3rd Sunday of Lent

We live in an outraged world. Anger is a powerful tool, but it is misused. Anger is our desire to change something for the better, to fix a problem, to right something that is wrong. It is not a sin to be angry; it's good to be angry if our anger is used properly. God wants us to correct injustice and fix problems. We need to learn how to properly use our anger.

More often than not, people stifle their anger. Stifling our sense of injustice and proprietary is no way to fix a problem, it's a practice which results in a bitter, cynical, and jaded soul. We lose our experience and familiarity with anger and resolving conflict, and so hide from it in the future. Stifling anger doesn't help us to correct whatever injustice we've encountered, it only dulls ourselves and lets the unjust and wicked go unchallenged. It is like taking opium to dull a toothache but never going to the dentist.

Misdirecting our anger is another problem. As we heard in the Gospel, people shift their outrage and anger on to God, the government, the economy, their boss, their family. If we misdirect our anger, we won't address its cause. This doesn't help us to correct any injustice it only creates more of it. The only fruit that this tree grows is an angry, wrathful soul, that won't change anyone or anything for the better.

The proper use of anger is to motivate us to correct evil and create good. Our anger will never be satisfied until we have done something to address what has made us angry. We need to have a strategy: It does no one any good to shout and scream at the petrol station attendant over high petrol prices. Personally, I'm quite annoyed about a speed camera, but I know it won't do anyone any good to chop it down and throw it in the lake. If you're angry over this unjust and terrible war, then find a way to help those who suffer. If you're angry over policies, then challenge them through the proper means and channels.

Like all of our emotions anger is a servant, but once it stops being our servant it becomes a tyrant. Find a way to help change our world for the better, and outrage will turn into kindness

CONSECRATION OF RUSSIA AND UKRAINE to the IMMACULATE HEART OF MARY

Pope Francis will consecrate Russia and Ukraine to the Immaculate Heart of Mary during a penitential prayer service on March 25th, the Feast of the Annunciation. In our Lady's messages at Fatima, when Mary appeared to the three shepherd children in 1917, she told them, "God wishes to establish in the world devotion to my Immaculate Heart. If what I say to you is done, many souls will be saved, and there will be peace." There were warnings of "war, famine, and persecutions of the church and of the Holy Father," Mary told the children, yet "to prevent this, I shall come to ask for the consecration of Russia to my Immaculate Heart." The Fatima message promised: "If my requests are heeded, Russia will be converted, and there will be peace; if not, she will spread her errors throughout the world, causing wars and persecutions of the church. The good will be martyred; the Holy Father will have much to suffer; various nations will be annihilated." But, the message continued: "In the end, *my Immaculate Heart will triumph.*"

"The Holy Father will consecrate Russia to me, and she shall be converted, and a period of peace will be granted to the world."

First Reading

Ex 3:1-8. 13-15

Moses was looking after the flock of Jethro, his father-in-law, priest of Midian. He led his flock to the far side of the wilderness and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. There the angel of the Lord appeared to him in the shape of a flame of fire, coming from the middle of a bush. Moses looked; there was the bush blazing but it was not being burnt up. 'I must go and look at this strange sight,' Moses said, 'and see why the bush is not burnt.' Now the Lord saw him go forward to look, and God called to him from the middle of the bush. 'Moses, Moses!' he said. 'Here I am' he answered. 'Come no nearer' he said. 'Take off your shoes, for the place on which you stand is holy ground. I am the God of your father,' he said 'the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob.' At this Moses covered his face, afraid to look at God. And the Lord said, 'I have seen the miserable state of my people in Egypt. I have heard their appeal to be free of their slave-drivers. Yes, I am well aware of their sufferings. I mean to deliver them out of the hands of the Egyptians and bring them up out of that land to a land rich and broad, a land where milk and honey flow.' Then Moses said to God, 'I am to go, then, to the sons of Israel and say to them, "The God of your fathers has sent me to you." But if they ask me what his name is, what am I to tell them?' And God said to Moses, 'I Am who I Am. This' he added 'is what you must say to the sons of Israel: "The Lord, the God of your fathers, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, he added for all generations to come.'

Second Reading

1 Cor 10:1-6, 10-12

I want to remind you how our fathers were all guided by a cloud above them and how they all passed through the sea. They were all baptised into Moses in this cloud and in this sea; all ate the same spiritual food and all drank the same spiritual drink, since they all drank from the spiritual rock that followed them as they went, and that rock was Christ. In spite of this, most of them failed to please God and their corpses littered the desert. These things all happened as warnings for us, not to have the wicked lusts for forbidden things that they had. You must never complain: some of them did, and they were killed by the Destroyer. All this happened to them as a warning and it was written down to be a lesson for us who are living at the end of the age. The man who thinks he is safe must be careful that he does not fall. **Gospel**Lk 13:1-9

Some people arrived and told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with that of their sacrifices. At this he said to them, 'Do you suppose these Galileans who suffered like that were greater sinners than any other Galileans? They were not, I tell you. No; but unless you repent you will all perish as they did. Or those eighteen on whom the tower at Siloam fell and killed them? Do you suppose that they were more guilty than all the other people living in Jerusalem? They were not, I tell you. No; but unless you repent you will all perish as they did.' He told this parable: 'A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard, and he came looking for fruit on it but found none. He said to the man who looked after the vineyard, "Look here, for three years now I have been coming to look for fruit on this fig tree and finding none. Cut it down: why should it be taking up the ground?" "Sir," the man replied "leave it one more year and give me time to dig round it and manure it: it may bear fruit next year; if not, then you can cut it down."
