Today's Gospel The Raising of Lazarus



A Prayer in a Time of Coronavirus from Archbishop Christopher Prowse

Heavenly Father,

We praise and thank you for your loving presence, especially in the Lent/Easter season. We offer heartfelt thanks, dear Lord, particularly for our recent rains.

Once again, we come to you in our need. As your children we are in need of your healing and protection. Just as we have been recovering from our dangerous bushfire summer, we have now been thrown into a fearful coronavirus (COVID 19) autumn.

We are tired and frightened. We feel a sense of panic and future uncertainty on a global scale. Be with us now, Loving Master. Without you all is nothing – only empty hearts and a total reliance on our own feeble resources. But with you "there is mercy and fullness of Redemption" (Psalm 130:7). With you there is "the loving mercy of the heart of our God (who) will give light to those who sit in darkness, those who dwell in the shadow of death, and guide our feet into the way of peace" (Luke 1:79).

Spiritual Communion

Public Masses are banned throughout Italy, but literally thousands of Masses are celebrated each day and, in addition to watching them on television or computer screens, the faithful can receive 'spiritual Communion.'

Pope Francis, after reciting a livestreamed Angelus prayer on 15 March, told people, "United to Christ we are never alone, but instead form one body, of which he is the head. It is a union that is nourished with prayer and also with spiritual communion in the Eucharist, a practice that is recommended when it isn't possible to receive the sacrament. Obviously, receiving Communion is the way to participate most fully in the Mass, but it is not always possible for everyone to receive at every Mass, nor do many Catholics in the world have regular access to Mass.

The idea of "spiritual Communion" – inviting Jesus into one's heart and soul when receiving the actual sacrament isn't possible – is part of Catholic tradition

In the 1700s, St Alphonsus Ligouri wrote a special prayer for spiritual communion [see opposite]. Auxiliary Bishop Paolo Ricciardi of Rome prayed that acts of only spiritual Communion would help people "joyfully rediscover all of the good that the Eucharist has given us from the day of our first Communion."

In countries where Catholics can and do receive the sacrament frequently, they do not hear the term "spiritual Communion" very often, but it has been mentioned even in recent church documents. In Sacramentum Caritatis, the document Pope Benedict XVI issued in 2007, he cautioned people against thinking they had "a right or even an obligation" to receive the Eucharist every time they went to Mass.

"Even in cases where it is not possible to receive sacramental Communion, participation at Mass remains necessary, important, meaningful and fruitful. In such circumstances, it is beneficial to cultivate a desire for full union with Christ through the practice of spiritual Communion," Pope Benedict wrote.
