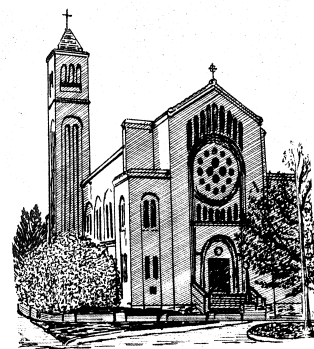

Dear parishioners and visitors to Saint Christopher's parish,

Today marks the Fourth **World Day of the Poor**, this year's theme coming from the book of Sirach, "Stretch forth your hand to the poor". On this day Pope Francis reminds us to keep our gaze fixed on the marginalised, especially during the pandemic, warning us against surrendering to a "whirlwind of indifference". He speaks particularly of the gift of *generosity* "[which] supports the weak, consoles the afflicted, relieves suffering and restores dignity... a condition for a fully human life." At the same time, the Pope recognises that "keeping our gaze fixed on the poor is difficult", but underlines, that it is "more necessary than ever if we are to give proper direction to our personal life and the life of society." "The power of God's grace" he concludes, "cannot be restrained by the selfish tendency to put ourselves always first." We must stretch out to the other!

How providential that today we hear in the Gospel, the Parable of the Talents. Three servants are given a different number of 'talents', and are tasked with making a return on their master's investment. Upon the masters return he checks to see what his servants have done with what was distributed to them. To his delight man with five has doubled his share! The last however has done nothing. And then comes the devastating moral point of the story which has confounded many for centuries. "*To the one who has much, more will be given until he becomes rich... and to the one who has least, even what He has will be taken from Him.*" This seems entirely unfair, such a 'cut-throat', venture-capitalist approach to life. However, the parable goes much deeper than first impressions indicate. What could this parable possibly be speaking of?

A point to be aware of is the perhaps unfortunate confusion generated by the term 'talent' as understood in the contemporary sense, and its use in the time when this parable was spoken. The word *talent* comes from the Greek word *talanton* which means a measure of something particularly weighty, usually silver or gold. The gold talent was reported as weighing roughly the same as a person.

What we might typically miss then, the people of Christ's time did not; and that is that a talent was something *exceedingly weighty*. Such a reference in the parable would have recalled in the Jewish mind the heaviest weight of all, the *kabod* of Yahweh. That is, the *Glory of God*. And where was the Glory of God house, but in the Temple, sitting upon what was known as the *Mercy Seat*, in the Holy of Holies.

From this we begin to see that the three servants in the parable aren't so much given a personal gift or 'talent' as we understand the term today, but rather a share in *God's Mercy*. The servants are granted a participation in the weightiness of divine love. And since mercy is always directed toward the other, these talents too were gifted *for the other*. The more mercy given, the more expected of the individual. The weakness then of the last servant who buried the talent, was not that he did not cherish, nor deserve the gift given to him, but that he fundamentally misunderstood the nature of the gift, keeping it to himself.

And so we see that this isn't a parable about some capitalist investment program, but about understanding the gift of mercy which we have been given. The divine Mercy exists only in Gift form. Mercy gives itself away and thus when you 'spend' the divine mercy, the *Kabod*, the weight of God – it only increases in you. It doubles, it triples, and comes back 30, 60, 100 fold.

The one thing we cannot do with the divine Mercy, is hang onto it, as our possession. For when we do, we simply lose it! Let us then 'stretch forth our hand' to those we know, in these days more than ever; the hand of comfort, kindness, witness, and love. But above all, the hand of Mercy.

PRESENT PROTOCOLS - Please be familiar with current guidelines

- In accordance with government restrictions, only 139 people are permitted in the Cathedral at any one time. Entry to Mass will be through one door.
- ALL PARISHIONERS & VISITORS MUST sign in upon entry. Records are securely stored and destroyed after 28 days.
- All attendees (including children) must complete the Mass Register prior to entry.
- Communion is received in the hand only & not under the species of the Precious Blood.
- Physical distancing rules still apply—respecting the 4sqm p/p rule.
- Please sit where there is a 'Please sit here' marker. Every 2nd pew is closed. NB: Families can sit together.
- Please use hand sanitiser upon entry and clean your pew/space with the wipes provided.
- There will be no physical contact at the sign of peace.
- No collection plates are in use, but money/envelopes can be deposited at collection points.
- Please DO NOT return your bulletin to the basket, but keep or dispose of appropriately. **Please maintain social distancing 1.5m, at all times, including in the single line formed to receive Holy Communion.** Blue squares and yellow markers on the tiles indicate these distances. Thank you for your commitment in keeping everyone safe.

She sets her hands to the distaff, her fingers grasp the spindle. She holds out her hand to the poor, she opens her arms to the needy. Charm is deceitful, and beauty empty; the woman who is wise is the one to praise. Give her a share in what her hands have worked for, and let her works tell her praises at the city gates.

You will not be expecting us to write anything to you, brothers, about 'times and seasons', since you know very well that the Day of the Lord is going to come like a thief in the night. It is when people are saying, 'How quiet and peaceful it is' that the worst suddenly happens, as suddenly as labour pains come on a pregnant woman; and there will be no way for anybody to evade it. But it is not as if you live in the dark, my brothers, for that Day to overtake you like a thief. No, you are all sons of light and sons of the day: we do not belong to the night or to darkness, so we should not go on sleeping, as everyone else does, but stay wide awake and sober

Gospel Reading

Mt 25:14-30

Jesus spoke this parable to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a man on his way abroad who summoned his servants and entrusted his property to them. To one he gave five talents, to another two, to a third one; each in proportion to his ability. Then he set out. The man who had received the five talents promptly went and traded with them and made five more. The man who had received two made two more in the same way. But the man who had received one went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. Now a long time after, the master of those servants came back and went through his accounts with them. The man who had received the five talents came forward bringing five more. "Sir," he said "you entrusted me with five talents; here are five more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness." Next the man with the two talents came forward. "Sir," he said "you entrusted me with two talents; here are two more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness." Last came forward the man who had the one talent. "Sir," said he "I had heard you were a hard man, reaping where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered; so I was afraid, and I went off and hid your talent in the ground. Here it is; it was yours, you have it back." But his master answered him, "You wicked and lazy servant! So you knew that I reap where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered? Well then, you should have deposited my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have recovered my capital with interest. So now, take the talent from him and give it to the man who has the five talents. For to everyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; but from the man who has not, even what he has will be taken away. As for this good-for-nothing servant, throw him out into the dark, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth."
