#### **ZEAL FOR YOUR HOUSE COSNUMES ME**

The temple for the Jewish people was everything. It was the economic, political, social, and religious centre of life. Yet even more important than this, it was the dwelling place of God and of the sacred. Here the human and the divine encountered each other; heaven and earth met.

Now all of this was well and good, at least in principle. This was how it was supposed to be. Yet the prophets remind the nation constantly that the temple rituals had become perverted. That corruption had crept into what was once a place of prayer. Over time, false gods had become resident in the sacred, often without many even noticing.

In the season of Lent we begin to see that this same compromise is familiar to the human heart. What 'false gods' have subtly taken abode in my own life? In the temple of which I am a part by virtue of my baptism, is God the centre of worship, or have other things taken priority and pride of place?

One of the great messianic expectations was that the Messiah would cleanse the temple and restore order and right worship; not for *His* benefit, but for the benefit and dignity of those He loves. And here is the Messiah who comes to turn the temple once more into a place of prayer – what it was meant to be!


In the initial court of the temple, money changers would sit and exchange coins with Caesar's image upon them, into the coin which could be used in the temple. These coins in turn were used for the treasury and to buy animals, like doves, sheep and oxen, for temple sacrifice.

The money exchangers and those selling animals were *meant* to be there. They were necessary and right for the worship and sacrifice prescribe by the law. However... this necessary custom had become no longer about providing means to worship, but now, an end in itself. The intention of the sellers was not now primarily to facilitate right worship, but first to make a buck, to line pockets, to take advantage of the widow and worshiper.

False gods had entered the temple to steal the hearts and devotions of those who belonged to the one True God. It is not hard to see why Jesus was consumed with zeal at such an injustice; infuriated at what the Temple had become out of greed and pride. His Father's house was no more a place of encounter between the human and divine, but had become a marketplace! Jesus is consumed with zeal – divine love overflowing – driven by desire to eradicate all that destroys us from being a worthy dwelling place for him.

In Jesus Himself we now behold the true encounter of the human and divine. And, if Jesus is the new and true temple, then so too are we. We have become the dwelling place of the Holy Spirit, as members of Christ's Body in our baptism. ... So now imagine Jesus' reaction when he encounters sin in his temple—in you and in me. It does not belong there, and Christ will not hesitate to drive it out.

Lent provides us an opportunity to make the same examination.

### 3rd Sunday of Lent —Year B — 2/3 March



**Entrance Antiphon:** My eyes are always on the Lord, for he rescues my feet from the snare. Turn to me and have mercy on me, for I am alone and poor.

Responsorial: Lord, you have the words of everlasting life.

Gospel Acclamation: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ, king of endless glory! God loved the world so much, he gave us his only Son, that all who believe in him might have eternal life. Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ, king of endless glory!

Communion Antiphon: For anyone who drinks it, says the Lord, the water I shall give will become in him a spring welling up to eternal life.

First Reading Exodus 20:1-17

God spoke all these words. He said, 'I am the Lord your God who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery. 'You shall have no gods except me. 'You shall not make yourself a carved image or any likeness of anything in heaven or on earth beneath or in the waters under the earth; you shall not bow down to them or serve them. For I, the Lord your God, am a jealous God and I punish the father's fault in the sons, the grandsons, and the great-grandsons of those who hate me; but I show kindness to thousands of those who love me and keep my commandments. 'You shall not utter the name of the Lord your God to misuse it, for the Lord will not leave unpunished the man who utters his name to misuse it. 'Remember the sabbath day and keep it holy. For six days you shall labour and do all your work, but the seventh day is a sabbath for the Lord your God. You shall do no work on that day, neither you nor your son nor your daughter nor your servants, men or women, not your animals nor the stranger who lives with you. For in six days the Lord made the heavens and the earth and the sea and all that these hold, but on the seventh day he rested; that is why the Lord has blessed the sabbath day and made it sacred. 'Honour your father and your mother so that you may have a long life in the land that the Lord your God has given to you. 'You shall not kill. 'You shall not commit adultery. 'You shall not steal. 'You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor. 'You shall not covet your neighbor's house. You shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or his servant, man or woman, or his ox, or his donkey, or anything that is his.'

Second Reading 1 Cor. 1:22-25

While the Jews demand miracles and the Greeks look for wisdom, here are we preaching a crucified Christ; to the Jews an obstacle that they cannot get over, to the pagans madness, but to those who have been called, whether they are Jews or Greeks, a Christ who is the power and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

Gospel John 2:13-25

Just before the Jewish Passover Jesus went up to Jerusalem, and in the Temple he found people selling cattle and sheep and pigeons, and the money changers sitting at their counters there. Making a whip out of some cord, he drove them all out of the Temple, cattle and sheep as well, scattered the money changers' coins, knocked their tables over and said to the pigeon-sellers, 'Take all this out of here and stop turning my Father's house into a market.' Then his disciples remembered the words of scripture: Zeal for your house will devour me. The Jews intervened and said, 'What sign can you show us to justify what you have done?' Jesus answered, 'Destroy this sanctuary, and in three days I will raise it up.' The Jews replied, 'It has taken forty-six years to build this sanctuary: are you going to raise it up in three days?' But he was speaking of the sanctuary that was his body, and when Jesus rose from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they believed the scripture and the words he had said. During his stay in Jerusalem for the Passover many believed in his name when they saw the signs that he gave, but Jesus knew them all and did not trust himself to them; he never needed evidence about any man; he could tell what a man had in him.
