Dear Parishioners and Visitors to Saint Christopher's Cathedral Parish,

At Mass on Thursday morning in Casa Santa Marta, Pope Francis prayed for all the world in this time of uncertainty and crisis. His prayer was that "the Lord [may] help us conquer our fear". When we suffer we naturally begin to fear and when we fear, we again naturally reveal in Who or what we trust. "In these days there's so much suffering. There's a lot of fear." The Pope said. "The fear of the elderly who are alone in nursing homes, or hospitals, or in their own homes, and don't know what will happen. The fear of those who don't have regular jobs and are thinking about how to feed their children. .... The fear of many civil servants. At this moment working to keep society functioning and they might get sick. There's also the fear, the fears, of each one of us. ... We pray to the Lord that He might help us to trust, and to tolerate and conquer these fears."

Hearing his words, I turned to contemplate my own fears... and the question always emerged: where do you place your trust? You see, part of knowing who we are, is knowing we're not! Part of knowing what our life is about, is knowing what our life is not about! This is the crux of the Lenten reality.

One of the great changes for us in these days is the question of *how* we participate in the Mass. This can be a confronting, challenging and even heartbreaking. At the same time however it can be a place of deepening understanding and growth. The Mass is the 'source and summit' of the Christian life. It is our identity, and it is necessary. Indeed without the Eucharist the Church does not exist; God remains distant. So how are we to understand our present situation?

Pope Francis in a recent telecast told his virtual audience that "in the present situation, in which we find ourselves living more or less isolated, we are invited to rediscover and deepen the value of *the communion that unites all the members of the church*." He reminded all that, "united to Christ we are never alone, we form one body, of which [Christ] is the head." He explained it as "a union that is nourished with prayer, and also with spiritual communion in the Eucharist, a practice that is much recommended when it is not possible to receive the sacrament. I say this to everyone..." the Pope echoed "and especially to those living alone." What this means is that Christ provides for his people in *every* situation, and will never abandon them (Ps 94:14).

<u>Daily Mass</u> is still offered for you all and your intentions, albeit without you all *physically* present; and I want you to take heart in knowing this. As I stood at the altar yesterday and gazed back down an empty church... I don't mind saying, I cried, just a few tears. And you know, it wasn't because the church was empty and you were not physically there. They were tears of humble joy, that even now, God has not abandoned His people. For you I am (and all your priests are what they are) but with you we are baptised members of Jesus saving and onnipresent body. Whenever the Mass is offered the priest (*in the person of Christ the Head*) offers the Sacrifice with and for the *Whole Body* of Christ, whether the baptised can be physically present or not. The Mass has power whether we are able to be there in person or not, because God is not bound by circumstance. This means that all the baptised by *virtue of their baptism* and being a member of the Body, participate in that one Sacrifice. As a parish this situation gives us an opportunity to deepen our devotion and understanding of our Catholic faith, its heart in the Mass, and the Truth it makes present to us every moment of everyday – you are members of Christ's Body, and you are not alone.

In these days you are encouraged to pause and pray with the priest. Pray the daily readings (available on the *CatholicVoice* website), offer to God your deepest fears and give Him thanks for the blessings you have received. Pray for the needs of the Church and the world. The Body of Christ is bigger than the pandemic in which we find ourselves, and the Church for millennia has found a way to nourish Her people. This is what it is to be a member of Christ's saving Body, the Church. This is a great teaching point for us all, but especially our children and our coming generations. It is a time of renewed faith and understanding.

While the Eucharist is the richest, most perfect place to encounter Christ and receive his Body, it is not the only place. We can embrace the presence of Christ in the Scriptures. The *Catholic Voice* website (<u>www.catholicvoice.org.au</u>) and (<u>universalis.com/1100/mass.htm</u>) are very helpful here for the daily readings of Mass. Viewing the Mass online also allows us to gather at the *Table of the Word* even if we cannot in this moment receive Christ's Body in the Eucharist.

We encounter Christ in many other ways in each other. Copious opportunities now illumine Jesus' words to us from John 15:12 to *love others as the Lord has loved us*. This will in these days require creativity, and patience. Indeed Jesus' words from Holy Thursday too jump out: "Now that I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also should wash one another's feet." (John 13:14). With the wonders of technology and the era that is ours, we can do this in many ways, a simple phone call to a neighbour being the most obvious; or collecting groceries for those who now cannot do so themselves. To encounter the body of Christ in the vulnerable in the coming weeks, albeit from a 'suitable distance' is the call. How can I now as a baptised Catholic bring the hope and presence of Christ into the lives of others? What an open door this tragic situation gives, to point out to many the God who loves them, and dwells in the midst of all they struggle with and we find ourselves in.

This virus, like all "successful" viruses, is spreading so well because it has found a way to exploit an identifying an intimate part who we are. It has seized our relational nature, exploiting the human desire for closeness and community. I have found myself often stopping just before an embrace, or awkwardly resisting a handshake. You know how unnatural it feels for us to hold back from these expressions of our relationships. But in these days that God wants to remind us of an even closer relationship that binds us– His own Glorious Body! Let us be instruments of that message in these days,

'Spiritual Communion'

Saints often made an act of spiritual communion when they couldn't receive the Eucharist at Mass.

For various reasons we may be prevented from receiving the Eucharist in the Mass. In these cases the Church encourages us to make an act of "spiritual communion," where we unite ourselves to God through prayer. It is a beautiful way to express to God our desire to be united with him when we are unable to complete that union in the reception of Holy Communion.

Countless saints incorporated this type of prayer into their daily lives. Making an act of spiritual communion for them was an essential part of life and drew them closer to God, daily.

