SOLEMNITY OF CORPUS CHRISTI

In June 2017, Pope Francis visited the small village of Bozzolo, in the northern Italian Diocese of Cremona. Francis' trip was a stopover to pray at the grave of a lesser-known figure of the 20th century, don Primo Mazzolari. Mazzolari was a pillar of public life during a turbulent period in Italy's and indeed world history. A powerfully vocal opponent to Benito Mussolini and the Nazi occupation, don Primo, as he was known, suffered great persecution and even an attempted assassination.

Yet this man captures my mind today, not just for the life he led, as admirable it be, but for a homily he offered in 1958 on Holy Thursday, the night of *the Institution of the Eucharist; Corpus Christi*. It was preached a year before his own death and surprisingly enough, the homily became know as *Nostro Fratello Giuda (Our Brother Judas)*.

Striking and even controversial, don Primo delivers a poignant yet mature reflection on the betrayal of Christ by Judas Iscariot, the traitor, the apostate apostle, the...*friend* of Jesus. And is it not this last word, *friend*, which arrests our attention? It is certainly not the first word which comes to mind at the announcement of Judas' name.

Don Primo reminds us that Jesus first addresses his disciples as friends (John 15:15), but more importantly, preserves this word even for Judas, as he approaches Gethsemane that fateful night: "*Friend...*" he says, "do what you are here to do" (Matt 26:50). Even after Judas' kiss, Jesus' love, compassion and even friendship towards the one who betrayed him, does not come to an end. God's hand is still extended, but Judas dares not reach out.

Boldly, don Primo then invites his congregation not to dismiss this moment, as we are wonton to do, but to contemplate it. To place ourselves at the center of the story. To reflect on the ways in which we have betrayed Christ in our own lives; the emptiness and pain out of which that betrayal emanates and to which it inevitably returns. Judas takes the Body and Blood of Jesus that night, but fails to entrust all his desires, hopes, *wounds* and very life into the One he receives.

Judas was once one of Jesus' closest companions, but now we can only ask, along with Mazzolari "what happened?" How have we ourselves imitated this betrayal in some way, and then, subsequently failed to recognise the mercy and forgiveness extended by Jesus to draw us into a deeper *friendship* with Him. Judas realising his action - cast the 30 pieces of silver - worthless in the eyes of the one who now *sees* - at the feet of the pursuers, but there he stopped... unable to see himself as forgiven. Judas is not, and never was the devil, yet he allowed the manipulator, the accuser, to have his wretched way in him; not only in his initial betrayal, but so too in the lie that Satan then weaved in his mind and heart that he is now beyond the pale of forgiveness, love, and... *divine Friendship*. Don Primo contemplates:

"Poor Judas. What was happening in his soul I will never understand. He is one of the most mysterious figures that we find in the Lord's passion. And we don't even try to understand him. I know how many times I myself have betrayed the Lord... And by calling him [Judas] brother, we are assuming the language of the Lord. When he received the kiss of betrayal ... the Lord responded with words that we should never forget: "Friend..."

This word reveals the immeasurable affection of the love of the Lord - despite the greatest betrayal. Don Primo challenges us, how often do we "...cooperate with Satan: destroying the work of God, abandoning consciences, sowing doubt, spreading unbelief, taking away people's faith in God, denying God. This is the work of evil...he acted in Judas and now he can subtly act in us if we don't pay attention. This is why the Lord told his Apostles on the Mount of Olives, "Stay awake and pray that you will not enter into temptation" (Mk 14:38)."

As we today adore Jesus in the Gift of the Eucharist - I find this reflection a challenging and jarring one. The Apostles were the "friends" of Jesus - good or bad, faithful or lacking - and friends they remain. We often betray Christ's friendship, but Christ never betrays us, his friends; even when undeserving, even when we receive his Body, given for us, and then return with our stubborn wills to live in the world, seemingly unchanged by the One we have received.

As we worship and marvel this day in the gift of the Eucharist, God's Body and Blood, let us contemplate once more, deeply, what is really being offered. And, despite our moments of weakness and betrayal, let us always return to the Lord, sorrowful, and mindful of his abounding friendship and the saving grace of this His Most Holy Body and Blood, freely and generously given.

Readings of the Day – The Most Holy Body & Blood of Christ —Year B

Entrance Antiphon: *He fed them with the finest wheat and satisfied them with honey from the rock.*

Responsorial Psalm: *I will take the cup of salvation, and call on the name of the Lord.*

Gospel Acclamation: *Alleluia, alleluia! I am the living bread from heaven, says the Lord; whoever eats this bread will live for ever. Alleluia!*

Communion Antiphon: *Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him, says the Lord.*

First Reading

Exo 24:3-8

Moses went and told the people all the commands of the Lord and all the ordinances. In answer, all the people said with one voice, 'We will observe all the commands that the Lord has decreed.' Moses put all the commands of the Lord into writing, and early next morning he built an altar at the foot of the mountain, with twelve standing-stones for the twelve tribes of Israel. Then he directed certain young Israelites to offer holocausts and to immolate bullocks to the Lord as communion sacrifices. Half of the blood Moses took up and put into basins, the other half he cast on the altar. And taking the Book of the Covenant he read it to the listening people, and they said, 'We will observe all that the Lord has decreed; we will obey.' Then Moses took the blood and cast it towards the people. 'This' he said 'is the blood of the Covenant that the Lord has made with you, containing all these rules.'

Second Reading

Heb 9:11-15

Now Christ has come, as the high priest of all the blessings which were to come. He has passed through the greater, the more perfect tent, which is better than one made by men's hands because it is not of this created order; and he has entered the sanctuary once and for all, taking with him not the blood of goats and bull calves, but his own blood, having won an eternal redemption for us. The blood of goats and bulls and the ashes of a heifer are sprinkled on those who have incurred defilement and they restore the holiness of their outward lives; how much more effectively the blood of Christ, who offered himself as the perfect sacrifice to God through the eternal Spirit, can purify our inner self from dead actions so that we do our service to the living God. He brings a new covenant, as the mediator, only so that the people who were called to an eternal inheritance may actually receive what was promised: his death took place to cancel the sins that infringed the earlier covenant.

Gospel Reading

Mk 14:12-16, 22-26

On the first day of Unleavened Bread, when the Passover lamb was sacrificed, his disciples said to Jesus, 'Where do you want us to go and make the preparations for you to eat the passover?' So he sent two of his disciples, saying to them, 'Go into the city and you will meet a man carrying a pitcher of water. Follow him, and say to the owner of the house which he enters, "The Master says: Where is my dining room in which I can eat the passover with my disciples?" He will show you a large upper room furnished with couches, all prepared. Make the preparations for us there.' The disciples set out and went to the city and found everything as he had told them, and prepared the Passover.

And as they were eating he took some bread, and when he had said the blessing he broke it and gave it to them. 'Take it,' he said 'this is my body.' Then he took a cup, and when he had returned thanks he gave it to them, and all drank from it, and he said to them, 'This is my blood, the blood of the covenant, which is to be poured out for many. I tell you solemnly, I shall not drink any more wine until the day I drink the new wine in the kingdom of God.' After psalms had been sung they left for the Mount of Olives.
