REPENT... FORGIVE...

The call to repentance is clear in the readings of the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time. To turn away from what deprives us of life and joy, and turn to the One who is able to bestow it, Jesus. But where do we begin?

In the first reading we hear God's instruction to Jonah, to call Nineveh to repentance. Later, Jonah becomes upset with God's offering of mercy, wanting to see the people of Nineveh suffer for their transgressions. He becomes angry, for he has forgotten that the God he serves is a forgiving one willing to extend his mercy to those who seek it.

One of the first steps in the spiritual life, to prepare ourselves for Christ's coming again, is to learn to forgive those who have wronged us.

Forgiveness can be one of the hardest teachings of Christianity, yet, it is the most essential. To forgive, is to love. Saint Paul tells us: 'Love keeps no record of rights and wrongs' (1 Cor 13:5). But what does forgiveness really mean? Where does it leave us?

The ones Jesus called in the Gospel today, had to learn this lesson themselves; as do all who follow Jesus. In Matthew, Peter proposes seven times as a generous, reasonable number. Jesus' reply however challenges him with the incalculable number 'seventy times seven' (Matt 18: 21-22). But again...what does that even mean? Saint Paul writes: "Forgive whatever grievances you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity (Col 3:13ff.).'

Now all of this is well and good, yet often, many believe other things are harder than forgiveness. But pause and think deeply. If you have ever really been hurt, you will know that forgiveness is one of the most difficult, radical things one can offer another. And I say offer because forgiveness is not always something the other wants to receive. And that too is ok.

The seriousness of forgiveness is so clear, that at the centre of the Our Father – of Jesus' own prayer - he has us pray: "forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those... who trespass against us!' That is to say: "Father... do not forgive me... if I do not forgive those who hurt me." Extraordinary! Contemplating this, we see that the stakes are high when it comes to forgiveness.

Now a lot of time (don't ever think you're alone) we struggle to reconcile with others, we struggle to forgive. For this reason it is important to ask what Jesus has taught forgiveness really means. The first thing to see is what forgiveness is not. Forgiveness does not mean we are no longer hurt, nor that we necessarily need to have a relationship again with the one who has hurt us. Many people get trapped, thinking forgiveness means: "oh, its ok... I don't 'feel' bad anymore, I'm not angry anymore or, I 'feel' like I have forgiven them... but really we don't need to feel anything; because forgiveness is not a feeling. It's a decision. As is faith. Both can be accompanied by feelings and when they are, that's great but they can never be reduced to these. Secondly, forgiveness does not mean you need to trust the person again in order to forgive them. Quite often a person has demonstrated that you should not trust them! And in some cases, to do so could be more foolish than forgiving. And finally, we see from this that forgiveness is never a 'once off'. We are called to forgive daily, to choose to forgive the hurt, which always requires God's grace.

So, forgiveness does not mean that you are no long hurt, and we don't need to be 'past' that hurt in order to forgive - if this were the case, we'd all be stuck. We do not need to forget past hurts, nor in serious cases dismiss the need of justice. This too is important. However, here we begin to see how difficult the instruction from Christ can be - and yet he never asks us to do something which he does not give us the grace to achieve.

What makes us most like God? We cannot heal at the click of our fingers, nor create out of nothing, nor raise the dead! But what makes us most like God, is our ability to forgive. Just as God forgave us through the decision Jesus made in his humanity, though in great anguish (Lk 22:39-43), so too we are called to forgive, and love one another. Have a blessed week.

First Reading Jonah 3:1-5.10

The word of the Lord was addressed to Jonah: 'Up!' he said 'Go to Nineveh, the great city, and preach to them as I told you to.' Jonah set out and went to Nineveh in obedience to the word of the Lord. Now Nineveh was a city great beyond compare: it took three days to cross it. Jonah went on into the city, making a day's journey. He preached in these words, 'Only forty days more and Nineveh is going to be destroyed.' And the people of Nineveh believed in God; they proclaimed a fast and put on sackcloth, from the greatest to the least. God saw their efforts to renounce their evil behaviour. And God relented: he did not inflict on them the disaster which he had threatened.

Second Reading 1 Corinthians 7:29-31

Brothers, our time is growing short. Those who have wives should live as though they had none, and those who mourn should live as though they had nothing to mourn for; those who are enjoying life should live as though there were nothing to laugh about; those whose life is buying things should live as though they had nothing of their own; and those who have to deal with the world should not become engrossed in it. I say this because the world as we know it is passing away.

Gospel Mark 1:14-20

After John had been arrested, Jesus went into Galilee. There he proclaimed the Good News from God. 'The time has come' he said 'and the kingdom of God is close at hand. Repent, and believe the Good News.' As he was walking along by the Sea of Galilee he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net in the lake – for they were fishermen. And Jesus said to them, 'Follow me and I will make you into fishers of men.' And at once they left their nets and followed him. Going on a little further, he saw James son of Zebedee and his brother John; they too were in their boat, mending their nets. He called them at once and, leaving their father Zebedee in the boat with the men he employed, they went after him.
