Dear Parishioners and Visitors to Saint Christopher's Cathedral Parish.

The pioneering Australian Investigative journalist Mike Willesee

The pioneering Australian Investigative journalist Mike Willesee – since his death in March 2019, following a long battle with throat cancer – has often been called a father of modern-day journalism. Indeed for Willesee life was always, from its very beginnings, about seeking the truth; one need only read his *Memiors* to see this. In one of his last interviews Willesee commented on his life changing investigation into the Eucharistic miracle of Buenos Aires, from which he concluded that 'revealing God was his greatest work'.

"I think God and religion are so politically incorrect at the moment. No-body wants to know. You can be laughed at just for saying you believe in God... The work I'm doing now has been difficult. I'm constantly reminded that most journalists would say this is ridiculous. But I've stuck with this story and I'm making progress. Its shows the truth of God in the Eucharist. The truth that God is alive in our world and that His hand moves."

The truth that God is alive in our world and that His hand moves. Mike Willesee saw that revealing the truth of a God who becomes Incarnate and dwells in the midst of our material life and world, the greatest of his life's work. He, like many, had moments of great struggle, but the Truth of the Eucharist changed everything! This is of course the reality which we rejoice and live in each time we celebrate the Eucharistic. A God who deigns to come down to us and nourish us with His own Body and Blood, not symbolically but literally.

In times of struggle and trial, particularly in our frail humanity, let us never forget the true reality of the One who comes so close to us in the Eucharist. Willesee recognised our 'woundedness' as the reason why God has come so close.

In these months we also continue to pray for the Plenary Council of 2020, and its immediate preparation. This is a hope filled time. There are many faith-filled Catholics who feel ignored, distanced and hurt. Our sessions are a chance for all to express and discuss how we might better proclaim the Truth of Jesus and the life of mission our God has given us. Let us grow stronger, together, positively united as the Church and as a parish gathered around the sturdy and unchanging Truth of the Eucharist; **the truth that God is alive in our world and that His hand moves**. All are most welcome. Our first *Listening and Discernment* session will be held on Tuesday the 19th of November, 6:30pm in the Haydon Hall. Our theme will be: *How is God calling us to be a Christ-centred Church that is: Missionary and evangelising*.

Of course we continue during November to also pray for those who have died. What a gift we have in our faith and our Church. Please always know of your priests' continual prayers for you *Fr Trenton*

Prayer for all those who have died.

Blessed are you, Lord our God, lover of souls, you uphold us in life and sustain us in death: to you be glory and praise for ever! For the darkness of this age is passing away as Christ the bright and morning star brings to his saints the light of life. As you give light to those in darkness who walk in the shadow of death so remember in your kingdom your faithful servants, that death may be for them the gate to life and to unending fellowship with you; where with your saints, you live and reign, one in the perfect union of love now and for ever. **Amen.**

Readings of the Day - 32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time —Year C

ENTRANCE ANTIPHON: Let my prayer come into your presence. Incline your ear to my cry for help, O Lord.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Lord, when your glory appears, my joy will be full.

First Reading 2 Mac 7:1-2, 9-14

There were seven brothers who were arrested with their mother. The king tried to force them to taste pig's flesh, which the Law forbids, by torturing them with whips and scourges. One of them, acting as spokesman for the others, said, 'What are you trying to find out from us? We are prepared to die rather than break the Law of our ancestors.'

With his last breath the second brother exclaimed, 'Inhuman fiend, you may discharge us from this present life, but the King of the world will raise us up, since it is for his laws that we die, to live again for ever.'

After him, they amused themselves with the third, who on being asked for his tongue promptly thrust it out and held out his hands, with these honourable words, 'It was heaven that gave me these limbs; for the sake of his laws I disdain them; from him I hope to receive them again.' The king and his attendants were astounded at the young man's courage and his utter indifference to suffering.

When this one was dead they subjected the fourth to the same savage torture. When he neared his end he cried, 'Ours is the better choice, to meet death at men's hands, yet relying on God's promise that we shall be raised up by him; whereas for you there can be no resurrection, no new life.'

Second Reading 2 Thes 2:16 – 3:5

May our Lord Jesus Christ himself, and God our Father who has given us his love and, through his grace, such inexhaustible comfort and such sure hope, comfort you and strengthen you in everything good that you do or say.

Finally, brothers, pray for us; pray that the Lord's message may spread quickly, and be received with honour as it was among you; and pray that we may be preserved from the interference of bigoted and evil people, for faith is not given to everyone. But the Lord is faithful, and he will give you strength and guard you from the evil one, and we, in the Lord, have every confidence that you are doing and will go on doing all that we tell you. May the Lord turn your hearts towards the love of God and the fortitude of Christ.

Gospel Reading Lk 20:27-38

Some Sadducees – those who say that there is no resurrection – approached Jesus and they put this question to him, 'Master, we have it from Moses in writing, that if a man's married brother dies childless, the man must marry the widow to raise up children for his brother. Well, then, there were seven brothers. The first, having married a wife, died childless. The second and then the third married the widow. And the same with all seven, they died leaving no children. Finally the woman herself died. Now, at the resurrection, to which of them will she be wife since she had been married to all seven?'

Jesus replied, 'The children of this world take wives and husbands, but those who are judged worthy of a place in the other world and in the resurrection from the dead do not marry because they can no longer die, for they are the same as the angels, and being children of the resurrection they are sons of God. And Moses himself implies that the dead rise again, in the passage about the bush where he calls the Lord the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob. Now he is God, not of the dead, but of the living; for to him all men are in fact alive.'