St. Josemaria Escriva encouraged everyone to make a spiritual communion as often as they could, "What a source of grace there is in spiritual communion! Practice it frequently and you'll have greater presence of God and closer union with him in all your actions."

Padre Pio also had a habit of making a spiritual communion throughout the day outside of the celebration of Mass. He desired to be always united with Jesus Christ in everything he did.

Below is a traditional prayer of spiritual communion that many saints have prayed over centuries. It can be prayed if you find yourself at Home or at work, in the car or in bed, wherever you are - lifting up your thoughts to God, pray it often in these days!

The ultimate goal of our lives should be communion with God and an act of spiritual communion can help a person draw closer to that goal.

#### My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament.

I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite





# Readings of the Day – 5th Sunday of Lent —Year A

**ENTRANCE ANTIPHON:** Give me justice, O God, and plead my cause against a nation that is faithless. From the deceitful and cunning rescue me, for you, O God, are my strength.

**RESPONSORIAL PSALM:** With the Lord there is mercy and fullness of redemption.

**GOSPEL ACCLAMATION:** Glory and praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ! I am the resurrection and the life, says the Lord; whoever believes in me will not die for ever. Glory and praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ!

**COMMUNION ANTIPHON:** Everyone who lives and believes in me will not die for ever, says the Lord.

#### **First Reading**

The Lord says this: I am now going to open your graves; I mean to raise you from your graves, my people, and lead you back to the soil of Israel. And you will know that I am the Lord, when I open your graves and raise you from your graves, my people. And I shall put my spirit in you, and you will live, and I shall resettle you on your own soil; and you will know that I, the Lord, have said and done this – it is the Lord who speaks.

#### Second Reading

People who are interested only in unspiritual things can never be pleasing to God. Your interests, however, are not in the unspiritual, but in the spiritual, since the Spirit of God has made his home in you. In fact, unless you possessed the Spirit of Christ you would not belong to him. Though your body may be dead it is because of sin, but if Christ is in you then your spirit is life itself because you have been justified; and if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, then he who raised Jesus from the dead will give life to your own mortal bodies through his Spirit living in you.

#### **Gospel Reading**

There was a man named Lazarus who lived in the village of Bethany with the two sisters, Mary and Martha, and he was ill. - It was the same Mary, the sister of the sick man Lazarus, who anointed the Lord with ointment and wiped his feet with her hair. The sisters sent this message to Jesus, 'Lord, the man you love is ill.' On receiving the message, Jesus said, 'This sickness will end not in death but in God's glory, and through it the Son of God will be glorified.' Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, yet when he heard that Lazarus was ill he stayed where he was for two more days before saying to the disciples, 'Let us go to Judaea.' The disciples said, 'Rabbi, it is not long since the Jews wanted to stone you; are you going back again?' Jesus replied: 'Are there not twelve hours in the day? A man can walk in the daytime without stumbling because he has the light of this world to see by; but if he walks at night he stumbles, because there is no light to guide him.' He said that and then added, 'Our friend Lazarus is resting, I am going to wake him.' The disciples said to him, 'Lord, if he is able to rest he is sure to get better.' The phrase Jesus used referred to the death of Lazarus, but they thought that by 'rest' he meant 'sleep', so Jesus put it plainly, 'Lazarus is dead; and for your sake I am glad I was not there because now you will believe. But let us go to him.' Then Thomas - known as the Twin - said to the other disciples, 'Let us go too, and die with him.' On arriving, Jesus found that Lazarus had been in the tomb for four days already. Bethany is only about two miles from Jerusalem, and many Jews had come to Martha and Mary to sympathise with them over their brother. When Martha heard that Jesus had come she went to meet him. Mary remained sitting in the house. Martha said to Jesus, 'If you had been here, my brother would not have died, but I know that even now, whatever you ask of God, he will grant you.' 'Your brother' said Jesus to her 'will rise again.' Martha said, 'I know he will rise again at the resurrection on the last day.' Jesus said: 'I am the resurrection and the life. If anyone believes in me, even though he dies he will live, and whoever lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?' 'Yes, Lord,' she said 'I believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who was to come into this world.' When she had said this, she went and called her sister Mary, saying in a low voice, 'The Master is here and wants to see you.' Hearing this, Mary got up quickly and went to him. Jesus had not yet come into the village; he was still at the place where Martha had met him. When the Jews who were in the house sympathising with Mary saw her get up so quickly and go out, they followed her, thinking that she was going to the tomb to weep there. Mary went to Jesus, and as soon as she saw him she threw herself at his feet, saying, 'Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died.' At the sight of her tears, and those of the Jews who followed her, Jesus said in great distress, with a sigh that came straight from the heart, 'Where have you put him?' They said, 'Lord, come and see.' Jesus wept; and the Jews said, 'See how much he loved him!' But there were some who remarked, 'He opened the eyes of the blind man, could he not have prevented this man's death?' Still sighing, Jesus reached the tomb: it was a cave with a stone to close the opening. Jesus said, 'Take the stone away.' Martha said to him, 'Lord, by now he will smell; this is the fourth day.' Jesus replied, 'Have I not told you that if you believe you will see the glory of God?' So they took away the stone. Then Jesus lifted up his eyes and said: 'Father, I thank you for hearing my prayer. I knew indeed that you always hear me, but I speak for the sake of all these who stand round me, so that they may believe it was you who sent me.' When he had said this, he cried in a loud voice, 'Lazarus, here! Come out!' The dead man came out, his feet and hands bound with bands of stuff and a cloth round his face. Jesus said to them, 'Unbind him, let him go free.' Many of the Jews who had come to visit Mary and had seen what he did believed in him.
