Lazarus, Come Out!

Three times in the Scriptures, Jesus raises someone from death. The daughter of the Synagogue Official, Jairus. The Widow's Son, on his way to burial in Nain. And finally Lazarus, already buried for four days.

And while all raised to bodily life, St Augustine reminds us of the deeper spiritual reality that Jesus wants us to see, through his miracles. They are a healing from the woundedness of sin.

Recall Jesus' account of the prodigal son, who returning from his sinful, wounded life, the Father proclaims: "He was dead and has come back to life" (Lk 15: 32).

St Augustine understands the death of Jairus' daughter, whom Jesus raised *in* the house, as depicting those sins which are locked up in our minds and hearts. Hatred, resentment, lust, envy. Not yet revealed in our actions but internally, these have taken abode in our heart. When we welcome them, we welcome only death. Yet, raising the young girl, Jesus tells us who have such interior lives, that he can bring us to a new life.

The death of the young man, carried outside the gates of the city, speaks of the sin which has now 'come out' of the mind and heart and manifested itself in our actions. Gossip, anger expressed through words and violence; even nasty tweets or lust expressed in sexual immorality. In raising the young man Jesus teaches us that we who approach death in our souls by such actions, can be raised and come to new life.

Finally, there is Lazarus. Already buried and now stinking in the tomb, symbolises the trap of habitual sin. Sin has not only come out of the heart into action but has become a 'stinking habit'. One is habitually gossiping, lying, cheating, acting selfishly, violently, enviously, and lustfully. Lazarus, Augustine explains, depicts the worst kind of sin. One which has taken hold.

Yet Christ now approaches, without fear nor distain. But, in fact, with *great* love. Jesus goes into this furthest, smelliest, most disagreeable state and there invites us back to life. No one is irredeemable, however far one has strayed, whatever grave they find themselves in; no one is beyond the reach of God's redemptive mercy.

Jesus wept as he approached the tomb, pained at how sin cripples and diminish us, the jewel in his creation. Jesus, weeping, calls out for you. For as St. Irenaeus declares "the glory of God is the human being fully alive".

The raising of Lazarus, was the most astonishing to the people of the time. For Jewish belief held that the soul of the dead somehow remained with the body three days before departing the body. It is then that decay sets in. Such a view is expressed by Martha, when she objects to opening Lazarus' tomb, because: "already there is a stench because he has been dead four days".

Perhaps, Jesus intentionally delayed his coming, to let the situation appear "impossible", beyond resurrection!

For those who see and hear then, this miracle is the sign that they should never give up hope even in the seemingly hopeless situations in which they find themselves.

However, we must cooperate by faith for divine intervention. Jesus issues three commands to those surrounding. First, he asked that the stone be rolled away. Jesus could have commanded the stone to roll away itself, but he didn't. Why? Because divine power seems always to be activated by human cooperation and stifled by non-cooperation.

Secondly Jesus orders Lazarus to come out himself, and he gropes his way out of the dark tomb even with his hands and feet tied up in bandages. The man rotting away in the tomb can still do something to help himself, by listening to Jesus' instruction and taking the step to come out of the place of death.

Lastly, Jesus asked them to unbind Lazarus and set him free. Even though Lazarus could stumble himself out of the tomb, he could not unbind himself. He needs the community to do that for him. By unbinding Lazarus and setting him free, the community is accepting Lazarus back. We, the community of faith, also have a role to play in the full rehabilitation of her strayed members. Are we ready to unbind and accept one another, especially those among us who are coming back from the place of death?

First Reading

Entrance Antiphon: Give me justice, O God, and plead my cause against a nation that is faithless. From the deceitful and cunning rescue me, for you, O God, are my strength

Responsorial: With the Lord there is mercy and fullness of redemption

Gospel Acclamation: Glory and praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ! I am the resurrection and the life, says the Lord; whoever believes in me will not die for ever. Glory and praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ!

Communion Antiphon: Everyone who lives and believes in me will not die for ever, says the Lord.

The Lord says this: I am now going to open your graves; I mean to raise you from your graves, my people, and lead you back to the soil of Israel. And you will know that I am the Lord, when I open your graves and raise you from your graves, my people. And I shall put my spirit in you, and you will live, and I shall resettle you on your own soil; and you will know that I, the Lord, have said and done this – it is the Lord who speaks.

Second Reading Rom 8:8-11

People who are interested only in unspiritual things can never be pleasing to God. Your interests, however, are not in the unspiritual, but in the spiritual, since the Spirit of God has made his home in you. In fact, unless you possessed the Spirit of Christ you would not belong to him. Though your body may be dead it is because of sin, but if Christ is in you then your spirit is life itself because you have been justified; and if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, then he who raised Jesus from the dead will give life to your own mortal bodies through his Spirit living in you.

Gospel

(Longer version Jn 11:1-45) Jn 11:3-7.17.20-27. 33-45

Ez 37:12-14

The sisters Martha and Mary sent this message to Jesus, 'Lord, the man you love is ill.' On receiving the message, Jesus said, 'This sickness will end not in death but in God's glory, and through it the Son of God will be glorified.' Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, yet when he heard that Lazarus was ill he stayed where he was for two more days before saying to the disciples, 'Let us go to Judaea.' On arriving, Jesus found that Lazarus had been in the tomb for four days already. When Martha heard that Jesus had come she went to meet him. Mary remained sitting in the house. Martha said to Jesus, 'If you had been here, my brother would not have died, but I know that even now, whatever you ask of God, he will grant you.' 'Your brother' said Jesus to her 'will rise again.' Martha said, 'I know he will rise again at the resurrection on the last day.' Jesus said: 'I am the resurrection and the life. If anyone believes in me, even though he dies he will live, and whoever lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?' 'Yes, Lord,' she said 'I believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who was to come into this world.' Jesus said in great distress, with a sigh that came straight from the heart, 'Where have you put him?' They said. 'See how much he loved him!' But there were some who remarked, 'He opened the eves of the blind man, could he not have prevented this man's death?' Still sighing, Jesus reached the tomb: it was a cave with a stone to close the opening. Jesus said, 'Take the stone away.' Martha said to him, 'Lord, by now he will smell; this is the fourth day.' Jesus replied, 'Have I not told you that if you believe you will see the glory of God?' So they took away the stone. Then Jesus lifted up his eyes and said: 'Father, I thank you for hearing my prayer. I knew indeed that you always hear me, but I speak for the sake of all these who stand round me, so that they may believe it was you who sent me.' When he had said this, he cried in a loud voice, 'Lazarus, here! Come out!' The dead man came out, his feet and hands bound with bands of stuff and a cloth round his face. Jesus said to them, 'Unbind him, let him go free.' Many of the Jews who had come to visit Mary and had seen what he did believed in him.
