare the way!

A helpful piece to mediate upon is given to us in the words of the first Preface of Advent, prayed in the Mass. This preface is used from the First Sunday of Advent to December 16, and clearly reflects the fact that the Church's prayer in Advent focuses on both Christ's coming in the flesh at his birth and on his coming again at the end of time. Inviting us to contemplate deeply this greatest of mysteries, it reads...

For he assumed at his first coming the lowliness of human flesh, and so fulfilled the design you formed long ago, and opened for us the way to eternal salvation, that, when he comes again in glory and majesty and all is at last made manifest, we who watch for that day may inherit the great promise in which now we dare to hope.

2nd Sunday of Advent Year A — 3/4 December



Entrance Antiphon: O people of Sion, behold, the Lord will come to save the nations, and the Lord will make the glory of his voice heard in the joy of your heart.

Responsorial: Justice shall flourish in his time, and fullness of peace for ever.

Gospel Acclamation: Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths: all people shall see the salvation of God. **Communion Antiphon:** Jerusalem, arise and stand upon the heights, and behold the joy which comes to you from God.

First Reading Is 11:1-10

A shoot springs from the stock of Jesse, a scion thrusts from his roots: on him the spirit of the Lords rests, a spirit of wisdom and insight, a spirit of counsel and power, a spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the Lord (The fear of the Lord is his breath). He does not judge by appearances, he gives no verdict on hearsay, but he judges the wretched with integrity, and with equity gives a verdict for the poor of the land. His word is a rod that strikes the ruthless, his sentences bring death to the wicked. Integrity is the loincloth round his waist, faithfulness the belt about his hips. The wolf lives with the lamb, the panther lies down with the kid, calf and lion cub feed together with a little boy to lead them. The cow and the bear make friends, their young lie down together. The lion eats straw like the ox. The infant plays over the cobra's hole; into the viper's lair the young child put his hand. They do not hurt, no harm on all my holy mountain, for the country is filled with the knowledge of the Lord as the waters swell the sea. That day, the root of Jesse shall stand as signal to the peoples. It will be sought out by the nations and its home will be glorious.

Second Reading Rom 15:4-9

Everything that was written long ago in the scriptures was meant to teach us something about hope from the examples scripture gives of how people who did not give up were helped by God. And may he who helps us when we refuse to give up, help you all to be tolerant with each other, following the example of Christ Jesus, so that united in mind and voice you may give glory to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. It can only be to God's glory, then, for you to treat each other in the same friendly way as Christ treated you. The reason Christ became the servant of circumcised Jews was not only so that God could faithfully carry out the promises made to the patriarchs, it was also to get the pagans to give glory to God for his mercy, as scripture says in one place: For this I shall praise you among the pagans and sing your name.

Gospel Mt 3:1-12

In due course John the Baptist appeared; he preached in the wilderness of Judaea and this was his message: 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand.' This was the man the prophet Isaiah spoke of when he said: A voice cries in the wilderness: Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight. This man John wore a garment made of camel-hair with a leather belt round his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. Then Jerusalem and all Judaea and the whole Jordan district made their way to him, and as they were baptised by him in the river Jordan they confessed their sins. But when he saw a number of Pharisees and Sadducees coming for baptism he said to them, 'Brood of vipers, who warned you to fly from the retribution that is coming? But if you are repentant, produce the appropriate fruit, and do not presume to tell yourselves, "We have Abraham for our father," because, I tell you, God can raise children for Abraham from these stones. Even now the axe is laid to the roots of the trees, so that any tree which fails to produce good fruit will be cut down and thrown on the fire. I baptise you in water for repentance, but the one who follows me is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to carry his sandals; he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing-fan is in his hand; he will clear his threshing-floor and gather his wheat into the barn; but the chaff he will burn in a fire that will never go out.'
